

PERES AND AMAR: EXPRESS DISSENT **OVER MILITARY SERVICE WITH**

JERUSALEM - Instead of expressing hatred, arguments over drafting haredi Orthodox men in the Israeli army should be expressed with brotherly love, Israel's president and the Sephardic chief rabbi said last Sunday.

Shimon Peres and Shlomo Amar met on Sunday morning at the president's residence in Jerusalem to discuss the coming legislation for universal military service.

"There is no room for fostering hatred," Amar said, citing the fact that Jews are currently observing the Three Weeks, a mourning period between the fast of the 17th of Tammuz and the fast of the 9th of Av. Peres also called for the end of hatred and extremism, according to reports.

Amar said that the haredi yeshiva students believed they were giving their lives in defence of the Jewish State through their Torah study.

The rabbi also reportedly said that he believed more haredi youth would be willing to serve in the army over time. (JTA)

EXTREMIST HAREDI ORTHODOX PROTEST UNIVERSAL CONSCRIPTION

JERUSALEM - Thousands of members of a haredi Orthodox sect protested Monday evening in Jerusalem against a planned universal military ser-

The members of the extremist Eda Haredit sect does not recognise secular law.

The protest reportedly began with prayer and continued with young children marching chained to each other carrying signs that said "Save me".

Knesset Speaker Reuven Rivlin said earlier on Monday that he would extend the Knesset's current session, and not send lawmakers on summer break, until a conscription law that includes the haredi Orthodox was drafted.

In February, the Israeli Supreme Court declared that the Tal Law, which allowed haredi Orthodox men to defer service indefinitely, to be unconstitutional, and set August 1 as the deadline for a new law to be passed. (JTA)

The Three Weeks mourning period for the destruction of both our temples begins in early July, bookended by two fast days: 17th of Tammuz which signifies the beginning of the destruction and the 9th of Av ("Tisha B'Av) representing their cul-

In the fast-day Haftorah, Isaiah implores the Jewish people: "Dirshu Hashem, seek G-d, where He is to be found; call to Him when He is near."

The prophet adjures us to seek G-d where He is found, because often, in our search for Him, we gravitate to the light pole. We hope to find Him in the tranquility of shul; we expect to find Him in the

self-satisfaction of our latest mitzvah.

But when the holy Rebbe of Kotzk was once asked where is G-d, he roared in response: "Where is G-d?! Wherever you let Him in!"

Indeed, the prophet provides us with an address when he challenges us to "seek G-d", because it is through the seeking - the inner heart-struggle of a Jew - that one lets Hashem in.

How often do you allow opportunities to pass you by? Maybe you're one of those who then shrug their shoulders as they repeat some cliché - "it wasn't meant to be' or, "ignorance is bliss"?

But the Talmud declares that anyone who does not merit seeing the Temple rebuilt, it's as if they themselves destroyed

The three weeks are about taking responsibility for all those things that could and should have been. We mourn for struggles lost and for the missed opportunities that litter our pathway to heaven. And we commit ourselves to seeing through the next challenge; to finding G-d in the next

Many years ago G-d went into hiding, and man began to truly search. It is to the relentless seeker that Hashem promises enlightenment and blessing.

MacShane to be keynote speaker at Board's Gauteng conference

Rising levels of anti-Semitism the world over, whether in its traditional form or under the guise of political anti-Zionism, is by no means solely a Jewish concern. Since the turn of the widely accused of being at best in denial and century in particular, a growing number of political leaders and civil libertarians from the greater global community have become involved in the campaign to confront the menace.

Among other initiatives, there is now an Inter-Parliamentary Coalition to Combat Anti-Semitism (IPCCA), comprising mainly non-Jewish parliamentarians from across the globe that meets on an annual basis to share information and strategise for the future.

One of those who have been especially active in the field, is Dr Denis MacShane, MP, former Minister for Europe in Tony Blair's Labour administration and a leading expert on global and European affairs in the House of Commons.

MacShane will shortly be visiting South Africa under the auspices of the SAJBD and will be the keynote speaker at the Board's Gauteng Council conference on September 2.

Prior to his entering Parliament in 1994, MacShane was involved in the Anti-Apartheid Movement, particularly through his work on behalf of the independent black trade union movement (specifically with Cosatu) in South Africa.

He made regular trips to the country, inter

alia organising legal support for local trade unionist leaders like Moses Mayekiso. In 1984, he co-authored Power! Black Workers, their Unions and the Struggle for Freedom in SA.

Today, the political and academic Left is at worst actively complicit regarding the rise of anti-Semitism. By contrast MacShane, notwithstanding his leftwing background, has emerged as among the most active and eloquent opponents of that age-old scourge.

He regularly raises the issue in the House of Commons and in 2006 chaired the UK all-party Parliamentary Inquiry into Anti-Semitism. He was among the founders of the IPCCA.

Further afield, he has lectured on the topic at British, French, American and Canadian universities and works with British and European Jewish groups, focusing especially on the need to educate children on the Holocaust.

MacShane is the author of Globalising Hatred: the New Anti-Semitism, which appeared in 2008. He is also a noted analyst on European political affairs, with his articles having appeared in such well-known international publications as Newsweek, the Guardian, Wall Street Journal, le Monde, El Pais and Die Welt.

Religious leaders express views on e-tolling

E-tolling is the controversial buzzword across the country, since the outrage over the South African Roads Agency Limited (Sanral's) e-tolling proposal for Gauteng freeways. It is a catalyst that continues to spark heated debate among South Africans from across the spectrum.

Government has landed itself in a pickle, having misjudged the almost unanimous opposition to the e-toll proposal – with even alliance partner, Cosatu, coming out strongly on the side of the protesters.

Chief Rabbi Warren Goldstein recently attended a high profile meeting alongside several of the country's leaders, to put forward his views on the matter. The meeting was requested by the deputy president and chairman of the ministerial e-tolling committee, Kgalema Motlanthe.

Motlanthe invited an elite panel of representatives from the country's religious leaders and governmental experts. The participants included the likes of Minister of Finance Pravin Gordhan, Deputy Minister of Finance Nhlanhla Musa Nene, Deputy Minister of Transport Sindisiwe Lydia Chikunga, and Sanral's CEO, Nazir Ali.

The meeting criticised the lack of adequate consultation during this whole e-tolling saga. This was acknowledged by the government delegation who recognised this by creating a new platform of open discussion to thrash the issue

Motlanthe spearheaded the meeting with a clear agenda to create dialogue and exchange ideas, allowing invitees to share their insights and listen to their views on the topic from the perspective of their respective communities and of society as a whole.

Gordhan presented the reasons for the government's mandate for e-tolling, explaining that the tax would be used as maintenance for the roads and infrastructure in the country. He also mentioned that there was already a budget deficit in the country's main budget, related to the world's economic implosion in 2008 and that e-tolling would help paying back this debt.

In an Interview with the Jewish Report, the Chief Rabbi said he had stressed in the meeting the importance of taking into account that many people are facing financial pressures and hardships in their personal lives, and many business are also struggling.

Israel's Olympics dilemma: stand out or blend in

It is 40 years since 11 Israeli athletes were murdered by the Black September Palestinian group at the Munich Olympics in 1972. As the 2012 Games prepare to get underway in London on July 27, Munich's shadow looms over it, especially with concerns about inadequate British security personnel being trained.

The current conflict-ridden state of the world and Arab countries' efforts to delegitimise Israel's existence, adds another ominous tone. And in the past four decades, suicide bombings have become such "everyday occurrences", with martyrdom attached to them, that a terror attack is probably even more likely today than in '72. The fanatics who perpetrate such deeds cannot be bought off and don't care about death.

Hindsight is an exact science. It is easy, looking back, to see the flaws in the German security apparatus in 1972. Israel's security experts expressed concern at the housing set-up of its athletes and the Germans promised extra precautions. But it couldn't prevent what happened, particularly when athletes were climbing over the housing compound walls at will in a spir-

The West at the time was "innocent", compared with today. An atrocity like a massacre at the Olympics was almost unimaginable. Now, after 9/11 in New York, the London and Madrid train bombings and others, innocence has been replaced by cynicism - that there are no red lines terrorists will not cross. Nor is there a guaranteed way to secure against them. There is always a loophole somewhere.

Much support has been given to a call for a minute's silence at this year's Games to remember the slain Israelis, but it is unlikely to happen. Even Alex Gilady, the Israeli member of the IOC, opposes it, saying he does not want to give Israel's enemies an excuse to boycott the Games. If this happened, many people would point to Israel as the "party-spoiler".

In response, Israel's Sport and Culture Minister Limor Livnat, said angrily that the attitude would be different if the athletes weren't Israelis or Jews.

There are two clear sides among Israel's supporters: one insists on a minute's silence as a symbolic token of remembrance, saying that if this is not done, it is akin to glossing over an outrage of huge significance and a betrayal of the Israeli athletes; the other doesn't want Israel to be spotlighted, but to be there as one team among many, a "normal" country participating in the world's greatest sporting event. The minute's silence, they say, would highlight Israel's "abnormality" and take it out of the "brotherhood of nations".

From the perspective of Arab and other Muslim countries, if they remain in the stadium and participate in the minute's silence, they would implicitly acknowledge that what happened was unacceptable - that Israel was done a gross wrong. They might well choose to walk out instead. If this happens, it will take the gloss off the Games itself, and the 2012 London Olympics will be remembered as the one which fell apart, rather than for its sporting achievements.

(At the time of the Munich massacre only Jordan - among all the Arab nations - spoke out against this atrocity.)

The IOC faces a difficult decision. They have chosen thus far not to have the minute's silence, but to rather sacrifice Israeli feelings than jeopardise the Games. For the IOC this is a small

The Olympics has a cherished code of being non-political - an event only to celebrate sporting excellence among nations, an example of how people can come together despite their differences. Would the minute's silence break this code?

The fact is that the Israeli athletes were not put to death in a remote location unconnected to the Olympics; they were murdered right there at the Games themselves. The violence was implanted right onto this sporting bridge between people. The phrase "lest we forget" is so telling that it cannot be ignored.

For the sake of the integrity of the Games, there must be some tribute to the murdered sportsmen, whether in the form of a minute's silence or in another way, even if some participants in their hearts cannot empathise with the country they came

Israeli political constellation realigns

For the second time in two months, the Israeli political universe was upended when Shaul Mofaz's Kadima Party voted to quit Israel's governing coalition.

Kadima's departure, the result of a breakdown in negotiations over reforming Israel's military draft law to include haredi Orthodox Jews, shatters the 94-seat super-majority that Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu controlled in the 120-seat Knesset.

It also raises questions for the future of Kadima, Israel's draft and the timing of new elections.

While the loss of Kadima's 28 seats still leaves Netanyahu's coalition with the majority it needs to govern, the prime minister is now seen as more likely to move up Israel's next elections, which now are scheduled for the autumn of next year.

Netanyahu had been set to dissolve the Knesset and call for new elections nine weeks ago when Mofaz stunned the Israeli political establishment by bringing Kadima, Israel's main opposition party, into the governing coalition. The move was seen as a gambit by Mofaz, who had won Kadima's leadership several weeks earlier, to stave off elections in which Kadima was set to lose significant ground.

For Netanyahu, the coalition deal was a way both to hobble the opposition and give him more leeway in formulating a new military draft law. In February, Israel's Supreme Court struck down the current draft regulation, called the Tal Law, which excuses haredi Orthodox from universal mandatory military service for Israeli Jews. The court ordered that a new law be enacted by August 1 or else all Israeli Jews would be subject to the draft.

Netanyahu's other coalition partners include haredi Orthodox parties that oppose drafting large numbers of

The debate over the new draft law has roiled Israel in recent weeks. Many Israelis long have resented what they see as the free ride given to haredi Israelis, who are not required to serve in the army but are still eligible for state

Israel's military draft.

What seems certain is that Kadima has been weakened by the episode. Two months ago, polls showed Kadima stood to lose two-thirds of its Knesset seats in new elections. Government opponents criticised Mofaz when he then decided to hitch his centrist party to Netanyahu's right-wing Likud Party.

"Unfortunately, everything warned about two months ago and everything I expected to happen, happened," said Haim Ramon, a Knesset member who quit Kadima when Mofaz joined the government.

"Netanyahu's allies are the haredim and the settlers. Anyone who thinks otherwise is deluding himself. This move has brought on Kadima's demise and Shaul Mofaz is the one accountable," Ramon said, according to Ynet.

If new elections were held today, Kadima likely would implode, with the biggest chunk of its seats going to Likud (Kadima originally was created as an offshoot of Likud) and others to a new centrist party, Yesh Atid, or to

On Tuesday, Yesh Atid's chairman, Yair Lapid, called for Netanyahu to declare new elections immediately.

"We are ready for elections, and it's time to rid Israel of this bad government," Lapid said, according to Ynet.

welfare benefits.

In the end Kadima quit the government in protest over proposed reforms that it said did not go far enough.

At a news conference, announcing Kadima's decision to leave the government, Mofaz said he had rejected Netanyahu's proposal of deferring national service until age 26; Kadima wanted the draft deferral to end at age 22.

"It is with deep regret that I say that there is no choice but to decide to leave the government," Mofaz told a closeddoor meeting of Kadima on Tuesday, according to the Israeli news site Ynet. Three of Kadima's 28 members voted in favour of staying in the coalition.

'Netanyahu has chosen to side with the draft-dodgers," Mofaz told reporters after the meeting. "I have reached an understanding that the prime minister has not left us a choice and so we have responded."

In a letter to Mofaz from Netanyahu's office, the prime minister responded: "I gave you a proposal that would have led to the conscription of ultra-Orthodox and Arabs from the age of 18. I explained to you that the only way to implement this on the ground is gradually and without tearing Israeli society apart, especially at a time when the State of Israel is facing many significant challenges. I will continue to work toward the responsible solution that Israeli society expects."

With just two weeks to go before the Tal Law expires, it's not clear where Kadima's departure leaves the future of

For now, analysts are predicting that Netanyahu will call for new elections in early 2013. (JTA)

ACDP and IFP slam Cosatu's take on Pretoria march

The African Christian Democratic Party and the Inkatha Freedom Party have condemned the "scurrilous" attacks by Cosatu on the SA Zionist Federation and on their own leaders.

Cosatu national spokesman, Patrick Craven, has accused the SAZF of organising the "Africans for Israel" marches in Pretoria and Cape Town on June 28. The marches were in fact organised by the ACDP and IFP, joined by other groups in Pretoria, such as the Shembe Church; and in Cape Town by Israel Advocacy and the International Christian Embassy Jerusalem. They in turn asked the SAZF to join.

Craven's attack came in the wake of the marches to hand memoranda to Minister of Trade and Industry Rob Davies, to cancel his gazette to label products made in the West Bank and Gaza as products of the Occupied Palestinian Territory; not of Israel.

The joint memorandum in Pretoria signed by ACDP President Rev Kenneth Meshoe and IFP President Mangosuthu Buthelezi, point out that the General Notice "has no legal bases in our law or in international law to support this requirement", as Buthelezi summarised the complaint.

"The IFP believes this is a provocation aimed at promoting a consumer boycott. The action on the part of the DTI is not in the inter-

ests of South Africans. It reflects the political interest of the ANC which continues to utilise the state to pay off its political debts, confusing the national interests of SA with the private interests of the ANC."

Craven maintained that the marches were "an abuse of blacks under religious guise to legitimise apartheid in Israel".

Meshoe responded: "The ACDP and IFP reject the false allegations attacking the SAZF with the contempt they deserve."

He added that Cosatu, which represented 16 per cent of the labour force, should not be allowed such a powerful position to dictate to government what it should and should not do.

When I was growing up, I had an imperfect understanding of the Purim narrative, for which I think the way it was taught to Jewish children at the time was mainly to blame. The impression I had for a long time was that redemption came about once Haman was denounced and hanged.

Only later did I realise that in fact this was just a necessary first step in the process underpinned by a desire to deny its peoand that the actual date when Purim is celebrated, corresponds to the military victory subsequently gained by the Jews over their enemies.

Other details also emerged. Even Esther's revelation to the king that she was herself a Jew, was not sufficient to overturn Achashverosh's original decree. Moreover, the latter did not pledge to actually deploy his empire's resources to defend the Jews. All he essentially did was extend permission for the Jews to organise their own defence.

The crushing defeat of those who planned to annihilate the Jewish people, was accomplished entirely by Jewish arms, something that was in no way guaranteed by Haman's fall.

What we learn from this was that in terms of the original decree, Jews were to be prevented even from attempting to defend themselves. Had they tried to do so, then presumably the king's own forces would have intervened to stop them.

Megilat Esther, in addition to recording a series of events taking place some 25 centuries ago, also serves as a prototype of what has confronted the Jewish people throughout history. In light of what has actually transpired, no-one can dismiss its central premises as mere oriental hyperbole.

We know that there exists a hatred against Jews that is so lethal as to bring about attempts to destroy them altogether. Similarly, we can see how the attempt by a world government in ancient times to prevent Jews from taking up arms on their own behalf has clear resonances in our own

A local Human Sciences Research Council report of a few years ago concluding, as was intended from the outset, that Israel was guilty of practising apartheid, is a good example.

Those who download the 300-page document need not read through it all to confirm this; all one has to do is do a search for such words as "terrorism", "suicide bombing" and other obvious terms relating to Palestinian violence - they virtually never occur.

More recently, a documentary on socalled Israeli apartheid has been shown throughout the country. So impressed was the Wits Political Studies Department with it that watching it was made compulsory for its entire student body. In recent months, a Jewish cinema owner in Cape Town has been coming under sustained pressure by anti-Israel lobbyists for refusing to screen the film.

For my part, I have not seen it, but those who have, tell me that there is no reference anywhere to Palestinian terrorism. In other words, such measures as checkpoints, security barriers, road blocks and the like, are depicted as simply happening, without good or indeed any rea-

Beware of overreacting

Members of our community are justifiably upset when confronted with the public display of Nazi symbols, particularly swastikas. When this entails actually propagating the Nazi ideology (rather than in an educational context, such as in a museum), the Board will always take steps to counteract it.

However, misunderstandings can occur. The swastika is in fact a very ancient symbol, and prior to its misappropriation by the Na-

zis, its meaning was essentially benign. It is an important symbol within the Hindu faith (unlike the Nazi version, it is decorated with dots and displayed upright rather than at an angle).

Recently, we had to diffuse a potentially unpleasant situation when a Hindu woman was (inexcusably) abused and threatened by a Jewish colleague for displaying the sign. I would like to urge our community to learn the differences between the two symbols and not to overreact when confronted by the Hindu version. While some may be uneasy about something so reminiscent of the Nazi scourge, we need to respect the right of others to identify with their culture and recognise when nothing malicious is intended.

Jewish Boer memorial

The Board is partnering with the Ladysmith Siege Museum Trust in erecting a memorial to Jews who died serving on the side of the Boers during the Anglo-Boer War.

Three years ago, we collaborated with the Trust in commemorating the 110th anniversary of the action at Surprise Hill, during which Harry Spanier was the first Jewish Boer to be killed in action. A plaque to Spanier, in Afrikaans and Hebrew, was unveiled on that occasion.

This new monument records the names of all Jews who died in the service of the Boer republics. It is being erected

Four novels explore very different individuals and situations, all rebounding from the consequences of taking extreme risks.

Shakespeare's Mistress by Karen Harper (Random House Struik, R115)

Historical records show that a man named William Shakespeare was wed to one Anne Whateley, a girl from Temple Grafton just upriver from



Stratford-upon-Avon, mere days before his marriage to Anne Hathaway, a union which was neither judicious nor happy.

Drawing on fact, research, conjecture and wishful thinking, Harper explores the enigmatic, often contradictory life and loves of the Bard - known to be a closet Catholic and a man of restless temperament.

While the book is written badly and lacks the authority and gravitas of a serious biography, it nevertheless raises fascinating theories which have just enough substance to be credible.




Half Blood Blues by Esi Edugyan (Serpent's Tail, price on request)



Cohen one of 3 SA Jewish artists for Festival d'Avignon

This month, three Jewish Africans headlined the world's oldest and arguably most important arts festival. William Kentridge, Steven Cohen and Robyn Orlin were among the 38 invited artists for the 66th Festival d'Avignon, France.

While Orlin choreographed new age songstress Camille in a piece entitled Ilo veyou, and Kentridge brought Refuse the Hour, with composition by Philip Miller and choreography by Dada Masilo, a version of which debuted in Johannesburg last year, Cohen's Title Withheld (For Legal and Ethical Reasons) opened new

It surpassed critical risks France-based Cohen has taken thus far. In 1989, he emerged on the art scene, flagrantly ignoring the niceties of euphemism. White, homosexual, Jewish and South African, he relentlessly pushed his audience toward immense, important discomfort, in ruthlessly engaging his own identity.

In 2002, in a European bric-à-brac shop, Cohen found a Holocaust diary, begun in June 1939; ending suddenly, a couple of years later. Yellow stars the young Jewish writer

creted in its well-written, incisively illustrated pages. Cohen found the writer's family, to ask permission to use the diary in a work.

They refused, threatening to sue Cohen if he publicised their father's name, in connection with this diary. He had escaped the death camps, married a non-Jewish woman, started life again; he'd died at 84 in 1981. Legal to-ing and fro-ing eventually resulted in Cohen gaining permission to work with the diary, but with restrictions.

Title Withheld opened in the dank space beneath the Palace of the Popes, Avignon's main tourist attraction last week. A space foreign to polite performance, it supported Cohen's focus on the obscenity of discrimination, impeccably.

Consistently meticulous about how he presents his feet, in this work Cohen wears proarch machines, designed to strengthen ballerinas' arches, which force him to spend the piece's 55 minute duration en pointe. Each machine has an iPad attached to its base: screening the diary being paged through. It's beneath Cohen's feet, visible only momentarily.

Wearing his traditional cos-

was forced to wear were se- tume of cod-piece, corset and Magen David, Cohen tosses explicit clips of found filmed pornography at the audience, exacerbating their unease: they sit tightly on stone steps, under the sound of thousands of tourist footsteps. The work is premised on the horror of hiding in a tiny space and the loadedness of audience inter-

The set is dominated by a maze of plastic tubing; another tube runs behind the seated audience, both series of tubes contain live rats, choreographed by Hollywoodcelebrated animal trainer Guy Demazure and bearing tiny battery-lit Magen Davids.

On paper, this seems fantastic, if not illegal: Indeed, Cohen's logic stumped legal counsel: what if there are musophobes in the audience, they asked. Cohen countered: what if there are homophobes? Or anti-Semites?

It's unlikely that Title Withheld, easily surpassing the reach of defining moments in performance art and difficult to stomach as anti-war narratives like Günter Grass' "The Tin Drum" (1959), will perform locally. It travels to Norway in October; Bordeaux and Lille in November. Visit www. latitudescontemporaines.com

News in Brief

GADDAFI'S MOTHER WAS JEWISH, HIS PROTOCOL CHIEF

JERUSALEM - Muammar Gaddafi's mother was Jewish, the late Libyan leader's chief of protocol told an Arabic newspaper.

Nuri al-Samara told the daily Al-Hayat that Gaddafi's mother was Jewish, the Israeli daily Maariv reported on its NRG news website. At 18 she married a Muslim man and converted, according to reports.

Last year, a 76-year-old Jewish resident of the Israeli city Netanya told Maariv that Gaddafi was her cousin.

"My grandmother converted to Islam but never forgot her roots," Gita Boaron told Maariv. "She would come to visit us, give my mother money and say 'give to the synagogue, donate to the Jews'."

US WON'T FORCE MORSI-BIBI MEETING, CLINTON

CAIRO - Egyptian President Mohamed Morsi and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu should meet, US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton said, but the Obama administration will not force the issue.

"It is up to the two nations and the president and the prime minister to make their own scheduling plans." Clinton said last Saturday during a news conference in Cairo with Egyptian Foreign Minister Mohamed Amr. "We have done nothing. That's not our role; that would not be appropriate."

In answer to a reporter's question about the peace treaty signed more than 30 years ago between Israel and Egypt, Amr said during the news conference: "Egypt continues to respect all treaties signed as long as the other party to the treaty respects the treaty itself."

He added that Morsi on Saturday "reiterated that Egypt's understanding of peace is that it should be comprehensive, exactly as stipulated in the treaty itself," including Israel's return to pre-June 4, 1967 borders and a Palestinian state with Jerusalem as its capital.(JTA)

REPORT: MAARIV GOING ONLINE ONLY, WITH FRIDAY **EXCEPTION**

JERUSALEM - The Hebrew daily newspaper Maariv will move to only publish in digital form except on Fridays, an Israeli business daily is reporting.

The newspaper will appear online during the week and print an expanded Friday edition. Globes reported on Monday, citing unnamed sources. The business daily did not give a date for the change.

Globes also reported that Maariv is putting its printing house up for sale and that its Friday edition will be printed by another newspaper's printing house.

Maariv, which has a right-of-centre bent, has slashed its staff in recent months. (JTA)

AMERICANS KIDNAPPED IN THE **SINAI**

JERUSALEM - Two American tourists and their Egyptian guide were kidnapped in the Sinai Desert last week Friday, according to Egyptian military and police officials.

. The Bedouin kidnappers are demanding the release of a jailed tribesman, according to news reports.

The tourists and guide were taken when the kidnappers stopped their tourist bus, according to The Associated

Robberies and kidnappings in the Sinai have increased since the ouster of Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak last year.

A US Embassy spokesman said the embassy was looking into the kidnapping and did not provide additional details. (JTA)

Walk into any architect's office, developer's boardroom, or coffee shop in Parkhurst in Johannesburg in the last six months and chances are you would have heard someone in a black turtleneck bemoaning the new energy efficiency building regulations - SANS 10400, part XA - which has become the new bone of contention in the architectural profession.

But what is XA in fact and how does it affect

Well, the good news is that if you have an existing home, it doesn't affect you, although applying some of the principles will cut down the size of that dreaded electricity bill. If you, however, are building a house or doing alterations,

you need to comply.

SANS 10400 aims to cut down energy consumption in buildings by regulating three main areas: hot water heating; insulation of the building envelope; and the efficiency of the lighting system.

Remember, every time you switch on a light, a power station somewhere belches smoke into

The hot water heating system is fairly simple: 50 per cent of hot water must be by means other than electrical. This means solar geysers or heat pumps.

If you opt for the solar option, make sure your geysers provide 100 litres of hot water per person. In other words, for a four-person household you should install 2 x 200 litre geysers running on at least two panels each. Face the panels north!

Heat pumps still run on electricity, but reduce the power to the geyser by 50 per cent. This is also a good option if you have existing geysers which you wish to make more efficient.

The insulation of the building envelope aims to reduce heat escaping and cold entering your house. Under the new regulations, your roof requires extra insulation and the floor must be insulated if you have under-floor heating, to stop heat escaping into the ground.

It is the glazing calculations, however, that have the industry in a spin. If your glazing is over 15 per cent of the net floor area, your architect will need to calculate every window's R value. Depending on the size of the windows, you may have to use e-glass, or double glazing.



Why it is important to prepare walls before painting

All surfaces require a certain amount of surface preparation. If this is not done properly, the end result could be the failure of the complete finishing system.

As a painting contracting company, a large proportion (up to 50 per cent) of our efforts are in the preparation of the surface. This will result in a sound and professional appearance.

When obtaining a quote for a painting job, always make sure that the contractor has a good preparation policy.

How to prepare the walls for painting

In order to paint a wall, it needs to be clean, dry and free from imperfections. If the wall has been painted a number of times and there are runs or drips on the old surface, it may need to be sanded down to obtain a smooth finish. Depending on the condition, you may be able to simply go over rough ar-

eas with a piece of sandpaper or a sanding block, then remove the dust with a clean tack rag or linen cloth.

Once the surface is smooth, inspect the wall for any cracks, holes or other surface imperfections that needs to be repaired.

Small holes and cracks can be filled with spackling. Apply a small amount in and over the hole with a putty knife and smooth carefully, feathering the putty out in all directions as you move away from the hole. Allow the hole to dry before continuing and if necessary, sand and fill the hole a second time. Once the filler is completely dry, sand the surface smooth.

Larger cracks or missing areas of plaster will need to be repaired with patch plaster.

Wipe the walls down with a damp cloth to remove any dust from the surface. For a neat finish remove all lug covers, light switch covers and window coverings before you begin.

Prepare your room by removing as much furniture as you can; what you can't remove put into the centre of the room and cover with a drop sheet.

If you are painting a plastered wall that

has never been painted before, you need to apply a primer to the wall before painting. Likewise if you are painting a previously painted surface, you need to prime any areas that were patched in your preparation work.

To build, to buy, or to renovate? This is the question

And if you've already found the perfect home while you're considering a renovation, a move may be written in the stars.

When considering staying and fixing up

Ensconced beneath the Da Vinci Hotel in Mandela Square in Sandton, lies an impregnable fortress, safeguarding millions of rands worth of treasure.

This is not a dungeon-like tomb with gold coins spilling out of old wooden chests; on the contrary, here there is a sense of light spaciousness. The elegant décor in the waiting area and private booths, rivals that of the 5-star hotel on top of it.

The understated luxury and state-of-the-art security, which includes fingerprint scanning, dual-key safety boxes and a half-ton steel door at the entrance, reminds one of a Swiss bank.

Actress Charlize Theron got her break into the film business - making a transition as successful model - by loudly voicing her frustrations in a bank queue.

Ashok Sewnarain, already a successful financier, hotelier and property developer, got



his idea for securing people's treasures, from listening to someone's frustrations in a bank queue.

"A well-to-do customer was complaining loudly about the bank being unable to offer her a safety deposit box. The attendant said the waiting list was several years and the more I thought about it, the more I became convinced that this was a genuine opportunity."

In May 2005, International Bank Vaults (IBV) opened at the Gateway Shopping Centre in Umhlanga.

"I quickly became an expert in vault design, safe doors, bullet-proof glass, the latest electronic security systems, not to mention the sourcing and training of trustworthy, reliable personnel."

But IBV's real challenges began after it opened its armoured doors for business.

"We had to convince the public and the market that we were a fit custodian for billions of rands worth of valuables. More than one senior



bank manager told me it was only a matter of time before I would be forced to close."

As wealthy clients began raving about the service and facilities offered by his super vault, his new business became lucrative. Last year he opened the second vault at Mandela Square. This time there was no shortage of clients, many referred by banks.

IBV's client base now exceeds 5 000 and clients pay between R185 and R600 (size dependant) a month for access to a safety deposit box in his vaults.

IBV has partnered with international insurance brokers AON to offer insurance coverage for clients' valuables at very competitive rates. IBV also offers clients the facility to buy and store gold coins – which has proved so popular that many now refer to IBV jokingly as the "gold bank".

Sewnarain is also planning to open a vault in London, the first of a franchise he plans to roll out at upmarket malls around the world.



Call for Cameron should strengthen 'Munich Minute'

The call for a "Munich Minute" at the opening ceremony of this year's London Olympic Games is gathering momentum, despite the International Olympic Committee's (IOC) stand that there would be no official observance of the 1972 massacre of Jews at the 1972 Munich Games.

man, have signed an "Early Day Motion" calling for a minute's silence to mark the 40th anniversary of the Munich massacre to be observed.

Now a former Labour minister has written to British Prime Minister David Cameron, calling on him to back the remembrance of the 11 Israeli athletes murdered in Munich.

Denis MacShane, Labour MP for Rotherham and Europe minister under Tony Blair, said David Cameron should follow the example set at Euro 2012 in Poland, during which the England team visited Auschwitz "in the spirit of 'Never Again'".

The Jewish Chronicle reports that Mac-Shane urged Cameron to push the IOC to change its stance on an official commemorative silence or agree to "some moment of commemoration", which the IOC has so far refused to support.

"The IOC will come up with the usual line about not mixing sport and politics," he wrote. "But at the recent Euro 2012 competition, the players and stadiums showed signs 'No to Racism' and the English and other football teams visited Auschwitz.

"If the IOC treats the memory of the dead Jewish Olympians with indifference than shame on them," he said. "But I am sure most MPs would welcome some statement from the British Government in sup-

port of a commemoration moment.

"If the IOC persists in its stubborn disregard of the anti-Jewish atrocity committed at the 1972 Olympics, then I hope Britain can organise its own ceremony to say again 'Never Again' to Jew-killing in the name of any ideology or cause."

Last week Thursday Lord Coe, chairman of the London Organising Committee, agreed to hold a "personal" memorial to the dead athletes during the opening ceremony. He told staff at the capital's City Hall that he would mark the anniversary during a "personal moment". It is not clear how he intends to do this.

A campaign led by Jewish leaders worldwide and Ankie Spitzer, widow of murdered

fencing coach Andrei Spitzer, has so far failed to sway the International Olympic Committee, which has repeatedly refused to agree to a minute's silence forming part of the opening ceremony.

Lord Coe met members of staff at City Hall for a "tea break" session, to thank them for their work on the London Games. He was quizzed on plans for a memorial.

Two separate memorial events are planned this summer for the Munich athletes. One is organised by the Israeli Embassy, Israeli Olympic Committee and the Jewish community in London on August 6 and the other, organised by the Zionist Federation a month later, will mark the anniversary of the massacre.

Battle of the cricketing giants

The Wimbledon curtain-raiser is over, the forthcoming Olympics a mere sideshow. On July 19, the world's number-one and number-two-ranked test cricket nations start to slug it out for first place, as fans everywhere rub their hands with glee for the most eagerly anticipated sporting event since the 1993 Bakers u9-Mini cricket final between KEPS and HA Jack Primary, where a certain SR Apfel hit the winning runs, top-scored with eight not out, and was adjudged man of the match, while his parents wept with pride on the sidelines.

Then again expectations are often not met. For an illustration, look no further than our own team's performances at World Cups since 1996. Nevertheless, the form book suggests this is going to be an absolute cracker. The spoils have been shared in three of eight utterly transfixing series, with SA claiming three series wins, and England two.

Memories of classic duels abound:

Allan Donald's onslaught against Mike Atherton and the infuriating Jack Russell at The Wanderers in '95; White Lightning again battering a similarly unyielding Atherton at Old Trafford in '98; a young Graeme Smith plundering two enormous double centuries off the inexperienced but unflagging Anderson, Flintoff and Harmison in 2003; Steyn flinging down one unplayable delivery after the next as Collingwood played and missed for four-and-a-half hours in Cape Town.

So, how do SA and England measure up at the moment? Enthrallingly, we are looking at possibly the best teams either side has fielded for decades.

To paraphrase the great Andy Zaltzman, there have been more false dawns in England cricket than there have been through the window of an insomniac who lives next to a lighthouse. However, since 2009, the Three Lions have become a team of enforc-

ers, putting to the sword Australia (twice), India, Sri Lanka and Pakistan, on their way to the number one ranking.

England's bowling stables are currently packed full of fillies. Their batsmen are insatiable run machines with the technical resources to feed their appetite. They also have home advantage. Although some may argue that, given the make-up of their side, they'd enjoy even greater home advantage in South Africa - where they could at least stay with their parents.

As for the respective captains, Strauss and Smith have more in common than their nationalities. With their square jaws and lead-from-the-front bravado, neither would be out of place calling the shots on a mediaeval battlefield. Smith himself will soon be starring in 277 - a sequel to 300, and featuring a ball-by-ball recreation of his marathon innings at Edgbaston.

South Africa's first-choice bowling attack is superior even to England's, earning favourable comparisons with the fearsome West Indies pace quartet of the '80s. The batting line-up is almost as formidable: with, the unswayable Amla oozes silk; AB de Villiers' hand-eye co-ordination alone is enough to ensure he becomes one of the alltime greats; and Jacques Kallis is the face and body of Sanex soap.

The loss of keeper Boucher may indeed be a blow, and one unlikely to be allayed by the inclusion of Thami Tsolekile. On the other hand, if AB dons the keeping gloves, it could make up for South Africa's uncharacteristically wonky lower order, where England undoubtedly have the edge.

In short, things are balanced beautifully as we head towards the first test at The
