

The 5772/2012 Beth Din/Pick n Pay Pesach Guide is now available online at www.uos.co.za, according to a notification by the kashrut department of the Union of Orthodox Synagogues. Hard copies of the guide should be available in Pick n Pay stores towards the end of this week.

The kashrut department says retail supermarkets have begun stocking their Pesach shelves. "We have no control over how independent retailers stock their products and the shelves themselves are not under supervision. Look at each item carefully. Often the retailer will pack anything that has Hebrew writing and looks kosher."

Go home!

What is a shul good for? I recall touring Europe in the '90s and being struck by the diminutive size of some of the greatest shuls ever: the shul of the celebrated Rem'uh in Krakow; the Maharal's famous "Altneu" Shul in Prague. The greatest of rabbis presided over shuls that could hold maybe 45 people!

Jews track time by following the cycle of the moon. Indeed, Israel is compared to the moon, which is why on this Shabbos in anticipation of Pesach, shuls around the world will take out an extra Torah from the Holy Ark and read a section, titled "Hachodesh".

But why would we seek to be compared to the moon, which is smaller and weaker than the great luminary, the sun? Surely we as a people should strive for the brilliance of the sun's rays? Why settle for second best?

King Solomon teaches: "Shema B'ni!" Listen, my son, to the admonishment of your father- but never forget the "Torah" of your mother. A father's input is crucial in a child's development but, says King Solomon, it is the mother who causes one to "never forget" who they are.

A father provides, but a mother nurtures. And it is this inner, less dramatic, nurturing feature that keeps our Jewish identity eternal

brighter- it makes all life possible. But then it sets, leaving behind a dark world; it is not constant. The moon, however, in its soft nurturing glow, represents a constant.

Sure, it waxes and wanes, but is often visible not only at night, but by day as well. The sun-provider burns bright, but it is the nurturing moon which serves as the symbol of our eternity as a people.

While the shul is the most visible symbol of our Judaism, it is the home that ensures our survival as a people. One of the unfortunate consequences of the demographic shifts in the early 20th century (due to wars, anti-Semitism, and modern technology) is that

the shul became an institution.

This represented a shift of emphasis from the home to the synagogue, from which we are yet to recover and which poses a real threat to our survival. Yiddishkeit needs to be primarily experienced in the home.

The shul should serve as a refuelling spot in the landscape of Judaism, not the destination. In fact, I would put my job on the line and advise any sincere Jew who claims they can't afford a Jewish home, whether it's kosher meat which costs too much or tefillin that is out of their budget, to drop their shul membership and use the money to build a Jewish home.

In two weeks' time, Jewish families around the world will gather in their homes around seder tables to worship Hashem, just as our forefathers did on that fateful night in Egypt. It is there, in the nurturing glow of the home, that our people were born. And it is there, in the home, that we will live on.

Shul rejuvenation: Rabbis think out of the box

Traditional South African Jewry has always upheld a strong commitment to the values of old. However the last decade has seen a wave of assimilation bring traditional Judaism to its knees and rabbis and committee members have had to put their heads together to rejuvenate their communities .

Friday Night Live is also a real road stopper, as hundreds of congregants and visitors pack the street to take part in the exotic Shabbos street brochas."

The dynamic Ohr Somayach Cape Town community has recently appointed the energetic and charismatic Rabbi Jared and Amy Bloch as the new rabbi and rebbetzen. Rabbi Bloch tells of how privileged he feels to have been afforded this opportunity.

"We have some very exciting new endeavours, like the BBM (Business Breakfast Meaning), given my local and international guest speakers. We have also introduced CTYS (Cape Town Youth Shul) which runs weekly services to enrich the bat- and barmitzvah experience for our young congregants, not to mention our kids programme which now boasts three Shabbat services which are led by enthusiastic and trained young students. It is the place to be on a Saturday morning!"

Learning has become the real attraction of communities across the country and Rabbi Justin Treger, young adults rabbi of Sandton Shul has this advice: "The congregants of today are in many ways more excited about learning and therein enriching their lives, as opposed to the traditional attending of weekly services, which is a more passive experience.

"We have therefore initiated an unbelievable repertoire of learning programmes to stimulate a thirst for the acquisition of Torah knowledge, which is so imperative to the modern-day Jew."

Rabbi Dovid Wineberg of the Sea Point, Marais Road Congregation in Cape Town, has this to say: "The community has been exceptionally generous in their feedback and they have displayed a real desire to be involved and committed to the different initiatives which we have undertaken, surpassing our greatest expectations.

"We have initiated a Tuesday morning minyan on Lion's Head. We have two groups who climb at 06:00 and 06:30 and our most successful one to date attracted over 60 participants on Rosh Chodesh Tevet and Chanukah.

"A former Israeli soldier carried up the Torah and a baboon even attended the service! We also have Shabbat Unplugged once a month, and have all the tunes of the service following a movie theme, like The Lion king and Fiddler on the Roof."

This week France reeled in horror at the cold-blooded killing of a Jewish man, his two young sons and a young Jewish girl.

Presidential candidates suspended their election campaigns to express sympathy and show their support for the French Jewish community in Toulouse. And a leading French-Jewish intellectual, Bernard-Henri Lévy, has called for a solidarity march, as was the case 20 years ago, to show the nation's abhorrence against this barbaric deed.

Thousands silently demonstrated on Monday evening in Paris to pay tribute to the four victims of a shooting attack at a Jewish school in southwestern France.

A man riding a motorbike opened fire that morning outside the Ozar Hatorah School in Toulouse, where learners were waiting to enter the building at the start of the school day, before fleeing. Rabbi Jonathan Sandler, 30, and his three- and six-year-old sons, as well as the eight-year-old daughter of the school's principal, were killed in the attack.

Members of Jewish organisations and antiracist movements, as well as politicians, gathered between Place de la République and Place de la Bastille for the march organised by the French Union of Jewish Students.

The crowd made up of many youths, held many French flags; most wore the tricolor scarf, the symbol of the French Republic. Marchers also displayed a banner reading: "In France, Blacks, Jews and Arabs are killed".

Earlier Monday evening, French President Nicolas Sarkozy, his socialist rival François Hollande, and several other top French politicians attended a memorial ceremony at the Nazareth Synagogue in Paris.

Lévy writing in Haaretz on Tuesday, says French leaders must come together to say that all of France is being attacked in the wake of the Toulouse killings.

"A little over 20 years ago, the entire political class, all families together with the exception of the National Front, was capable of marching behind President François Mitterrand to condemn the profanation of 34 Jewish graves at a cemetery in Carpentras.

"Today, we need an equivalent of that demonstration, with Nicolas Sarkozy and François Hollande in the lead, in grieving Toulouse, at the Place Capitole, this landmark where General De Gaulle came, on September 16, 1945, to preach the unity of the country to the people of the maquis, FFI, FTP, and survivors of the International Brigades of the Spanish Civil War.

"A great meeting, all political forces attending, to come to say, without nuance, all of France is being attacked and must take a united stand when its children, whatever they may be and whatever the profile of the killer or his reasons, are massacred like this.

"There can be no worse blow to French culture, to the soul of our country, its history and when all is said and done, to its grandeur than racism and, today, anti-Semitism."

Pres Sarkozy said on Monday afternoon that he would suspend his re-election campaign until at least later this week. "This is a horrible attack that cannot go unpunished. Every possible means will be engaged to stop this criminal. Our country had never known a shooting inside a school. The whole republic is mobilised to face this tragedy."

French Interior Minister Claude Gueant said the gunman might have been filming the attack with a camera attached to his chest. French police were searching the Internet to see if a video of the attack had been posted online, according to reports.

French police also said they believed the attacks were carried out by French soldiers suspected of being neo-Nazis, dismissed from the military several years ago. (JTA)

AIPAC PRAISES SWIFT ON IRAN COMPLIANCE

WASHINGTON - The American Israel Public Affairs Committee has praised the Society for Worldwide Interbank Financial Telecommunication's compliance with sanctions on Iranian banks.

SWIFT, which serves as the final entry point for electronic transactions before entering the global financial system, said on March 15 that it had no choice but to abide by European Union sanctions on designated Iranian financial institutions. "This welcome step must now be supplemented by additional measures to press the regime to change course," AIPAC said in one of its rare statements.

In addition, AIPAC urged Congress to act on proposed legislation that would close loopholes in existing sanctions laws and called on the administration to strongly implement sanctions against the Central Bank of Iran. (JTA)



The Toulouse attack: what can we do here?

At the time of the Jewish Report going to print, the gunman who attacked the Jewish school Ozar HaTorah in Toulouse, France on Monday and murdered teacher Yonatan Sandler, his two young sons Aryeh and Gavriel, and little girl Miriam Montenago, daughter of the school's principal, had not yet been identified, nor any group to which he might belong.

All signs, however, indicated that this was a hate crime, not an ordinary criminal act. And that it was linked to recent attacks in the same area on soldiers of North African and Caribbean origin. Police said the .45 calibre gun fired at the school was the same calibre used to kill the soldiers, as was the scooter on which the assailant rode.

President Nicolas Sarkozy has come out very strongly on this issue and has vowed that the police would leave no stone unturned to bring the culprit to

While French Jews - Europe's largest Jewish community, estimated at some 700 000 - can be classified as just another piece in that country's mosaic of ethnic minorities, the fact that they are being targeted is about more than France's simmering ethnic tensions.

It happens in the context of a dramatic resurgence of anti-Semitism in Europe and the world. Using anti-Zionism and the call for boycotts, divestment and sanctions as a cover for crude Jew-hatred, its proponents have in recent years focused their attentions on both Israel and Jewish institutions worldwide.

Rabid antipathy to Jews which pervades the Arab and Muslim world, has infiltrated Europe and reignited expressions of anti-Semitism in mainstream media and general society, where it has long existed and only took a temporary break in public after the

As the great Zionist visionary Ze'ev Jabotinsky warned in a 1939 article, on the eve of the Second World War, anti-Semitism is a beast which never dies, but merely naps intermittently. And each time it awakens, its appetite is increasingly voracious.

History has shown repeatedly how verbal expressions of hatred for an ethnic or religious group can lead ultimately to actual violence. The Holocaust was made possible by years of dehumanisation of Jews in European society before it.

We saw a similar phenomenon in South Africa, where the many years of dehumanisation of black people - and their being reduced to simple labour units for white industry, business and society allowed their violent submission by the white regime during apartheid to be tolerated and even seen as "natural and necessary" by whites.

European governments, including the European Commission, the Vatican, Italy, Poland, Belgium, the Netherlands and France itself, among others, have condemned the Toulouse school attack. German Foreign Minister Guido Westerwelle said: "Anti-Semitism and violence against Jewish institutions or people of Jewish faith have no place in Europe and must be rigorously punished."

But clearly, the growing hatred for Jews becoming so widespread in Europe, carries the huge risk of it sooner or later becoming violent. Regrettably, the Toulouse events might illustrate exactly that danger.

What can we do here in South Africa, in our corner of the world at the bottom of Africa? We cannot greatly influence what happens in Europe, but we can try to exorcise racist hatred from our own society, particularly given our history.

Anti-black racist sentiments from whites still mired in the apartheid mindset are not only unacceptable, but inherently dangerous. So are anti-white statements from the likes of Julius Malema. Words, as the single units of rhetoric, are enormously volatile weapons and can ignite conflagrations to which there is no reasonable limit.

The recent nationalistic outbursts of Sarkozy against immigrants in his country, may not have been intended to end in bloodshed, but they certainly carried its seeds. Looking at the world today, ethnic tensions are volatile and, indeed, actively incendiary in so many regions - from the Middle East to Europe and Africa - that it is incumbent upon leaders to do whatever they can to calm, rather than inflame, these

Sad farewell to a very dear friend

From personal experience, I understand perhaps better than most why Jews are meant to keep themselves as much as possible apart from the rest of humanity. It is not because we "dislike the goyim" and look down on them, but rather the opposite.

It is because we feel a natural attraction to the other nations, as fellow beings created B'tzelem Elokim, that we need to keep our distance, lest we be distracted from carrying out our particular mission. The more we mix at a social level with non-Jews, the more we will be influenced by their behaviour and modes of thinking, to the inevitable detriment of living lives wholeheartedly devoted to what the Torah demands.

I fully recognise the impossibility of living in both camps. That being stressed, I feel the need at this time to express a measure of regret over the absence in our tradition of ways to formally grieve when gentiles to whom we might have been close pass on. No

Kaddish can be said when this happens, nor do any other of our complex laws mourning apply. The loss we feel is allowed no formal channel of expression.

The first time I encountered Robert Jackson, as a seven-year-old in the Sandown Primary School playground, I hit him in the teeth and made him howl. This was ironic in that during our respective school careers I was a firstclass wuss whereas Rob had a reputation as something of a fighter.

The second irony was that in due course we established a firm friendship that would endure for more than three decades - right up until last Sunday afternoon, in fact.

Over the years, Rob and I spent our time together playing table tennis, soccer and, later, pool in a nearby pub, watching videos or sport and devising games and ratings systems for tennis players.

We also formed a music group of sorts - called The Holy Godfathers with me on piano and Rob bawling his own highly distinctive lyrics into a tape recorder. Towards the end, though, we simply met every few weeks at a pub near his Blairgowrie flat and talked.

his driver's licence and, shortly after that, his own car. It is of some comfort that Rob, in his mid-forties, broke through what had been a demoralising psychological barrier to pass his driver's test and gain that crucial measure of independence that comes with being

The older they get, most people rarely think, let alone speak, about their schooldays. What was so real and intense at the time, becomes less and less relevant in negotiating the newer, more prolonged challenges of adult-

Rob was not like that. For him, the schooldays we shared were perpetually fresh. He would frequently speak of incidents that had taken place over 30 years previously as if they had occurred quite recently. Rob never shone as a scholar, but he had a formidable memory. As for me, much of the desolation I now feel comes from having lost a vital link with those formative years.

Rob was someone who always trod his own, distinctive path. For this, he paid a high price since, for all his talents and likeability, he was unable to find an enduring place for himself in a society that continually demands compromises of its members.

He felt keenly that he had underachieved in his life. During our last meeting, he spoke wistfully of his failure to ever win the tennis championship at school, even when he was the obvious favourite. A more recent disappointment was how the considerable investment he had put into training a talented young player from the Czech Republic had come to nothing.

But Robert was not a failure - far from it. I will always remember him as someone who was always true to him-

Previous victims of the same killer are believed to be three men of North African and one of West Indian origin.

SAJBD connived with Walters behind shul's back

In my capacity as an attorney, I represented the Baal Shem Tov Shul (in Orange Grove) throughout its zoning hearings and would like to comment on last week's article in the SAJR, ""The fight for the closure of the Baal Shem Tov Shul is not

The article contains several inaccuracies and was published without first calling for comment from the shul.

- 1. On no account did Rabbi (Gavin) Michal admit that he did not have the necessary permits. On the contrary, I appeared at the first tribunal and submitted that the shul had received an informal consent from the former mayor of Johannesburg, Mr Neppe.
- 2. At the outbreak of this matter, Tiaan Ehlers, head of town planning at the City of Johannesburg, called upon our town planner to attend a "without prejudice" meeting in his office with the complainant, Councillor Christine Walters. I was denied a right of audience at the meeting, its intention having been to hold a "round table" meeting in order to gain an understanding of the dispute.

To my shock, I discovered that although I had been refused a right of audience, the chairman of the Orange Grove Residents Association, Roger Chadwick, Councillor Walters and her ally, Marian Lasersohn, were all in attendance.

The meeting was, by design, more of an ambush than a settlement discussion. At such meeting utterances were made to the effect that there had been "a horrific proliferation of synagogues" and steps would be taken to clamp down on an alleged 22 illegal synagogues.

Rabbi Michal, in response, did no more than his civic and religious duty by reporting this to the Jewish Board of Deputies. Why the Board not only did nothing, but seemingly aligned itself with Walters by negotiating with her behind the shul's back, remains a complete mystery.

- 3. No appeal has been launched by Walters, as reported. There is no merit in her allegation that she was not notified of the hearing. Furthermore, there is no right of appeal against the decision of an appeal tribunal.
- 4. As for the alleged failure to comply with building bylaws, this is the furthest thing from the truth. The shul has a favourable report from an independent architect. In any event, building bylaws have absolutely no bearing upon the determination of zoning rights.

Just another attempt to muddy the waters!



Good reads

Imaginative brilliance more than make up for flaws

Care of Wooden Floors by Will Wiles (Harper Press, R262)

Occupying someone else's private living space is always an excursion into their experience of themselves in the world - and, by default, into one's own experience of it too. And the truths which emerge from the journey can change both parties forever.

This novel is set in an unnamed Eastern European city where the narrator (also unnamed) - a London bachelor - arrives to look after the flat of his friend Oskar, a German-born minimalist composer whose most famous work is "Variations on Tram Timetables".

The reason for the flatsit is logical enough: Oskar has gone to Los Angeles for a few weeks to finalise his divorce from his American wife. What is inexplicable, however, is that he has prevailed on this particular friend - whom he knows from their shared university digs days to be a barfly, a slob, a philistine who considers all classical music no more than "high-quality aural wallpaper" and a man constitutionally incapable of any kind of ordered living - to care for his impossibly pristine home.

The apartment's intimidating sterility comes as no surprise. Oskar - pathologically tidy, pedantic, rigidly controlled and as sterile in his environment as in his interactions with others - has created an Elysian dream home.

For the chaotic Londoner, however, it is a minefield of potential hazards, including immaculate designer furniture, spotless white walls and bedlinen, rigidly organised systems for cupboards, books and groceries, and two cats.

Most daunting of all, though, are the magnificent, unimaginably expensive and hypersensitive French oak floorboards, requiring infinite care and caution in order to maintain their unique gleam and texture.


The apartment's antiseptic aura is sharply contrasted by the industrial city beyond it, filled with grey apartment blocks, hideous monuments which could only have been "gifts from the Soviet Union", filthy canals, derelict factories and grim-faced citizens.

The friend soon starts finding notes, left in strategic places for him by Oskar, reminding him at every turn to be careful, to clean up after himself and - above all to take especial care of the floor.

Of course, within a few hours, the first disaster strikes. The floors, it turns out, are super-absorbent, and when a few drops of red wine are spilt on them, the effects are instant, dramatic - and irreversible.

"The floorboards... lay there, welcoming the red deeper and deeper into their substance, like self-conscious, passive-aggressive martyrs. If they had been lino, or even sealed wood, this would never have happened. But Oskar had to have everything just so. He had to have this one kind of wood... Wasn't this calamity inevitable, given enough time? Didn't he realise that? His precious, delicate floorboards had their fate written into their absorbent grain."

This initial mishap quickly triggers a chain of further calamities: the Londoner, returning from a bender to a nightclub, is too drunk to control either his bladder or



his vomit reflexes. Having left the piano (which he was instructed not to touch) open, and failed to let the cats out, he discovers that one of them has crawled onto the keyboard, where the heavy instrument lid has fallen on it and killed it.

Disposing of a dead cat in a strange apartment, in a strange city, the Londoner finds, is no easy task. And manoeuvring its corpse past the building caretaker-cumcleaner - a sour, belligerent harridan who speaks no English - is harder still.

But there is worse to come. Having tried - with frightful results - to undo the damage to the floorboards using soap, then detergents, then pumice and, finally, a mixture of oxalic acid crystals and vinegar, the panicking Londoner decides to prise off the floorboards, flip them over and reset them with the (hopefully) pristine undersides on top. The intrusion of the caretaker, however, quickly puts paid to this plan - and pushes the situation into the realms of unimagined horror.

Like all good satires, the novel has a tragic subtext. The collision of two men's worlds - seemingly irreconcilable, yet strangely similar in their alienation and despair - creates an interface which generates many startling revelations.

Oskar, it turns out, is neither as implacable nor as impenetrable as he appears. The men do not know each other well, but their secret envy of each other's lives provides a portal for them to explore the road not taken. Their relationship with their respective living spaces, and with each other, is both tremulous and treacherous.

Far more than coping with wine spills and the other thousand natural shocks that expensive blonde wooden floors are heir to, this is a novel about the pursuit of perfection, privacy and inviolability – none of which exist. It is also about identity, boundaries and entropy.

Wiles' writing can be problematic: on the one hand, there is electrifying imagery and deeply moving insights: "We make our rooms and then our rooms make us," Oskar sadly tells his friend.

On the other hand, there are grotesquely contrived sentences like: "Above it all, my angle-poise shone cyclopically like the fire brigade floodlights at a midnight motorway catastrophe" and smart-ass asides like: "Who cheesed her move?"

Wiles' novel often risks being hijacked by his smarmy, self-delighting cleverness and his inability to resist milking a metaphor for all it is worth.

Yet this reviewer found herself succumbing steadily to his imaginative brilliance, compulsively turning the pages and, finally, conceding wholehearted defeat. Part farce, part thriller, part existential polemic, the novel is full of surprises, ingenuity – and unforgettable revelations.



Tapping into the rich reserve of SA dancing talent

Seventy-three-year-old Sandra Rosenberg can still effortlessly "shoulder her leg", an exercise in which the dancer raises her leg to shoulder height. Physical dexterity is not the only skill of this doyenne of tap dancing in South Africa.

AT THE age of six, she had her first lesson; 10 years later she took her tap-dancing teaching exam. She'd lost her father as a nine-year-old and moved to Durban to live with an uncle and aunt after the remarriage of her mother.

By 10, she was earning her living teaching - dance lessons were by then central to her existence; a luxury she couldn't otherwise afford. Her first teaching studio was in Doornside: "Each Saturday from 04:30, I would travel on the milk train with the mine workers to get there."

At 17, Rosenberg returned to Johannesburg after the death of her uncle. She started dancing with Paddy Chellin, gaining board and lodging in return for lessons she gave. She married at 19.

"We lived initially in the Stephanie Hotel in Berea. I set up my studio in Yeoville, until we were able to afford to move to Cyrildene, where we've been 47 years. My studio was built on the property in 1971."

She taught many of today's headlining dancers and choreographers: Shelley Meskin, Vicky Friedman, Esther Nasser... "This little suburban studio has seen much. Pride isn't the word to describe how I feel when I see former pupils being wonderful. It's nachas."

Rosenberg made dance controversy in 1994. She was "expelled from the SA Dance Teachers Association; I wanted to develop outreach. I didn't care if it was for black or white dancers, but felt it was necessary.

"Meetings were held in my home by young teachers keen to sabotage SADTA. This is where DanceCor, a co-operative of dance teachers, was born."

Specialising in tap, hip-hop and modern,

it aims to develop dance teaching. Close to 80, mostly Johannesburg teachers, are associated with DanceCor.

With her daughter, Megan, also an acclaimed tap dancer/choreographer, Rosenberg is affiliated to a network of outreach training, embracing not only previously disadvantaged dancers, but also senior beginners.

Having recently changed the name of her 1999-established tap school, the only one in South Africa, from Tap Talk Rhythm Company to Foot Musicians, Rosenberg is writing a tap handbook.

It includes an overview of South African tap terminology; reflections on how eight parts of the foot are used for tap; descriptions of the six knee movements; tips, like the fact that turning the screws on a tap shoe can alter its sound; and the South African history of tap.

She speaks of how tap, a hybrid of African rhythm and European footwork, was only named as such in 1903. "It was practised in South Africa from mid-1920, coming through Irish clog dance; it's a sibling to township genres marabi and mbaqanga."

Like other art forms, tap in apartheid South Africa was squeezed. According to anthropologist David Coplan: "With innercity clubs off limits, old location halls torn down, and the 'matchbox' township of Soweto almost without recreational facilities, Johannesburg's once-proud black bandsmen were confined to Dorkay House, the Bantu Men's Social Centre," in Eloff Street, from 1960. It was a venue of choice for not only black burlesquers, but also people like the late Bertha Egnos, producer of Ipi Ntombi.

Rosenberg's classes filled the gap: "Foot Musicians move their audiences," she adds.

Toulouse tragedy: Wake-up call for world Jewry

The Jewish world has been rocked by an unknown gunman's attack on a Jewish school in Toulouse, France. A rabbi, his two young sons and a third Jewish child, an eight year-old girl, were cold-bloodedly murdered in what was the worst attack on a school the country had known.

Under any circumstances, the deliberate killing of a Jewish father and three young Jewish children is something Jews everywhere will mourn. What makes these murders even more harrowing is the strong presumption that the victims were not randomly chosen but were deliberately singled out because they were Jewish.

At the time of writing, the killer is still at large, so we cannot say for sure what motivated him. However, the indications are that he was also responsible for the murder a few days earlier of four soldiers, of whom three were of North African descent and one of West Indian origin.

This strengthens the presumption that the attack should be regarded as a hate crime aimed specifically at the Jewish community.

Last year, the world was shocked by an appalling massacre that took place in Norway. The killer in that case was a farrightwing fanatic driven by ideologies and obsessions strong enough to motivate him to deliberately murder scores of his own people.

The Toulouse killings may well fall into the same grim category. Only recently, moreover, two men were arrested in France for planning to bomb a synagogue in Milan.

Whatever happens to Jews in Europe could just as easily happen to Jewish communities elsewhere in the world. For our own community, the lesson we must take

from the Toulouse tragedy must be to increase our own levels of vigilance when it comes to safeguarding our communal institutions.

It was precisely to that end that the SAJBD took the lead in the early 1990s in establishing the Community Security Organisation - CSO - a body that quickly established itself as a crucial component of our communal infrastructure.

The CSO, with its well-trained professional staff and many dedicated volunteers, has done us proud over the years and we are fortunate indeed to have such an organ-

isation of this calibre working ceaselessly to protect Jewish life and the Jewish way of life.

That being said, the role of those of us not directly involved with it, cannot be passive. On the contrary, we need to assist the CSO in every way that we can, as individuals and at the institutional level.

This we can do through feeding through vital information to the CSO, co-operating with its operational requirements, ensuring that it is properly funded and heeding its expert advice when it comes to securing Jewish installations and public functions.

In general, we need to maintain a constant level of vigilance, always being on the look-out for possible attacks and feeding through information on suspicious activity to the CSO. We should also take care not to appear vulnerable.

As has been proven on many occasions, visible security acts as a real deterrent to potential attackers. None of this is about becoming fearful or paranoid. Rather, it is about recognising the reality of the potential dangers that face us and adopting a realistic approach towards meeting those challenges.

Yom Ha'atzmaut singing: An agreement is reached

WIZO's Tzabar group has reached an agreement with SAZF Chairman Avrom Krengel, to allow women to sing in a mixed choir at this year's Yom Ha'atzmaut celebrations.

The condition was that the group withdraw its petition against the SAZF programming, which has not allowed women to sing on stage over the past three years, reversing a six decade old tradition where women sang and denoted

Krengel said in a media release: "In response to various requests, the SAZF has agreed on a programme that will ensure that this year's celebrations include greater participation by women while still being respectful of our religious community."

Krengel said that the Yom Ha'atzmaut celebrations hosted by the SAZF in Johannesburg were the largest communal events of SA Jewry and attract over 5 000 participants every

"The SAZF goes to great lengths to make these celebrations as inclusive and

spectacular as possible.

"In recent years, the SAZF has organised events that are able to be attended by all sections of our community including the growing religious community of Johannesburg. This decision was made without any rabbinical interference or pressure and was done solely out of respect and appreciation for the dedication and commitment shown by the religious Zionist community of South Africa towards Israel and Zionism."

Naomi Dinur, a member of Tzabar, says the bible shows inclusion, for example: Song of songs 8,13 - "she who dwells in the gardens (male) companions listen to your voice, let me hear it", was the norm then.

"The rabbinic decree not allowing





BRITAIN OPPOSES ISRAELI IRAN STRIKE AT THIS TIME

NEW YORK - British Prime Minister David Cameron says his country has informed Jerusalem that it opposes an Israeli military strike against Iran at this time.

BILLS TO RELAX MARRIAGE REGISTRATION RULES PASS KNESSET COMMITTEE

JERUSALEM - Two bills that would allow Jewish couples in Israel to be married by national-religious rabbis in the city of their choice were approved by a Knesset committee.

The "Tzohar laws", named after the organisation of Modern Orthodox rabbis that performs alternative religious wedding ceremonies would remove jurisdictional hurdles that prevent the organisation's rabbis from performing wedding ceremonies recognised by the office of the Chief Rabbinate. (JTA)

AL-QAIDA CHIEF OFFERS SWAP FOR WEINSTEIN

JERUSALEM - Al-Qaida leader Ayman al-Zawahiri said he would swap an American hostage for prisoners in the US with links to the organisation.

In exchange for Warren Weinstein (70), Zawahiri called for the release of Sheikh Omar Abdul Rahman, the blind cleric convicted of attempting to blow up the World Trade Centre in the early 1990s; the family of Osama bin Laden, the assassinated leader of Al-Qaida; and Aafia Siddiqui, who was convicted in 2010 in New York for attempting to murder US government officials. (JTA)

CONVICTED NAZI WAR CRIMINAL JOHN DEMJANJUK DIES

BONN - John Demjanjuk, the Cleveland-area autoworker convicted for crimes he committed as a Nazi death camp guard, has died in a German nursing home.

Demjanjuk, 91, died last Saturday at an old-age home in southern Germany, where he was free while he appealed his conviction last year for his role in the murder of 28 060 people at the Sobibor death camp in Poland. (JTA)



World through Auschwitz lens amounts to Jewish and Israeli PTSD

Israelis and many US Jews seem to suffer from posttraumatic stress disorder, looking at events primarily through the framework of Auschwitz. Rabbi Lerner makes out a case against an Israeli first strike in Iran.

When I learned of the murder of dozens of members of my family in the Holocaust and then met my Israeli relatives whose Auschwitz numbers could hardly be missed on their arms, I decided to dedicate my life to challenging war, the denial of human rights, the hatred of minorities, and social and economic injustice.

I also wanted to challenge the breakdown of human solidarity and the fear that competitive societies generate in their citizens, which destroys the natural instinct of individuals to care for "the other" and lead people to grab on to fascistic pseudo-solutions to their growing misery.

Imagine my surprise, then, when I found that my own Jewish people, which for 2 000 years had fostered a religion of compassion, nonviolence, social justice, pursuing peace and generosity toward others, had responded to Auschwitz and the Holocaust by adopting a fear-based worldview

In this post-Holocaust period, power over others - rather than love, kindness and generosity (that is the teachings of our Torah) - would be our new way of identifying as Jews.

In so doing we began to give Hitler a victory he did not deserve and abandoned the G-d who was revealed as a force in the universe for chesed, loving-kindness, compassion and mercy. Instead, we worshipped at the altar of power and military might.

And the Jewish State became famous as the most powerful army in the Middle East.

I'm glad Israel is strong, and I've opposed those who seek to promote the campaign of Boycott,

Divestment and Sanctions against Israel (though I support BDS against the settlements of the West Bank).

I'm against those who sought to reduce US military aid to Israel. I was proud to have brought my son to Israel, sent him to high school there and been

there to wash his clothes and feed him every weekend during the time he served in one of the Israeli Defence Forces' scariest combat units, the paratroopers, praying that he would survive those perilous jumps.

But as a researcher at Tel Aviv and Hebrew Universities, I discovered that Israelis were suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder. They were seeing current events primarily through the framework of Auschwitz, the Holocaust and the sufferings of our life in exile.

I already had discovered in my work as a psychotherapist - before I became a rabbi or editor of Tikkun magazine - that a significant section of American Jews suffered from similar PTSD.

PTSD is the psychological category that does not attribute the distortions in perception to one's inner life. It acknowledges that there really was a trauma, but that the source of the trauma is no longer there.

American Jews are one of the most

politically and economically powerful groups in society, and Israel is one of the strongest military powers on Earth both in conventional and nuclear military power. Yet speak to many American Jews or Israelis and they feel totally insecure. They see Amalek, Haman or Hitler lurking in every enemy.

So the Palestinian people, without an army, has been seen consistently as Nazis. First Yasser Arafat, then Hezbollah and Hamas, and now Iran are seen as the embodiment of the Nazi threat.

As a result, Israel and many American Jews have been unable to respond to reasonable plans for a peace accord that have come from the Israeli peace movement and even from the Saudi peace proposal in 2002 - re-offered in 2007 - for peace and reconciliation between Israel and the entire Arah world

Not everyone has been completely unable to see that an attack on Iran by Israel - and the likely embroilment of the US in a war with Iran - will be a disaster for Israel and the US. Such an attack also likely would intensify anti-Semitism around the world based not on previous irrational beliefs that the Jews killed Jesus, but on the legitimate outrage of people around the world against any country that engages in a "pre-emptive first strike" against another.

In fact, in the first week of March, a poll showed that a majority of Israelis disagree with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and oppose a unilateral Israeli first strike.

The US did not take a pre-emptive strike against North Korea or any of the other Communist states with ideological fanatics at their helm - including the Soviet

Union and China when they developed nuclear war capacities - instead relying on its own nuclear capacity to wipe out any country that would attempt to strike at us.

Many Israelis recognise that the strategy of mutually assured destruction, which has kept the

world safe even with some countries having nuclear weapons, will keep Israel safe even if Iran has nuclear weapons.

It is only PTSD that makes it difficult for many American Jews and some Israeli hawks to recognise that as ideologically crazy as the Iranian government is today, there is zero reason to believe that it would be willing to have Iran bombed into oblivion by US and Israeli nuclear retaliation from a first strike by Iran.

PTSD so obscures our vision that many Jews have sided with US militarists who always like a good excuse to amp up the military-industrial complex.

It's time to heal from the distorted perceptions of seeing the world through the framework of Auschwitz.

Thanks to the vision of Women of the World, once again educationist Gavin Keller (pictured) has left teachers and parents of Johannesburg learners inspired and awe-struck with his incredible insight into the workings of young, developing brains.

Keller, as a guest speaker of WoW, reminded his audience our children were not adults, and treating them as such would only lead to a communication breakdown between parents and their offspring.

Starting with a well-balanced panel discussion with visiting Rabbi Akiva Tatz on "Raising Sane Children in an Insane Society", Keller started his lecture tour with the not so gentle intimation that society had actually evolved into what it was today.

That said, the only solution was that the "kids of today" were actually the sane ones, and it was the adults who were, in fact, insane!

Once we've come to terms with that mindnumbing fact, we should be one step further to understanding our "?-generation" children.

The venue was packed. During his talks on "The Talent Code", "Secrets of the Teenage Brain" and "Motivational DNA", he reinforced the concept of "Crocodile (animal/reactive) Brain", "Elephant (emotional) Brain", and "Thinking Brain".

If people thought they were only coming to listen, they were mistaken. Keller's interactive style ensures that everyone participates in his foot-stomping, arm-waving interludes, timed at regular intervals to guarantee that nobody's concentration wanes.



In order to better understand and educate today's children, one needs to know that we cannot expect them to think for themselves as their thought processes are not yet developed enough to make informed choices.

Parents and teachers, the adult influences and role models in our children's lives, need to guide them in the right direction and help them to make the choices best suited to them.

We need to encourage them in what they are most talented at in order for them to feel that they are able to achieve, although it may not be in similar areas to others.

Each child is unique and has his or herr own unique abilities. It is fundamental to their well-being and self-confidence that they are nurtured in the areas that they are good at.

Yet again, Keller has left his indelible mark on our community. And the adults of the future will only be better off for it.


He told delightful stories and anecdotes, and the number and variety of questions at the close of his talk bore testament to his ability to draw us all into the fasci-

nating world of these animals.


The evening was a great success. UJW is to be congratulated on a wonderful event.

Malema pronouncements hurt SA - Clem Sunter

Policy uncertainty in South Africa over mine nationalisation and potential land expropriation saw South Africa tumble last year from 44th place among the 59 member premier league economies to 52nd place in The World Competitiveness Year Book's rankings.

Scenario planner Clem Sunter, of consultancy Mind of a Fox, says there is a 50 per cent probability South Africa will

stay in the premier league; a 35 per cent chance it'll join the second division; and 15 per cent odds it'll become a failed state. Second division would mean exclusion from the G20; an inability to earn tax revenue and access finance; and its certain replacement by Nigeria among the fast-growing Brics nations.

Sunter was addressing the inaugural WIZO Forum recently at Beyachad.

Referring to the failed state possibility, Sunter says South Africa has got to get its ducks in a row on several red flags and one tendency - the latter best exemplified by Japan's tendency towards earthquakes.

Nationalisation of mines, poses the ques-

tion as to how government would pay for them. Government borrowings would push the country's debt-to-GDP ratio from 38 per cent to 138 per cent. Greece stands at 160 per cent.

A clumsy implementation of the mooted National Health Insurance would lead to a decline in private healthcare.

The imposition of a media tribunal to curb press freedom, allied with the ongoing undermining of the judiciary's inde-

pendence, would lead to a massive increase in corruption.

The potential for land grabs as occurred in Zimbabwe calls for an "Agridesa" (a play on SA's Codesa talks prior to 1994). This requires multi-party talks on the best way to implement land transfers to "a substantial number of good emerging farmers". A Zanu-PF government official recently admitted that Zimbabwe, from being the fastest growing country in Sadec, "hit the wall" after the invasion of white-owned farms.

The tendency in South Africa - a flag Western embassies failed to notice in the runup to the Arab Spring - is youth unemployment; the alienation of the youth from society as a result; and their use of social media to communicate their grievances.


Sunter's failed state scenario could be triggered by a random event caused by South Africa's 40-50 per cent unemployment rate among the 18-24 year olds, which would then spiral into political unrest.

Other flags are the country's education

system where on no account can the 5 000 performing schools out of a total 28 000 be allowed to be "dumbed-down".

The global scenario is likely to be one of hard times for the next five years, putting the onus on businesses to offer value for money and nations to work smarter as they move from the age of information to the age of intelligence.

The Israel Centre SA hosted its annual Higher Education Expo, from March 12 - 14 in Johannesburg and March 15 - 18 in CT.

Representatives of Israel by Choice (IBC) discussed their recommended Masa gap year programme. Masa representative, Rhoda Shochet, discussed the various longterm programmes available, as well as the

financial assistance that is provided. Ilan Wagner from the Jewish Agency spoke of the several short-term programmes the Jewish Agency has on offer, and finally Yehoshua Friedlander from Israel Centre's partnership region of Beit Shemesh, provided first-hand advice on aliyah and the process of integration into Israeli society.

Munich survivor is to be inducted into Hall of Fame

Six Israeli athletes are to be inducted this year into the International Jewish Sports Hall of Fame, covering a wide range of sporting disciplines.

The International Jewish Sports Hall of Fame has released the names of those who will be inducted this year.

While the Hall Of Fame is based at the Wingate Institute in Israel, the organisation behind it is American and as such, they hold the purse strings, so to speak, of who gets in.

This year they have honoured a basketball player, a figure skating champion, a fencer, a boxer a table tennis champ and an Israeli athlete who survived the terrorist attack on the Israeli team at the 1972 Munich Olympics.

The inductees are American Louis Bender, Petra Burka of Canada, Americans Sada Jacobson and Ben Jeby, Austrianborn Argentinian Erwin Kohn and Israeli Shaul Ladany

Starting at the end, Ladany was one of Israel's top race-walkers of the 1960s-70s and set the World 50-mile record in 1972, his 7:44:47,2 shattering the existing world mark that had endured since 1935. He was gold medallist at the '72 World Championships in the 100km event (9:31:00). Ladany was top walker at the US Championships five times between 1973 and 1981, winning the 75km champi-

onships from 1974 to 1977, and the 100km title in 1974.

He won championships in Belgium 1971 and 1972; Switzerland 1972; and South Africa 1975. As an eight-year old in Belgrade, Yugo-

slavia during the Second World War, Shaul was sent to the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp. A US-inspired ransom deal saved 2 000 camp prisoners, of which he was one, and brought him to the United

After the state of Israel became into being in 1948, Ladany emigrated to the Jewish homeland where he began his track career as a marathoner, but changed to walking in the early 1960s.

He was the lone male member of the 1972 Israeli Olympic men's track team, and one of only five who survived the Arab terrorist attack that claimed the lives of 11 team members. The Olympic Games in London this year will mark anniversary of the attack.

Boxer Ben Jeby was world middleweight champion in 1933, beating Frankie Battaglia.

Canada's Petra Burka won the World Figure Skating Championship in 1965. A year earlier, she took the bronze medal at the 1964 Winter Olympic Games. Burka also won bronze at the 1964 and 1966 World Championships.

The Netherlands-born figure skater, who emigrated to Canada in 1951, was the first woman to land a triple salchow in competition, achieving the feat en route to winning the 1965 Canadian Figure Skating Championship. She also won the 1964 and 1966 Canadian titles.

Petra was named Canada's Outstanding Athlete of the Year in 1964, and twice,



1964 and 1965, was Canada's Outstanding Female Athlete of the Year. Petra is the daughter of 2010 Hall Of Fame figure skating honoree Ellen Burka

In 2004, Sada Jacobson was ranked No 1 in women's World Sabre rankings, the only American to ever reach the top position. At the age of 17, she won a team gold medal at the 2000 World Championships, and a second team gold in 2005.

At the 2004 and 2006 World Championships, Sada earned a pair of team silver medals, as well as an Individual bronze in 2006. At the Olympic Games

Sada captured an individual silver and team bronze in 2008, and an individual bronze in 2004. The Yale University undergraduate was NCAA collegiate sabre champion in 2001 and 2002, and US women's sabre champion in 2004

and 2006. She was US Fencer of the Year in

New York-born Ben Jeby was world middleweight champion in 1933. He won his title on January 13 1933 in a 12-round TKO over Frankie Battaglia. Following several successful title defences, Jeby lost the championship to Lou Brouillard on August 9 1933.

Jeby had his first pro fight in 1927 at the age of 17, and didn't get a crack at the title until five-and-a half-years later, when reigning world champion Marcel Thil vacated his middleweight crown. Jeby fought 73 pro fights, winning 54 (22 by KO), drew 4, lost 14 (12 by KO) with one no-contest.

Austrian Erwin Kohn won the 1936 World Doubles Table Tennis Championship (with Richard Bergman), and his Austrian team won the Swathling Cup, the men's team World Table Tennis Championship.

In 1932 and 1935, Kohn took bronze in Men's World Singles. In 1933 (with Paul Flussmann) and 1934 (with Miroslav Hamr), he earned bronze medals in men's World Doubles. In 1929, at the age of 17, and again in 1934, Kohn's Austrian team were silver medallists at the World Championships and bronze finishers in 1932, 1933 and 1935.

Kohn was Austria's national table tennis champion by the age of 16, and European champion at 17.

In 1938, at the outset of the Second World War, Kohn escaped to England and then emigrated to Argentina where he dominated table tennis between 1940 and

Basketball player Louis Bender, Columbia University All-America 1930 and 1932, and All Ivy League 1930, 1931 and 1932, was the Ivy League's top scorer in 1930 and 1931, and one of, if not the most, celebrated major college stars of his era. He led his Columbia Lions to League championships in 1930 and 1931

Bender played professionally from

1934 to 1941 - with the Boston Celtics (1934-35), Union City Reds (1936-37), Boston Trojans (1938-40) and New York Whirlwinds (1941).

Also honoured are New York Times sportswriter Murray Chass and Bill Davidson, majority owner of the National Basketball League's Detroit Pistons from the summer of 1974 until his passing in March 2009,
