PARSHA OF THE WEEK

The leader within



PARSHAT CHUKAT

Rev Ilan Herrmann The Lions Shul, Doornfontein

IT REMAINS one of the most startling episodes in the narrative of the Torah. Moses the trusted servant of G-d whose capacity for devotion and obedience is of a supreme nature, in this week's portion, has a single career moment, of insanity.

An infraction which would probably hardly feature on the debit balance of the average man, stands out as defining and significant on Moses' and in one instant the fate of the greatest of all leaders and of a nation is sealed and a destiny is forever altered.

The Jewish people had complained to Moses that they were thirsty. G-d commands Moses to speak to the rock and it will produce water. Instead of speaking to it he hits the rock and in so doing violates the commandment, the consequence of which will impact all of Jewish history

No longer will Moses be allowed entry into the Promised Land, but he will have to die out in the desert with the generation that were already decreed not to enter. Furthermore, the absence of Moses will affect the type of phenomena unique to his reign.

Throughout the course of Moses' leadership the people were carried by an almost supernatural form of existence. The exodus confounded the laws of nature as did the splitting of the sea, the supernatural victories against the enemies of Israel, the revelation at Sinai and the miraculous sustenance of 40 years in the desert.

Moses inspired divine guidance in a revealed and open manner. Had Moses entered Israel, the process of sweeping all before them would have continued through to its conclusion, including in the words of our sages, the ushering in of the Messianic redemption at that time.

With Joshua, his successor, however and all subsequent generations, the process would be one defined by natural law and by the hard working efforts to confront challenges on their terms. We in a sense are a product of the fatal choice Moses made on that day to hit the rock.

The obvious question is: Why did he do it?

The possibility of an unwitting error or loss of control on the part of Moses is hardly an option for an individual who is described as "a man of G-d" and is regarded as having mastered human instinct. The question is

Our sages offer a number of answers. Here is one of the most inspiring: Moses' extraordinary capacity was such that his signature was at every turn of fortune and every resounding success that accompanied the journey of this yet infantile and still identity-groping nation. Thus the Jewish people would immediately attribute the miraculous result and wondrous accomplishment to Moses' special relationship with G-d and to his ability to bring about those miracles. But in so doing, an essential and necessary ingredient within the Jewish psyche was missing.

Three and half thousand years on we are able to look back and see the pattern of a people challenged, tried and tested and yet despite apparent insurmountable pressures and obstacles, repeatedly displaying the ability to arise and succeed in an outstanding and extraordinary way, unparalleled in the annals of the history of nations.

In Moses' seeming error, a new chapter was begun, that of the realisation that rooted within the deeper undercurrent of the Jewish spirit, lay the ability to achieve the miraculous and the remarkable; that through forging a bond with G-d and embracing the reservoir of Divine strength anchored in the Torah, the limitations and barriers that threatened, were

Moses wanted to bring to recognition an awareness of the Divine strength and spark that is contained within each and every Jew and his duty as leader was more than anything else to make known this truth and empower his people with it.

This coming week (Monday night) we commemorate the yahrzeit of a revered and saintly leader, Rabbi Menachem Mendel Schneersohn, the Lubavitcher Rebbe obm, who many have likened to a modern-day Moses. In addressing this dimension of the Rebbe, Chief Rabbi Jonathan Sacks of the UK, had this to say: "Many great leaders have created followers. What made the Rebbe unique was that he created leaders!"

If Moses, whose vision is so penetrating, incisive and clear, sees it, perhaps we too should look deeper and find our leader within.

Chief Rabbi appeals for a 'bigger and better Mandela Day'

MANDELA DAY - July 18 - is almost upon us again and Chief Rabbi Warren Goldstein is urging the South Africa's Jewish community and all South Africans, to make International Mandela Day "bigger and better" in honour of the former president's 93rd birthday.

In a media release, the Office of the Chief Rabbi says: "Nelson Mandela Day not only celebrates Nelson Mandela's 67 years of service, but it is also a global call to action for people to recognise their ability to have a positive effect on others around them. The day hopes to inspire people to embrace the values that Mandela holds dear."

For the third year running, the Chief Rabbi has joined forces with outreach organisation Afrika Tikkun in a partnership initiative for Mandela Day

"Mandela Day provides an opportunity for people around the world to spend 67 minutes doing something good for others in honour of Nelson Mandela's 67 years of service to humanity," Chief Rabbi Goldstein said. This year, people are asked to bring books, blankets or non-perish-

able food to Johannesburg's Great Park Synagogue or Cape Town's Gardens Synagogue on Sunday July 17, for 67 minutes from 11:00 to

Chief Rabbi Goldstein, who is president of Afrika Tikkun, said: "One of the most important teachings of Judaism is to live with compassion and to act with energy to help all people in need. A society is judged by how it treats its most vulnerable members.

"As Nelson Mandela is Afrika Tikkun's patron-in-chief, it is fitting that the Jewish community honour him by supporting a cause that is so close to his heart.' The items collected on Sunday July 17 will be distributed to the com-

munities of Alexandra township, Diepsloot, Hillbrow and Orange Farm in Gauteng, and Delft and Mfuleni in the Western Cape.

Activists, Israeli Navy prepare for flotilla bound for Gaza

ISRAEL'S NAVY this week made final preparations to intercept the pro-Palestinian flotilla due to arrive at the Gaza Strip from Mediterranean ports later this week

Commandos from the Israeli Navy's elite Shayetet 13 unit have spent weeks preparing to stop the flotilla from reaching Gaza, including practicing new ways to quickly board the ships' upper decks and how to use water cannons and other non-lethal riot control methods. The flotilla was only due in Gaza after our printing deadline.

The Navy wanted to avoid a repeat of the violence that occurred when Israeli commandos boarded a ship in last year's flotilla to Gaza. Nine Turkish activists, including a dual Turkish-American citizen, were killed in clashes with the commandos aboard the Mavi Marmara in May 2010.

This year's flotilla activists, whose stated goal is to break Israel's maritime blockade of the Hamas-run coastal strip, have attended workshops on the use of passive resistance tactics. The activists also have been trained to transmit information from the ships until the last minute and keep video chips hidden from boarding Israeli soldiers, according to a blog post by flotilla participant Medea Benjamin.

Unnamed Israeli officials told Israeli media outlets that some flotilla participants hoped to kill Israeli soldiers and were planning to bring aboard bags of sulphur to pour it on soldiers as they attempt to board the ships. Israeli officials have identified at least two participants in the flotilla as having ties to Hamas.

However, a flotilla organiser, Israeli expatriate Dror Feiler, told journalists that flotilla participants had signed a declaration of nonviolence. Feiler said that dangerous chemicals would not be allowed on board flotilla vessels.

"If Israel suspects anyone, it

should provide us with information so we can stop him," he told Israel Army Radio on Tuesday morning. "Violent people are not permitted to take part in the flotilla."

The flotilla was expected to be a smaller version of last year's, with some 10 ships, including two cargo ships, carrying about 500 activists reportedly set to take part, instead of the at least 15 ships carrying thousands of activists originally planned.

Earlier this month, the Turkish Islamic charity IHH, which helped organise last year's flotilla with the Free Gaza Movement, withdrew the participation of the Mavi Marmara in this year's flotilla. The IHH, which is considered a terrorist organisation by Israel and the European Union, said the ship did not gain necessary approval from Turkish port authorities for technical reasons.

The flotilla ran into further problems this week. The departure date of flotilla ships from Greek ports was pushed off from the originally scheduled Tuesday launch due to a nationwide strike as a result of the Greek government's austerity measures. Meanwhile, one ship's propeller was cut off in what flotilla organisers called sabotage.

Several other ships, including the American-flagged Audacity of Hope, did not, at the time of our going to press, have clearance to leave their ports after thorough port authority inspections - some said more thorough than usual - and in the case of the American ship, an accusation that it was not seaworthy.

After two days of meetings, Israel's Security Cabinet on Monday ordered the Israel Defence Forces to prevent the flotilla from reaching Gaza, and also directed the Foreign Ministry to continue its diplomatic efforts to stop the flotilla from setting sail. The decision echoed statements made in recent days by Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu in which he said that he would not allow

flotilla ships to breach the block-

Israel has said it will take any humanitarian aid directly to Gaza if the flotilla ships are brought into an Israeli port. Israel also has secured an agreement from Egypt's interim government to allow the flotilla ships to unload their aid in the El Arish port and take it into Gaza, as the European aid group Miles of Smiles did last week, bringing 30 tons of aid into Gaza after landing in the Egyptian port.

Israeli Defence Minister Ehud Barak on Monday called the flotilla an "unnecessary provocation" and asserted that "there is no humanitarian crisis in Gaza".

The head of Israel's Government Press Office had threatened to deny entry to the country for 10 years to any journalist who participated in the flotilla, but the Israeli government quickly backed away from the threat.

Netanyahu on Monday ordered Israeli authorities to formulate a special procedure for journalists arrested on board the flotilla, saying that the policy for journalists covering the flotilla should not be the same as against infiltrators and those who entered Israel illegally. Several dozen journalists are registered to sail with the flotilla.

Members of the Israeli media and international journalists will be embedded in Israeli Navy vessels in contact with the flotilla "in order to create transparency and credible coverage of the events", according to a statement from the Prime Minister's Office.

Oren Helman, director of Israel's Government Press Office, had threatened the ban and other sanctions in a letter Sunday to members of the foreign press.

"I implore you to avoid taking part in this provocative and dangerous event, the purpose of which is to undermine Israel's right to defend itself and to knowingly violate Israeli law," he wrote.

Meanwhile, the US State Department had said in a state-

ment that Americans involved in the flotilla could face fines and jail upon their return. Flotilla participants "are taking irresponsible and provocative actions", the statement said.

At least 36 Americans were expected to be aboard the planned flotilla, including the Pulitzer Prize-winning novelist Alice Walker.

Walker said at a news confer-

ence on Monday that she was sailing with the flotilla because African Americans had been helped by outside communities when they had been slaves and when they had fought for civil rights.

The United States, Canada and the United Kingdom issued travel advisories that specifically warned citizens against attempting to enter Gaza by sea. (JTA)

Rabbi Craig Kacev receives Jewish education prize

THE MAX M Fisher Prize for Jewish Education in the Diaspora for 2011 will be awarded to Rabbi Craig Kacev of Johannesburg, and Rabbi Jacob Biderman of Vienna "in recognition of their vital contributions to the advancement of Jewish education in their communities"

The ceremony took place on June 28, at the Inbal Hotel, in Jerusalem.

The Max M Fisher Prize has been awarded annually since 1999 by the L A Pincus Fund for Jewish Education in the Diaspora. Max Fisher, founding chairman of the board of governors of the Jewish Agency for Israel, served as chairman of the Pincus Fund from 1977 through 2005. This fund, based in Jerusalem, is an independent foundation which supports new and innovative projects which advance Jewish education in communities throughout the world.

Rabbi Kacev grew up and received rabbinic ordination in South Africa. He is a graduate of the Senior Educators Programme of the Melton Centre at Hebrew University.

He has worked as director of Jewish studies for the South African Board of Jewish Education. Since 2003, he has served as general director of SABJE. He oversees the educational programme and administration of the King David Schools system, comprising five community schools, with an enrolment of 3 400.

Rabbi Kacev believes that the quality of teaching is the single most important factor related to school improvement. He therefore works to implement programmes to train teaching staff. Under his supervision, enrolment in the King David Schools has remained stable, even as the South African Jewish community has shrunk due to emigration.

Rabbi Kacev has initiated new curricula for teaching Hebrew and Jewish studies. A sophisticated dilemma curriculum for junior high school was developed with Pincus Fund support.

Rabbi Kacev works to make Israel a focus of high school learners and the percentage of King David learners attending post-high school programmes in Israel, is at an all-time high. During the past three years, Israel also has become the emigration destination of choice for King David parents.

MAZON DOLING OUT \$3 MILLION IN GRANTS TO FIGHT HUNGER

Daring 1976 Entebbe raid is remembered

JULY 4 marks the 35th anniversary of the Entebbe rescue in 1976 by Israel Defence Forces commandos, of 105 hostages held captive by Palestinian and German terrorists at Uganda's Entebbe Airport.

Like the stunning raid against Osama bin Laden in Abbottabad in Pakistan last month, commanded by veteran Navy Seal and head of Joint Operations Command, Vice Admiral William McRaven, Entebbe was one of history's most daring raids, which combined precision intelligence and operations well inside hostile territory.

The commandos had only minutes to penetrate a heavily guarded building, complete their mission and return safely to

who died in

Entebbe.

The Entebbe raid revolutionised the very concept of special forces operations. It is studied at US service academies and command colleges and deeply influenced the thinking of American commanders such as McRaven.

BRITAIN'S FIRST 'GREEN' JEWISH CEMETERY TO OPEN

(JTA) - Britain's first "green" Jewish cemetery will open later this year.

The environmentally friendly cemetery is being built by the Jewish Joint Burial Society in Cheshunt, a small town of 52,000 residents in Hertfordshire, north of London, The Mercury weekly newspaper reported.

The burial society serves 35 Reform, Liberal and Masorti (Conservative) congregations in the United Kingdom.

Called a "woodland" cemetery in Britain, it will incorporate graves into the natural setting of the surrounding woods. Coffins will be bio-degradable to decompose quickly, and small memorial plaques will be used instead of large headstones.

The cemetery will have room for about 10,000 burials, including a section for mixed-faith families.

A long-time friend of Israel, who has visited Israel many times and worked closely with Israel's special forces, McRaven, in his classic book "Case Studies in Special Operations Warfare", has an entire chapter on the Entebbe raid.

This information was revealed on June 22 by Michael Oren, Israel's ambassador to the United States, in Jewish Exponent.

Unlike the Osama bin Laden raid, where the US lost no soldiers, there was one fatality at Entebbe, that of commander Yonatan Netanyahu, brother of Israel's prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu.

On May 8 the prime minister visit-

ed his heroic brother's grave, in advance of Yom Hazikaron, to avoid inconveniencing the public on the next day because of the presence of a large security detail.

Israel's Memorial Day commemorates the more than 22 682 soldiers who have died defending the Jewish State from the "Islamonazi hoards hell-bent on the country's annihilation", in the words of quitenormal.wordpress.com.

Accompanied by his wife Sarah and their two sons Yair and Avner to the Mount Herzl military cemetery in Jerusalem, the prime minister said: "Each family that mourns a relative who fell in battle has a dear memory that lasts forever. On Memorial Day, all of the people of Israel unite in recognition and thanks to those who gave their lives for the

establishment and continuation of the State of Israel."

In a recent interview with CNN, Oren reported, Netanyahu said the death of his brother, Lieutenant-Colonel Yoni Netanyahu's death during the raid, had profoundly impacted on him.

"I think of my brother. I think of our children. I think of the Palestinian children. We could have a better world...a world of peace."

In a much publicised June 14, 2009 speech at Bar Ilan University in Tel Aviv, the prime minister said: "I know the terror of war, I participated in battles, I lost good friends who fell; I lost a brother, I saw the pain of bereaved families from up close; very many times. I do not want war. No one in Israel wants war" (renewamerica.com).

Being the bobba and asking "de kveshtions" in Yiddish and answering herself in English, she played the parts of the grandmother from Litta and the kugelly granddaughter from South Africa, constantly on her cell, to perfection. For example:

"Vat haf yu got der, darlink?" The reply was, an iPod.

"Vot is de anser to mine kveshtion?" The bobba asks again.

There is no answer. "Ven yu kom frum a kuntry ver dey didnt evn haf electricetay, vot can yu say?

An arrest warrant for a tyrant

THE INTERNATIONAL Criminal Court's (ICC) issuing on Monday of an arrest warrant for Libyan leader Muammar Gaddafi, his son Saif al-Islam and the country's intelligence head Abdullah al-Senussi for orchestrating crimes against humanity during the pro-democracy uprising, including killing, injuring, arrest and imprisonment of hundreds of civilians, will be celebrated by advocates of universal humanitarian law. Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch both welcomed the move.

Gaddafi - who has held power since 1969 – is the second serving head of state to be issued with an ICC arrest warrant – the first was in 2009 against Sudanese President Omar al-Bashir over alleged crimes in Darfur.

People who are puzzled by the ongoing international barrage of accusations against Israel of being an immoral regime, might wonder whether such propaganda is beginning to be passé in the face of the horrors in Libya, Syria, Sudan and other places. Israel is an open society. Its openness - like any democracy - makes it, ironically, an easy target.

Despotic rulers may manipulate their public image for a long time - as Zimbabwean President Robert Mugabe has done in our own neighbourhood – but eventually the truth has to be exposed.

With the "Arab Spring", it seems the Arab masses are no longer willing to tolerate their repressive leaders as they have done until now. Young Arabs have similar aspirations to their counterparts in Western countries, and a yearning for their voices to be heard.

From a cynical perspective, it can take an appalling act of barbarism - like that in Libya - to bring home the true nature of some of these countries.

Another shocking accusation against Gaddafi has been heard – that Libyan soldiers used rape as a weapon at his insistence. The ICC has yet to include this on the charge sheet, but there is pressure for it. The matter has been raised in the UN Security Council. In April the US ambassador, Susan Rice, said some Libyan troops were issued with the impotency drug Viagra.

The ICC's chief prosecutor, Luis Moreno-Ocampo, has claimed Viagra was given to Libyan troops as part of an official policy of rape - a crime against humanity. He said the question until recently was whether Gaddafi himself could be associated with the rapes, or whether they happened "in the barracks". But information now seemed to show Gaddafi himself "decided (to authorise the rapes)".

Isn't it strange that we hear so little from Israel's loudest critics regarding the atrocities in Libya and Syria? The UN, EU and Nato have acted decisively against Gaddafi, but in Africa generally - and on our own turf in South Africa - the condemnation seems uncomfortably muted.

President Jacob Zuma's visit last May to Gaddafi – where they hugged each other and Zuma called him "Brother Leader", a title Gaddafi has conferred on himself and with the ANC's historical bond with Libya dating from the struggle years against apartheid – seems a little embarrassing today, a symbol of the African Union's (AU) impotence to promote peace and justice on its own continent.

Closer to home, the AU has not succeeded in doing anything constructive about Mugabe either. The AU, rightly, wants to be relevant, but unfortunately it seems it is not.

SABC radio news has reported that Zuma disapproves of the ICC arrest warrant. Presidential spokesman Zizi Kodwa told the SABC: "President Zuma is extremely disappointed and concerned on the issuing of (a) warrant by the ICC against Colonel Gaddafi."

He said the warrant undermined the AU ad hoc committee on Libya's work. Chaired by Mauritanian President Mohamed Ould Abdel Azizhas and containing the heads of state of the Republic of Congo, Mali, Uganda and South Africa, the committee has interacted with Gaddafi and the TNC leadership in Tripoli and Benghazi.

Sadly, Africa comes out of this cruel mess in Libya looking indecisive and mediocre. Where is our government's leadership on this issue? Where does South Africa stand? And when will old allegiances lose their credibility in the face of new and shocking revelations?

Delta Saudi flap leaves questions of openness to Jewish flyers

THE SAUDI government wants you to know: It doesn't ban visits by Jews.

Whether the Saudis make travel difficult for Jews, particularly when it comes to those who have Israel stamps on their passports or come carrying religious items like tefillin, is another question entirely.

The issue of Saudi policy vis-à-vis Jews emerged last week after World Net Daily, a conservative website, reported that Delta Airlines was enforcing a Saudi ban on Jewish visitors by partnering with Saudi Arabian Airlines. The report sparked a round of angry demands directed at Delta and at the Saudi Embassy in Washington.

"Rumours being circulated via the Internet regarding passenger flight restrictions on Saudi Arabian Airlines are completely false," the Saudi Embassy said in a two-sentence statement sent last Friday to JTA and other news agencies. "The Government of Saudi Arabia does not deny visas to US citizens based on their religion."

Yet Jewish defence organisations say that in practice, Saudi authorities make it very difficult for Jews to visit the country.

The Delta flap began when a Jewish passenger, Washington attorney Jeffrey Lovitky, asked Delta what the implications were for Jewish passengers of Saudi Arabian Airlines joining the Sky Team Alliance on January 10. The alliance, which includes Delta, facilitates flights on multiple carriers.

The arrangement is not unusual: Other alliances mix US and Saudi carriers.

But Delta's response touched a nerve when the airline appeared to shuck off any responsibility for Saudi Arabia's allegedly discriminatory policies.

"While we fully understand and sympathise with your concerns, Delta has no control over the actions of the United States or any foreign country," Kathy Johnston, a customer care staffer, wrote to Lovitky in an April 28 letter.

"If the government of Saudi Arabia engages in discriminatory practices in the issuance of travel documents to US citizens, this is a matter which must be addressed with a local embassy as appropriate or with the US State Department."

Jewish organisations wondered whether that meant Delta staffers were asking passengers with Jewish-sounding names if they had properly obtained visas to visit the country.

"They've joined in this policy of discrimination," Kenneth Bandler, a spokesman for the American Jewish Committee, told

On the Huffington Post, Rabbi Jason Miller of Detroit excoriated the airline for attempting to pass the buck.

"No, it's not Delta's fault that the Saudi government is anti-Semitic, but it doesn't have to go along with it," he wrote. "It's as if the Saudis are telling Delta that when it comes to Jewish passengers, its name should become an acronym: "Don't Even Let Them Aboard."

As other media, including Religion News Service, picked up the story, Delta tried to do damage control.

"We, like all international airlines, are



required to comply with all applicable laws governing entry into every country we serve," Trebor Banstetter, a Delta spokesman, wrote in a blog post. "You as passengers are responsible for obtaining the necessary travel documents, such as visas and certification of required vaccinations, and we're responsible for making sure that you have the proper documentation before you board."

No one was mollified, and Senator Mark Kirk (Republican Illinois) asked the Federal Aviation Authority to investigate.

"I request your investigation into this matter to determine whether Delta Airlines violated US law or regulation and to ensure no US citizen is denied their right to fly solely on the basis of their religion," he wrote in a letter last Friday.

Within hours, Delta came out with its third statement, this time noting that its arrangement with the Saudi airline was commonplace.

"Delta's only agreement with Saudi Arabian Airlines is a standard industry interline agreement, which allows passengers to book tickets on multiple carriers, similar to the standard interline agreements American Airlines, US Airways and Alaska Airlines have with Saudi Arabian Airlines," it said.

"All of the three global airline alliances - Star, which includes United Airlines; Oneworld, which includes American Airlines, and SkyTeam, which includes Delta - have members that fly to Saudi Arabia and are subject to that country's rules governing entry."

Religion News Service subsequently retracted much of its earlier story, noting that it is not Saudi policy to deny entry to travellers with an Israeli stamp in their passports.

The US State Department's travel advisory for Saudi Arabia warns that reports of such denials persist.

"There have been reports by US citizens that they were refused a Saudi visa because their passports reflected travel to Israel or indicated that they were born in Israel," it said.

The State Department website also includes lengthy warnings to Americans of Arab origin that they may be subject to intensive questioning by Israel at its crossings and may even be turned away. It also notes that these policies derive

from security considerations, and from Israel's complex customs and entry agreements with the Palestinian Authority.

The Anti-Defamation League said that the Saudi policies were especially burdensome for Jewish travellers.

"Saudi Arabia's past practice of banning travellers with an 'Israel' stamp in their passport from gaining entry into the country runs contrary to the spirit and intent of Delta's non-discrimination policy" the ADL said

cy," the ADL said.

"While this practice affects all travellers who previously visited Israel, it has a disproportionate impact on Jewish passengers.

"Moreover, Saudi Arabia also bars anyone from bringing into Saudi Arabia religious ritual objects, including religious texts, from any faith other than Islam, effectively banning religiously observant Jews from entering the country."

The ADL wants all airlines that partner with those that fly to Saudi Arabia to make their practices clear.

In a statement the ADL said: "We expect Delta, and any other American airline which flies to Riyadh or partners with an airline that flies there, to ensure that its passengers - whatever their faith not be discriminated against, and that no American airline in any way enable, or facilitate this discrimination, whatever the regulations of Saudi Arabia." Bandung Conference: Now time for a 'NAM peace initiative'

ISRAELI DIPLOMATS were on their way to Indonesia but were refused entry in April 1955; Jerusalem hoped to participate in the Bandung Conference.

At the time, leaders of 29 young Asian and African

states convened, desiring to formulate a new narrative in the history of mankind, to shed the yoke of colonialism through the struggle for liberation and political independence.

In the Bandung Conference the foundations were laid for the Asian-African bloc, later (1961) to become the Nonaligned Movement. Oratorical speeches were electrifying. When repeatedly standing ovations were given to Jawaharlal Nehru, Kwame Nkrumah and Gamal Abdel Nasser, the 2 000 deputies present elevated their three heroes into stardom, catapulting them into the ranks of world leaders.

Nasser used the Bandung podium to pull out his Palestinian card. He was bitter about the defeat in 1948 of three Arab armies (against Israel), including that of Egypt, while on a mission to enforce a reverse of the UNGA resolution 181 creating Israel within the "two state solution".

He vetoed Israel from participating in Bandung; he wanted the stage for himself. He wanted Israel to be denied international legitimacy.

But, Israel, the young Jewish State, had something to say about the struggle for liberation and independence. After all, only a decade after the Holocaust destroyed one third of us, Israel - seven years old - already showed early signs of promise.

However, two years after Bandung, Israel launched its most successful diplomatic initiative - either through its trade unions (the Afro-Asian Institute) or through the state-funded International Co-operation Department of the MFA (MASHAV), by which it coincidentally followed the Bandung vision of technical co-operation in health, education, water and agriculture.

The first of many to entertain Israeli technical assistance was Ghana, after declaring its independence in 1957.

In spite of the efforts and goodwill invested in MASHAV among members of the Nonaligned Movement, Israel is still denied the international recognition and legitimacy it deserves as a full member of the United Nations.

Unlike Bandung, the denial is not linked to its very existence anymore, but to the creation of the State of Palestine on territories occupied by Israel in 1967.

In March 2002 Lebanon, a prominent participant in Bandung at the time, hosted the Arab Summit. Saudi Arabia put a peace initiative on the table, proposing peace and normalisation between Israel and the entire Arab world, provided the Palestine-Israel and Syria-Israel conflicts are resolved territorially and otherwise by agreement between the parties.

The Saudi plan was adopted by the summit and became the "Arab Peace Initiative".

Since the Bandung Conference, Israel faces diplomatic isolation in multilateral organisations and forums where the NAM (Nonaligned Movement) consistently recruits its members to vote against it. One can cynically call it the "anti-Israel automatic majority"; one may as well also call it the "flat earth majority".

With the creation of the rainbow nation, overnight South Africa became a prominent leader of the NAM, with substantial influence in multilateral forums. So far, South Africa has dogmatically used its leverage against Israel, consistently contributing to its isolation and vulnerability.

I implore South Africa to take a Uturn and offer Jerusalem a deal: Accept the Arab Peace Initiative as a base for negotiations. The NAM then will widen the Arab Peace Initiative and transform it into a NAM Peace Initiative.

This move will open new horizons for peace in the Middle East, and reverse the anti-Israel NAM "automatic majority" voting patterns at the UN.

It will be a symbolic invitation, however delayed, for Israel to join the Bandung Conference.

HAMAS REJECTS GERMAN MEDIATOR'S OFFER ON SHALIT

JERUSALEM - Hamas has rejected a German-mediated offer to free Gilad Shalit that had been accepted by the Israeli government.

Hamas political bureau deputy chief Mousa Mohammed Abu Marzouk in an interview with the Al Hayat newspaper, called the offer "unjust" and said the German mediator "endorsed the unfair and unjust positions of the Zionist government", according to reports

Hamas would no longer negotiate with the German mediator, he added.

"There is no chance that the German mediator will return because he is not carrying out his duties and is failing in his mission," Marzouk said.

"We all expected that he would present a fair and not extreme position. But instead of trying to reduce the demands of the Israeli government, he accepted its terms."

A German government spokesman confirmed on Monday that Israel had accepted the mediator's proposal for the release of Shalit, an Israeli soldier who was captured in a cross-border raid near Gaza in June 2006, The Associated Press reported.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said on Sunday that Israel had accepted the deal and was awaiting Hamas' response. Netanyahu did not specify the terms of the proposal.

"This proposal was harsh; it was not simple for the State of Israel," Netanyahu said in a statement released after the weekly Cabinet meeting. "However, we agreed to accept it in the belief that it was balanced between our desire to secure Gilad's release and to prevent possible harm to the lives and security of the Israeli people.

"As of now, we have yet to receive Hamas's official answer to the German mediator's proposal.

The statement said: "The State of Israel is ready to go far, more than any other country, in order to secure Gilad's release." (JTA)

THIS ROLLICKING bit of Victorian frippery enjoys an easy heightening of the silliness factor in its reduction which tosses any modicum of sentimentality out the window.

Written for 10 principles and choruses of cops, pirates and daughters, respectively, this version has a cast of but five men (six, including Rowan Bakker onstage, at the piano). But such men are they, that the tale of leap-year births, soft-hearted pirates, frighteningly ugly girls and proper manners, holds together with hilarity and aplomb, albeit with many costume changes and some inanimate bystanders.

Gilbert and Sullivan comic operas were so infused in popular culture that they lent themselves well to amateur interpretation, which and an utterly astonishing vocal range. Brandon

Show: Gilbert and Sullivan's "The Pirates of makes this professional potted account unusual. Aside from some acoustic issues in the theatre, making music and lyrics often fight for aural dominance rather than play nicely, it's a joyous romp not to be missed.

Most famous among the repertoire is the Major-General's song and the Policeman's song, also known as "When a Felon's Not Engaged in his Employment", which Danny Kaye made his own in 1949.

Tempered by crisp arrangements, lung-bursting tempi and lyrics that take the piss out of the properness of Victorian society, these songs would have had the man in the street in 1880 rolling about the aisles as much as it will have you, not least because of superb performances: watching James Borthwick deadpan as Kate is enough to justify the drive to Sandton.

Moreover, it is how this cast of mostly seasoned professionals lends their individual roles such seriousness that gives them three-dimensional conviction.

The combination of Jonathan Taylor's physical and musical hilarity with that of the inimitable David Dennis - as versatile in his Shakespearean finesse as he is as Frederic's nursery maid Ruth, who at 47 has distressingly fallen in love with her charge - is one delicious surprise; others are the younger cast members red-bearded Clinton Hawks as Mabel, the love interest of Frederic, with astute Victorian gaiety

The cherry on top, however, is Bakker way out there at the keyboard. On opening night, a throwaway aside uttered from within the confines of his bonnet set the cast corpsing and the audience into spontaneous hysteria.

With its unique logic and dated story, this production withstands the test of time away from the humdrum of real life.

RONIT JUDELMAN and Ann Gollifer, by virtue of the works they show together and apart, leave you uncomfortable in a manner that makes you think rather than dismiss.

Judelman's 11 installations are shown in the gallery's downstairs space. Hard boiled in their technical veracity and polish, they reflect as much subtlety as those famous war snaps of atrocity think of that image of the shooting of a Viet Cong suspect by a South Vietnamese police chief, taken by Vo Suu and Eddie Adams in 1968, or the horrific photographs taken during Operation Barbarossa in the early Second World War years.

Judelman's pieces are devoid of fingerable context, however. There's a hint of graveyard humour, but the work is so direct it hits you dead on target, leaving scant breathing space for discourse.

Born in Paris, raised in Israel and educated in Israel and South Africa, Judelman trained as a clinical psychologist, and graduated in fine art from Unisa in 2009.

The works speak of contemporary impromptu

leaving you bludgeoned emotionally: "Baby Doll" comprises nine commercial plastic dolls, translated flawlessly into solid transparent resin, suspended from the ceiling.

Each doll's torso is filled with a plastic replica of a hand grenade. Similarly, in "Crayons" we find an array of units, all in a complicated, teetering row - in sparkly purple, hot pink, green and glitter, a range of colours. But these are no crayons.

They're cast bullets. The guns shoot tiny replicas of people. "Bim Bum Bombs" is about playing games with colourful objects that are in fact bombs. This high resolution directness comments shatteringly on commercialism with as much definition as it does on war.

Next you ascend the ramp leading to Circa's large oval space, where you find seven evenly spaced vertical paintings by British Guiana-born, Botswana resident Ann Gollifer. Dedicated to the life of Bessie Head, and to her father-in-law Dr Gus Nilsson, but like the work of modernist Mark Rothko in a reduced way, these works have in common a horizon line, each indicates a possible landscape; it is their sameness and difference that is at once enthralling and pedestrian.

Gollifer plays with the chemical compounds forming the colours; she dances with and challenges the drying process of each to be different.

You walk into this space, and feel its silence; you

need to be able to fall into these works, to be engulfed in their personal sense of wonder, to hear Tibetan singing bowl music as you gaze at them, but it is their odd formats - the 2m high, 1m wide punctures into fantasy worlds that seem to push you away as they tease you to believe in

All Good Things

Ryan Gosling is doing some very good things with his career - even though some of the films in which he appears are deeply depressing. "All Good Things" is one of them.

Around the turn of this century, American newspapers published a host of stories about the bizarre saga of Robert Durst, the scion of a very prominent Manhattan real estate family who was charged with murder in Texas.

Durst, who was arrested while dressed in drag

and attempting to get rid of an elderly neighbour's dismembered body, hadn't been seen since 1981. That was when authorities identified him as a suspect in the disappearance of his wife, Katie, who was declared legally dead in 2001.

Director Andrew Jarecki's compelling docudrama implies that Durst murdered his wife, but this unsolved crime turns out to be less mysterious than trying to penetrate the mind of the eccentric killer, a role which Ryan Gosling manages to convey with subdued nervous energy.

Durst was acquitted of the Texas killing on grounds of self-defence. He has never been charged with his wife's disappearance - or with the murder of his best friend, in California, at about the same time as his neighbour's demise.

The film avoids the use of real names and though the production notes indicate that the film was "inspired" by the Durst case, those in the know say it follows many of the facts closely. What Jarecki and his co-writers Mark Smerling and Marcus Hinchey, have done is to blend the spellbinding narrative with a healthy dose of provocative speculation.

The story details David's repeated clashes with his tycoon father who wants him to stop taking drugs and to work for the company as a rent collector, which involves collecting payments from a group of sleazy Times Square properties, owned by the family. His younger, more reliable brother has been earmarked as the father's successor, a move that doesn't unduly perturb David.

The family frowned upon David's decision to marry the down-market, Katie (Kirsten Dunst) and their decision to move to Vermont where they opened a small health food store called "All Good Things"

Things were fine for a while, but circumstances and David's growing paranoia brought them back to the New York area, where David began to physically abuse Katie until she asked for a divorce.

Katie's earlier moments of bliss took a chilling turn when she came to realise that the kind, quietly spoken David was just one side to a very disturbed and secretive individual.

At the end, it's not hard to believe that, according to a report, the Durst family are suing the filmmakers.



Romanticism of a Jewish weddings in Mauritius

The beautiful and romantic island of Mauritius has proved the ideal spot for weddings and some of them could be straight out of a Hollywood movie.

COUPLES FLY in from all over the world to celebrate this happy occasion, with a large percentage of them being South Africans.

Sugar Beach Resort, one of the island's most established holiday destinations, has been specialising in Jewish weddings for over seven years. The famous "Travelling Rabbi", Rabbit Moshe Silberhaft, is on hand to officiate at the chuppah and the hotel also boasts a chef, Mauree Dhoovassen, who has been well schooled in the kosher preparations for the happy event

by the rabbi.

Dhoovassen, who has been 14 years with the hotel, said he had been preparing kosher food for weddings for the past eight years.

He has in his possession all the requirements needed for the food preparation, including the type of products that can be used. And Rabbi Silberhaft is always on hand to make sure everything goes according to strict kashrut requirements.

The first Jewish wedding was celebrated at Sugar Beach in November 2004 and so far they have celebrated 11 on the property, with a maximum of

80 guests attending.

The hotel's assistant sales manager, Isabelle Pernal, who takes care of the wedding arrangements, says the weddings in Mauritius are genuine and legally recognised.

Guests need to go through all the legal procedures. All the documents, she said, should be sent at least eight weeks before arriving in Mauritius and have to go to Port-Louis three working days before the wedding date.

Both bride and groom should not be a citizen of Mauritius, as otherwise the wedding will have to take place at the Civil Status Office in Port-Louis. Taking into account that the Civil Status Office is closed on Saturdays and Sundays, weddings are only celebrated from Monday to Friday, in late afternoon (15:00 - 16:00) as it is a cooler time of the day.

The light is also better for photographs, and one can take full advantage of some amazing sunsets.

If one is planning a Mauritius wedding, there are a number of legal requirements to which one need adhere.

A minimum residency period required prior to marriage is three working days and a minimum age is 18 years.





If a person is under 18, parental consent is required in the form of an affidavit stamped by a notary. One will need passport copies (pages containing passport number, photo, issue/expiry dates) and birth certificates.

If a person is single, an affidavit is required to declare single status and if divorced a "Decree Absolute".

If the bride has been divorced less than 300 days before the wedding, then a mandatory pregnancy test in resort is required.


If the person is widowed, the former spouse's death certificate and previous marriage certificate is needed and if adopted, an adoption certificate is required.

If a person's name has been changed by deed poll legal proof is required, stamped and signed by a solicitor. For Jewish weddings, the chuppah usually takes place on the beach, followed by pre-dinner drinks during sunset with Israeli and Mediterranean snacks.

Finally, the kosher menu is limited to fish only as the hotel is not equipped with a kosher kitchen, nor has it sufficient material to cook an alternative meal.

It must be noted that a number of the kosher ingredients and items have to be brought to the island from Johannesburg as they are not available in Mauritius.

LAST WEEK, in my capacity as representative of the Jewish community, I had the rare privilege of joining various dignitaries and leaders in meeting with Michelle Obama, who was paying her first visit to South Africa.

After we had all been personally introduced to her, she spoke briefly about what it meant to her to be in the country. What was striking was how obviously sincere Mrs Obama's enthusiasm was.

IRAN TESTS MISSILES CAPABLE OF REACHING ISRAEL, US BASES

TEHRAN - Iran has reportedly tested are capable of reaching Israel and US

Tuesday's firing of the missiles came on the second day of the Revolutionary Guards' war games.

The day before, Iran's military displayed on national television underground missile silos programmed to hit predetermined targets with medium- and long-range missiles, including Israel and US bases in the Middle East, in the event of an attack.

Gen Amir Ali Hajizadeh, commander medium- and long-range missiles that of the Revolutionary Guards Air Force, told the English-language semi-official Iranian news service Fars that the United States and Israel were Iran's only enemies, "and other than that we are not threatened by any nation. Our missile range is designed according to the location of the American bases in the region and that of the Zionist regime".

Hajizadeh called the war games, codenamed "Great Prophet 6", a "message of peace and friendship to countries of the region". (JTA)







Anton seeks fifth July win with Bravura

LAST YEAR Bravura was the talk of the Vodacom Durban July. He was unbeaten in five starts and was rated the best threeyear-old in the country. Unfortunately he was injured during a training gallop that put him out of racing for almost nine

He returned to racing in November last year but did not run well and it appeared that the Joey Ramsden-trained runner was never going to regain his former glory. However, patience is a virtue in racing and Ramsden's perseverance paid

Bravura arrived in KwaZulu-Natal for the season and bounced back to best to win a Pinnacle Stakes over 1500m at Clairwood and followed that up with a long-head second to Dancewiththedevil in the Grade 1 Gold Challenge over 1600m, also at Clairwood.

That run made him a strong contender for this year's R3-million Durban July to be run over 2200m at Grevville at the weekend. He is now at 4-1 and the second favourite for South Africa's most prestigious race.

Anton Marcus gets the ride and will be hoping that this son of Silvano can give him a record-breaking fifth Durban July victory. Anton has won the big race on four occasions, a record he holds jointly with the great Tiger Wright.

His wins have come aboard Dancing Duel (1993), El Picha (2000), Dunford (2005) and Hunting Tower (2007)

For those who do not remember Tiger Wright, his four victories came from piloting home Silver Phantom in 1942, Brookhill (1947), Milesia Pride (1949) and Preto's Crown (1955).

At one stage Anton appeared to be in a bit of a quandary as to which runner he should ride in the Durban July as he also had the option of Galileo's Destiny, a decent three-year-old trained by champion trainer Mike de Kock. Anton is retained by owner Markus Jooste and he is involved in both horses.

It appears that one of his concerns was the fact that Bravura had only raced on a left-turning track and Anton was not sure how he would handle Greyville with its long right-handed bend.

The other issue was the weight. Bravura carries 57,5kg, a comfortable riding weight for the current champion jockey. If he was to ride Galileo's Destiny, who carried just 53kg, he would have to spend hours shedding a few kilogrammes.

In the end, and not surprisingly, he sided with Bravura who looks to have a very decent chance of winning the race.

Standing in his way are a bunch of De Kock runners, particularly super filly Igugu. She has run nine times for seven wins and two seconds and this Australianbred daughter of Galileo is getting better with every run.

Many pundits say that with 55kg she carries too much weight for a three-yearold filly, but she is a superstar. She recently became the first runner in South African racing history to win the Triple Tiara, a series of three races over 1600m, 1800m and 2450m, all run over a space of two months. She won the Fillies Guineas by four lengths, the SA Fillies Classic by 10,75 lengths and the SA Oaks by 5,75

De Kock and jockey Anthony Delpech, believe she has the ability to win this race and one has to respect their judgement.

It is also interesting to note that Anton and Anthony are fighting it out for the champion jockeys' title this year. Delpech has a four-win lead and with the season ending on July 31, a win in the Durban July will be of paramount importance.

It will be hard to separate the pair and luck in running on the day will play an important part.

Anybody looking for other Jewish interest in the race could also have a flutter on Castlethorpe. He is trained by Mike Bass who will be missing two of his great stalwarts from the race - Pocket Power and River Jetez. Pocket Power has retired, while his full sister has been campaigning with success overseas


Castlethorpe is owned by Lionel Cohen, who has taken out a trainer's licence in Australia, and Robert Bloomberg. It is interesting that he finished fourth in the Gold Challenge, in which Bravura ran second, and was just three lengths behind him. He is now 3kg better off and over this distance, that weight turnaround is Castlethorpe's favour.

He is well drawn at three, while Bravura is in the middle of the field at No 11. He is also at 33-1 while Bravura is at 4-1. There is some doubt as to whether Castlethorpe will see out 2200m but as the Tote is paying six places on this year's race – as long as 18 or more runners start the race there could be some value in an each-way bet on this Australian-bred runner.

From my personal point of view, I am going with Igugu to edge out Bravura with Pierre Jourdan in third and The Apache for fourth.

Wimbledon goes kosher

LONDON - The new roof above Centre Court was not the only thing to debut at Wimbledon three years ago.

The Chabad tennis barbeque at Wimbledon first opened for business in 2008, and like the roof it is slowly finding its place at SW19.

Conceived and run by Rabbi Dovid Cohen, the food stand, which sells both hamburgers and hot dogs, as well as strawberries and (pareve) ice cream, is aimed to provide a kosher option for Wimbledon-goers while also hopefully raising money for the activities of Chabad of South London.

After operating from the driveway of the Cohens in the first year, the stand relocated next to "The Queue" at the All England Club for the last two championships and has been feeding the masses, whether Jewish or just plain hungry, ever since.

"We were new to the area and realised how close we were to the tennis so it seemed to be too good an opportunity to miss," said Rabbi Cohen, who in the autumn of 2008 arrived in South London and began setting up Chabad activities in campuses.

'We are very pleased with how things are going. If we make any profit, it goes into our outreach work with students on campus. Last year we held a small fundraiser to cover some of the costs, but hopefully we will make a bit of money this year and get some money back into the charity." Jerusalem Post
