### HAREDI ORTHODOX RABBIS DECRY **DANGERS OF INTERNET**

NEW YORK - Haredi Orthodox rabbis issued grave warnings about the dangers of the Internet to a sellout crowd at the New York Mets' Citi Field last week Sunday.

Speaking to the audience of 40 000 men, almost all of whom wore black hats, one speaker compared the threat of the Internet to the dangers that Zionism and the European Enlightenment posed in the past to traditional Jewish life. In particular, they decried the Internet's potential to distract yeshiva students. Several rabbis said that Jewish law forbade Jews from browsing the Internet without a filter that blocked inappropriate sites.

"The internet even with a filter is a minefield of immorality," said Rabbi Ephraim Wachsman. "This issue is the test of the generation. Your strength at this gathering will determine what Judaism will look like a few years from now.'

The rally was organised by a Haredi Orthodox group called Ichud HaKehillos L'Tohar Hamachane, or Union Communities for Purity of the Camp.

About 50 people protested the event across the street from the stadium. Many of the protesters came from Footsteps, a New York-based organisation that helps people who leave Haredi Orthodox life to integrate into non-Haredi society. (JTA)

# Bringing the desert to life

The Parsha Bamidbar (literally "in the Desert") is always read on the Shabbat before Shavuot. Even more specifically this year it is read on the day before Shavuot! There must be a connection.

Shavuot is the festival celebrating our having received the Torah at Mount Sinai, and clearly it was all part of the plan that the Torah was given to us in the Desert. No-man's land, a place that meant that no-one could claim that the Torah is exclusively theirs; it has meaning and messages for all mankind everywhere.

But perhaps the most poignant meaning of the Parsha in relation to the Giving of The Torah and Shavuot, is that there

In this way we will be able to once again justify G-d's having chosen us to keep His Torah, and at the same time we will be able to turn the deserts of time and space into fertile and productive environs, enhancing the world each step of the way.

# Shavuot - celebrating the Giving of the Torah

This week sees the end of the Omer, seven weeks since the second day of Pesach, and the communal celebration of the festival of Shavuot, which starts on Saturday evening, May 26 and ends on Monday evening, May 28 (see candle-lighting times, for all the national centres, on this page). In Hebrew, the word Shavuot means "weeks", referring to the seven weeks just counted, but in truth, the festival is a repository for many other values, traditions and observances.

For one thing, it celebrates the Giving of the Torah to the Jews. The Talmud tells us that G-d gave the Ten Commandments to the Jews on the sixth night of the Hebrew month of Sivan. Shavuot always falls 50 days after the second night of Passover.

Further, in biblical times Shavuot also marked the beginning of the new agricultural season and was called Hag HaKatzir, which means "The Festival of the Harvest".

Shavuot is also called Hag HaBikkurim, meaning "The Holiday of First Fruits". This last name comes from the practice of bringing fruits to the Temple on Shavuot, a tradition which has been corrupted in terms of children making their own baskets of fruit and bringing them to shul on the second day of Shavuot. Prizes are traditionally given to the most beautiful, and the fruits are donat-

ed to the poor. Shavuot observation is rich with several important details, including Tikkun Leil, on the first night of the festi-

val, a mystical tradition upheld with all-night learning sessions; the reading of the Book of Ruth, one of Judaism's more interesting love stories focusing on history but also harvest (Ruth was a convert, and was King David's great-greatgrandmother); hearing the Ten Commandments in the Torah reading; as well as reciting Yizkor in memory of one's lost relatives, on the sec ond day of Yomtov.

Traditionally, one eats dairy foods on Shavuot, such as cheesecake and blintzes. The origins of this particular custom are vague; some sources attribute it to a passage from The Song of Songs.

# Re-labelling: Davies accused of 'politicising a trade issue'

Outrage, confusion and delight have been some of the reactions to the government's call for comment on proposals that would compel local importers to re-label goods made in the West Bank settlements.

In the Government Gazette issued last week, Trade and Industry Minister Rob Davies, announced that importers would no longer be permitted to "incorrectly label products that originate from the Occupied Palestinian Territory (OPT) as products of Israel".

The notice stated that SA recognition of Israel pertained "only within the borders demarcated by the United Nations in 1948", and not to the territories captured in 1967.

Open Shuhada Street, a pro-Palestinian group based in Cape Town, was named as the source of allegations that products of Ahava were being identified as products that originated in Israel, whereas they originated from

Speaking in Parliament on Monday, Davies nevertheless stressed that while the government's view was that consumers had the right to know where goods were produced, there was no intention of promoting a boycott of goods from either Israel or the West Bank.

In a media statement responding to the notice, the SA Jewish Board of Deputies urged that South Africa not adopt a policy that was "discriminatory and inconsistent with how it deals with similar questions relating to products imported from other parts of the world".

The statement also accused Davies of having "politicised a technical trade issue", noting that his decision to issue the notice had been based solely on representations made by those with "a pronounced anti-Israel political agenda", whereas he had repeatedly declined to

meet with the Board to hear its views on the issue: "The question of products originating from disputed territories is a technically complicated one. In addressing it, the SAJBD urges the SA government not to prejudge the

"We believe that in line with the consultative ethos of SA, it is regrettable that the Minister has decided to gazette this issue without broad consultation."

The SA Zionist Federation deplored the fact that the minister had evidently chosen to rely on "the narrow views of lobby groups whose stated aims are to enforce a regime of boycotts and sanctions against Israel".

The minister's notice was greeted with widespread outrage within Israel. Foreign Ministry spokesman Yigal Palmor, described the stated intention of labelling Israeli products from the settlements as "crossing a red line", and that it "reflected the sour state of ties between the two countries".

It was reported in the Jerusalem Post that the Foreign Ministry had attempted to summon SA Ambassador to Tel Aviv Ismail Coovadia to protest the proposal, but that he had turned off his phone. Foreign Minister Avigdor Lieberman levelled outright charges of racism against SA for its discriminatory anti-Israel policies.

By contrast, the Government Gazette notice was greeted with predictable glee by BDS activists. Local BDS spokesman Muhammad Desai, said that the requirement to re-label products originating in the West Bank was just the beginning of a worldwide campaign to achieve an effective economic boycott of all Israeli goods".

At the time of writing, a meeting between Minister Davies and the SAJBD had been scheduled, to take place shortly.

# Finkelstein's UKZN lecture canned

Local Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) activists were accorded another victory last Sunday when the University of KwaZulu-Natal (UKZN) cancelled a lecture scheduled for the next day by Israel Deputy Ambassador Yaakov Finkelstein.

In an e-mail to university staff informing them of the cancellation, Deputy Vice Chancellor Joseph Ayee gave the "negative publicity" that would result from the visit, as the reason for the cancellation. He wrote: "I believe that for an event to be held under a cloud, with likely reputational damage for the institution, is not in the interest of all of us.'

Israeli embassy spokesman, Hila Stern,

said that the lecture had been cancelled in cooperation with UKZN since the threats and intimidation of the campaign against it had reached a level where there was a genuine threat to the deputy ambassador's safety".

While welcomed by BDS proponents, UKNZ's decision drew condemnation beyond the confines of the Jewish community. Department of International Relations and Co-operation spokesman Clayson Monyela, said that the stance taken by a "private institution" did not reflect the views of the government, which had "cordial bilateral relations with Israel". Freedom of Expression Institute Chairman Prof Anton Harber, expressed concern that someone had been prohibited from speaking on campus for the reasons given by UKZN.

# Eroding government's 'correctness' towards Israel

A troubling aspect of the saga about the requirement for re-labelling of "Israeli" products produced in the West Bank (see stories on page 3) as coming from the Occupied Palestinian Territory (OPT) is the way in which the government's new position was announced and comments invited.

Why was it gazetted with only the anti-Israel lobby being consulted and no prior consultation with the "other side" - those who support Israel? Whether the government accepted or rejected the Israeli supporters' views, there should have been genuine consultation beforehand.

When lines of communication are blocked or not utilised on important issues, one gets the impression that the government is not interested in hearing all sides - that the decisions have already been made behind the scenes and they are simply going through the motions, as required by the law.

This impression is reinforced by the futile attempts of the SAJBD to get a meeting with Trade and Industry Minister Rob Davies. It begs the question whether an agenda against Israel is being implemented by stealth - covertly one step at a time - without it being announced as such.

It is well known that the ANC has a special relationship with the Palestinians, born out of their closeness during the anti-apartheid Struggle, and only a "correct" relationship with Israel, lacking any warmth.

If this regulation becomes law, will it impact negatively on trade? Israeli products - whichever way they are labelled - are widely used in South Africa in agriculture, IT, hi-tech, medicine, etc. Ways may simply be found around the proposed regulations or restrictions.

Whatever happens, however, the re-labelling will be another step in the process of delegitimising Israel, pursued by the "baying for blood" anti-Israel lobby.

How can this requirement be implemented in such a complex reality? For example, if a particular product is made in Tel Aviv, but the paint with which it is coated comes from Jericho, must it be labelled "Israeli" or "OPT"? How will the government police it?

An equally worrying feature of the regulation is that only the borders demarcated by the 1948 UN resolution on the creation of Israel will qualify for labelling as "Made in Israel". This is strange, since even the Palestinians - at least those willing to talk to Israel - and most countries around the world, de facto recognise Israel's borders as at June 4, 1967. That is, the borders before the Six Day War, during which Israel captured the West Bank.

That boundary is the basis for negotiations between Israel and the Palestinians towards a two-state solution - although mutually agreed modifications might eventually be made to it.

Furthermore, the official position of the SA government is to support such a two-state solution. So why is Davies now talking about the 1948 borders?

The increasingly hostile atmosphere towards Israel was illustrated by another event which, coincidentally, also occurred this week, namely the cancellation of a talk by Deputy Israeli Ambassador Yaakov Finkelstein, at the University of KwaZulu-Natal.

This decision was taken by the university administration together with the Israeli embassy, because the deputy ambassador's safety was difficult to guarantee in the environment of "intimidation and threats" on the campus (according to the statement of the ambassador's spokesman).

If Israeli diplomats and other public figures become unable to even talk on South African campuses, what happens to the notions of freedom of expression and dialogue South Africans fought for during the anti-apartheid struggle?

The anti-Israel lobby is obviously celebrating current events as adding to the momentum of isolating Israel and making it a pariah state. After a certain point, this label becomes self-reinforcing - it spills over to people who know little or nothing about the complex situation, but take it as read and think there must be justification to the label. Once this image is established, it is very difficult to shake off or overturn it.

There is vigorous debate in Israel itself about its policies in the West Bank, but most Israelis are also deeply concerned at the success the anti-Israel lobby is having in branding it a pariah state.

# Is Tel Aviv or Jerusalem the real Israel?

There's a long-running dispute among Israelis about which city better represents Israel's true face: Tel Aviv or Jerusalem. One is a symbol of the historical and religious yearning of the Jewish people, the country's political capital and a microcosm of the state's divisions: religious and secular, Arab and Jewish, rich and poor.

The other has comparatively little historical baggage, looks more like Mediterranean Europe than the Middle East, prizes secular culture and liberalism more than it does tradition and religion, and is the country's cultural capital.

Sha'anan Streett, founder and lead singer of the popular Israeli hiphop band Hadag Nahash, sings about being pulled between these twin poles of Israeli society in the band's hit song "Hine Ani Ba" ("Here I Come").

In an interview in 2009, Streett, who lives in Jerusalem, said Tel Aviv unquestionably was the symbol of Israel and Israeliness today.

Two public demonstrations on back-to-back weekends in 2009 epitomised the differences between the two cities. When Tel Aviv held its annual gay pride parade in mid-June 2009, Mayor Ron Huldai was at the centre of the festive, irreverent celebration, which drew thousands of party-goers and culminated in the mayor's presiding over a sunset wedding on the city's Gordon Beach for five gay couples. The weddings were not official; Israel does not recognise gay marriage

A week earlier, Jerusalem also saw thousands take to the streets for a rally that drew thousands of haredi Orthodox Israelis protesting the opening on the Sabbath of a parking lot near the Old City. The demonstration, which Israeli media described as a riot, prompted the city's police chief to ask Mayor Nir Barkat to shut down the parking garage for the next two Saturdays, until a plan for keeping the peace could be put in place. Barkat agreed.

Those different crowds on backto-back weekends in Israel's two largest cities were a symbol of the gulf that lies between 3 000-yearold Jerusalem and 100-year-old Tel Aviv, though the two cities are only a 50-minute car ride apart.

Yuval Turm, a physician from Shoresh, a suburb of Jerusalem, says Tel Aviv is not the real Israel. "Jerusalem is really a balagan," Turm said, using the Hebrew word for hullabaloo. "Tel Aviv is more ordered. It looks more like a European city. It's not really Israeli."

Many Israelis, from the hills of Judea to the kibbutzim of the Negev, identify Tel Aviv with all that's wrong with contemporary Israel: creeping materialism, a dearth of Zionism, detachment from the travails of those who live in Israel's conflict zones, near Gaza and Lebanon.

"Their willingness to contribute to the state is zero," an outgoing police chief in the West Bank, Shlomo Katabi, said of Tel Avivis in a June 2009 interview with Army Radio. "They sit in Tel Aviv, park their SUVs on Sheinkin Street, drink espresso with their legs crossed and allow themselves to criticise (Jewish settlers in the West Bank)."

Katabi's barb against Tel Aviv was emblematic of the irritation many feel about the city, a stronghold of the political left.

When southern Israel came under fire during Israel's 2009 military operation in Gaza - with cities including Beersheva, Ashdod and Yavne suffering rocket strikes - Israeli media was filled with commentators decrying the lack of concern among Tel Avivis.

By the same token, many Tel Avivis look down their noses at Jerusalem - and by extension, the rest of the country - as parochial, uncultured and fraught with conflict.

"Tel Aviv has become some kind of antithesis to all this," said Yehuda Melzer, a philosophy professor and founder of the small Tel Aviv publishing house Books in the Attic. "One of the great attractions of Tel Aviv is that it's so unlike Jerusalem."

Tel Aviv is an "oasis of normalcy in an insane country," wrote Gideon Levy, a columnist for Israel's daily Haaretz, in a scathing response to Katabi's barb about Tel Avivis.

"Between the espresso and the SUV arise art, culture, finance, science, intellect, media, openness and a healthy (albeit insufficient) introspection of the State of Israel, without which it has no real backbone." (JTA)

### LIEBERMAN 'UNBEARABLE' AS GOVERNMENT MINISTER

JERUSALEM - Austria's defence minister has called Israeli Foreign Minister Avigdor Lieberman's participation in the government "unbearable".

In an interview published last week Sunday in the Austrian daily Die Presse, Norbert Darabos said: "Honestly, the fact that Minister Lieberman is a member of the Israeli government is unbearable."

Darabos also called Israel's threats to attack Iran's nuclear facilities "unnecessary", since "Iran can't build a bomb yet".

He said an Israeli attack on Iran "would spark an uncontrollable fire in the region and will create solidarity and empathy for Iran in the Arab world and the world at large".

Darabos said Israel complained about Iran and the Palestinians' unwillingness to come to the peace table in order to shift focus from "internal social issues". (JTA)

However, there's a right way and a wrong way of disagreeing with something, and my "Yodelling Yentas" offering of two weeks ago was clearly in the latter category.

One does not bring people with whom one has differences closer by belittling their beliefs. Moreover, as the SAJBD works to resolve intra-communal differences and as I am an SAJBD employee, I should never have taken sides.

There, Dennis Davis (in his The Jury is Out column) is certainly right. I can only apologise to all concerned and, suitably chastened, pledge to behave myself in future.

But it's only fair to explain why I, too, have issues. Specifically, the bristling antagonism one finds against the Torah-observant community sometimes becomes a little too much.

I am outraged when our rabbonim, whom we respect and trust, are falsely depicted as narrow-minded, bullying fanatics. It is insulting when serious Orthodox Jews like myself are glibly dismissed as intellectually challenged Mediaeval morons.

The complacent portrayal of Orthodox women as cowed, desexualised and repressed non-persons; has anyone considered that such women might consider this offensive?

Jeremy Gordin was very much guilty of this. I think it's only fair to warn him that my ex-Beth Yaakov daughter is after his blood, and I don't know how long I can continue to restrain her. Run, Jeremy, run!

To Mr Justice Davis, I would like to pose the following: How would you react if someone came into your courtroom and, based on his layman's reading of the SA Law Reports, informed you you were getting it wrong?

The answer hardly need be spelled out. Like it or not, the same things applies when it comes to determining the halacha. The trained rabbonim, in particular the Gedolim of each generation, are entrusted with this.

Express a view by all means, but less stridency, and more humility is called for. Regarding the on-going religious upsurge in the Jewish community, I would also urge that those who are not a part of it put aside for a

while whatever knee-jerk prejudices they may be harbouring and make an effort to learn why so large and growing a proportion of the community are devoting their lives to it.

The art of gentle, persuasive kiruv is not my strong point, so I'll say no more on that.

A few years ago, a group of mainly secular and left-leaning Jews in South Africa concluded that there was insufficient space in the community for more "pluralistic" expressions of what it meant to be Jewish.

Their response was not to go into victim mode and rail against Orthodox dominance. Instead, they launched Limmud, the extraordinary success of which we all know.

This was not aimed at being a snookcocking secular-liberal challenge to the Orthodox establishment; on the contrary, every effort was made to bring the latter on board.

The objective was to celebrate the totality of Jewish experience as they believed it should be experienced, and I respect them for it, even while disagreeing with their worldview.

Perhaps SACRED should have taken a leaf out of Limmud's book. In order to meaningfully address its members' concerns, they should define themselves by what they are for, not what they are against, by being positive and proactive, not negative.

It is pointed out that SACRED aims at much more than resolving the women singing issue, but is looking to pursue a range of activities such as HIV status and drug use.

That is to be welcomed, certainly, and hopefully in future it will focus on implementing one or other of these projects, rather than opting to go the protest route.

While it is at best, a partial excuse, when I have used the word "yenta" in the past, it has been in reference to Jewish women in general. Once, for example, I used it in reference to

It has since been pointed out to me that the traditional meaning of the term is much less benign

To conclude, while I belong to the religious Orthodox community and work for the SAJBD, when I write in this forum I should not be seen as being a spokesman for either. Just regard me as another columnist, a slightly meshugah one, who gets it wrong some-

With tail jammed halfway up my nether regions, I now leave the stage so that cooler and wiser heads can take over.

### IGNORANCE IS NOT AN EXCUSE FOR ARROGANCE AND RUDENESS

I was, to say the least, unhappy about David Saks' Barbaric Yawp column on "Yodelling Yentas". While I understand his frustration, it does not warrant such a column which makes fun of and denigrates these women.

Having said that, Jeremy Gordin not only denigrates religious women, but goes further to pass judgement on all ("irrational") religious observance which he defines as sects unless they follow his way of rational thinking.

Modern Jewish Orthodoxy in Israel has for years supplied a solid core of officers in the IDF ("they have hardly played a starring role in the creation and defence of the State"according to Gordin). In today's modern world, religious Orthodox Jews include among their number, nuclear physicists, geneticists, lawyers, judges, engineers etc.

Modern Orthodox women, many of whom wear sheitels, are well groomed, attractive, confident members of their shuls and society in general. Many are professionals. Many of the Jews living in Johannesburg would be defined as haredim (fundamentalists by Jeremy). They are certainly not confined to the kitchen.

One wonders whether non-Orthodox women who choose to stay home and look after the children and family, are denigrated in the same way.

Ignorance is not an excuse for arrogance and rudeness and Jeremy's article is full of all of these traits.

Let me try and approach the subject in a logical fashion. If I had a friend who was opposed to ritual slaughter and I wanted to take him out for a meal, I would choose a restaurant that satisfied both our needs eg a kosher, dairy (chalav yisroel) restaurant. If I insisted on a meat restaurant, I would be unreasonable.

After all, I have no obligation to eat meat at every meal and my friend has a belief that, while I don't share it, allows me to accommodate him. I cannot insist on going to a meat restaurant and when he refuses to participate, accuse him of breaking up our friendship.

I accept that many find women's voices spiritually uplifting in prayers and they are entitled to. While women should be allowed to sing in public, they are not obligated to.

If Dennis Davis does not want to split the Jewish community, if the community wants everyone to be able to attend, then where possible, they need to be sensitive to the needs of all the groups. There has to be a difference between "I have the right" and what is good for the unity of the community.

A few years ago, at a Yom Hashoah ceremony, there was a solo female vocalist. The Chief Rabbi didn't make a fuss; he got up quietly and moved away. He was castigated because, as the Chief Rabbi he is rabbi to all of SA Jewry and he had no right to observe the Torah laws according to his interpretation.

Obligation versus "I have the right". What next, Dennis, do we compromise on kashrut and then on the sanctity of Shabbat in order to show solidarity? Supporting SACRED is too heavy a price to pay because it appears that they hold their rights above what many Orthodox communities hold to be "SACRED", ie the laws of the Torah. Respect, empathy, understanding and courtesy is a two way street.

Many of us make an effort to be part of community celebrations. Don't make it impossible for us to attend by including items that make it impossible for us to be there and then accuse us of splitting the community. I will fight for your right to interpret as you believe; give me and those who believe like me the same courtesy.

### RELIGIOUS PEOPLE ARE PUSHING JEWS INTO ASSIMILATION



Roger Cohen, columnist for The New York Times, recently spoke at the RCHCC. Like Rabbi Lerner, he states that Israel has a "victim" mentality that lingers from the Holocaust. He also admits he has few ties to religion but has found two quotes that he likes: "Do unto others as you would have done unto you", (from Hillel), and that we should "remember we were strangers in a strange land".

He applies this to Israel's "maltreatment" of the Palestinians. I would like to point out that Israel has accepted more refugees than any other Middle-Eastern country, for instance from Sudan and Darfur. I refer here entirely to non-Jews.

# Re-labelling: Both inconsistent and discriminatory

At the time of writing, the Board is wrestling with the complex question of how products originating from Jewish settlement blocs in the West Bank should be labelled. This is in response to a notice in the Gazette issued by the SA Department of Trade and Industry to the effect that such products should not continue to be labelled products of Israel since they originate in "occupied Palestinian territory".

The notice called for the public's input, and the Board intends making such a submission. We are working closely with other Jewish communal organisations with an interest in the matter, as well as consulting with the relevant experts in the field, including trade

Our objections to these developments have as much to do with procedural as substantive questions. The decision

taken by the Minister was based solely on representations made to him by a single lobby group, one with a pronounced anti-Israel political agenda.

Despite repeated approaches from the SAJBD, he has declined to allow us an opportunity of participating in the conversation. As we stated in our press release, it was regrettable that notwithstanding the consultative ethos of South Africa, the Minister had decided to gazette the issue without broad consultation.

The question of products originating from disputed territories is a technically complicated one. Sometimes, it is tied up with the terms of free trade agreements, as is the case between Israel and the EU coun-

In the South African context, however, any changes to current labelling policies would be based primarily on political criteria. From the politically loaded wording of the Gazette notice, there is no doubt that the Minister has largely prejudged the issue and in doing so politicised what should be considered a technical trade-related ques-

In our press statement, we also urged that South Africa not adopt a policy that was "discriminatory and inconsistent with how it deals with similar questions relating to products imported from other parts of the world".

In other words, making it a legal requirement that only products from the disputed territory of the West Bank be labelled accordingly would certainly seem to constitute both inconsistency and dis-

crimination. In order to deflect such accusations, South African policy would have to require that products originating from all disputed territories to be labelled as such. This would include such disputed territories as Tibet, North Cyprus, Kashmir and Western Sahara.

Because of the sensitive nature of the processes involved, both from a legal and a political point of view, the exact nature of the steps we are considering obviously cannot be discussed at this stage. What I can do is assure the community that we view this latest challenge to the SA-Israel relationship in a serious light and will leave no stone unturned in our efforts to address it.



# A 'Boykie from Klerksdorp' did it his way

From humble beginnings at the "Klerksdorp Record", meandering through many a radio station in South Africa and surrounding countries, John Berks finally found his niche at "Talk Radio 702" in Johannesburg, which gave him iconic status.

At a United Zionist Luncheon Club meeting in Johannesburg last week, Berks (pictured) reminisced about the many twists and turns his professional career took, from the time he left school after (then) standard eight, to fleetingly work for the local Klerksdorp Record before moving on to the Germiston Advocate.



He always had the dream to be a radio announcer and had been influenced by the top South African cricket commentator of the 1940s and 1950s, Charles Fortune.

At the Germiston Advocate he "mostly tried to sell advertising". A journalist he wasn't and one day the editor called him in and told him bluntly: "Journalism is not your forte."

It was just that time that Lourenco Marques Radio was starting up and he went to audition for it.

"The SABC had a monopoly on radio and LM Radio was based in Mozambique as the first independent radio station broadcasting popular music into South Africa. It was in the early 1950s." Lourenco Marques is now Maputo.

"I failed five auditions in a row but was accepted after the sixth. It was Europe by the sea. I spent four and a half years there."

There were David Davis, David Gresham, Leslie Sullivan, Darryl Jooste, Gary Edwards, Barry O'Donoghue and the greatest of them all, Clackie McKay.

"In the 1960s we introduced The Beatles into South Africa (they were banned by the SABC) and we brought in the sound of Liverpool and the Swinging Sixties; it was the time of Mary Quant, mini-skirts and all that."

Berks told how he and David Gresham would go around on a Friday evening and collect local Jews and go to the wonderful shul that was in LM.

"In 1970 I left LM Radio and joined Springbok Radio in Johannesburg as a continuity announcer. Springbok was the first commercial radio station in South Africa.

"Remember Eyes Right With Eyegene? There was Mike Silver, Bob Courtney and Pick a Box, Squad Cars and Consider Your Verdict and also excellent Afrikaans drama. There were wonderful people working there - Dougie Laws, Neville Dawson, Hugh Rouse and Leslie Green.

"The nearby Federal Hotel was our watering hole and the pub there was known as 'Studio 13'."

Berks left Springbok Radio to join Radio 5, which was just starting up, taking over LM Radio... After a spell there he relocated to Port St Johns and worked at Capital Radio. It did not last and in the meanwhile Swazi Music Radio was set up by Natie and Issie Kirsh and he joined. Three years later it became 702 Music Radio.

"Then freedom came to South Africa in the early 1990s," Berks said, "and we realised that we needed a talk radio station, because previously almost everything seemed to be banned by the Nationalist government. 702 Talk Radio became extremely powerful..." He mentioned John Robbie, Jenny Crwys Williams and David O'Sullivan as three top radio personalities there today.

Issie Kirsh tried to set up Ram Radio in Israel and Palestine, with studios in Jerusalem and Ramallah. Kirsh believed that if, as at Talk Radio 702 in South Africa people could talk openly to each other, the same could happen between Israelis and Palestinians.

Even Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat gave the venture his blessing.

Berks spent 15 months there, but the concept did not work there.

"The sensitivity in Israel was so great that the nitty gritty was that talk didn't succeed," said Berks.

Berks left the following thought with his audience: "Let there be no regrets; how good it was for a Boykie from Klerksdorp. I was grateful to have done all this."

There is a street named after John Berks in Klerksdorp...

# ISRAELI REPORT RECOMMENDS SURROGATE MOTHERS FOR GAY MEN

JERUSALEM - An Israeli Health Ministry committee has recommended that gay men be allowed to use a surrogate mother to have a child.

The report issued last Sunday by the 12-member panel recommends that gay men and single women be allowed to conceive children with a surrogate mother and married women to be surrogates, Haaretz reported. It also permits non-anonymous sperm donation.

While gay men may gain the right to use a surrogate mother, the report only allows them to use a volunteer or altruistic surrogate, which will make finding a surrogate more difficult, according to Haaretz. Family members also will be allowed to serve as surrogates as long as they are not daughters, grandmothers or grandchildren.

Ethicists, doctors and social workers were among the members of the committee, which was appointed two years ago to make recommendations on fertility and birth policies. (JTA)



# Womersley's power and scale of vision atones for weak plot

The Australian Outback may seem an unlikely setting for a ghost story, yet it is in fact peculiarly apposite.

Bereft by Chris Womersley (Quercus, R179)

Perhaps the pitiless aridity of the region - its stark inhospitability, depleting heat and multitudes of hidden, magical creatures - lends itself to the otherworldly, or maybe the puniness of individuals in this enormous, ancient scrubland invites the intercession of spirits.

But the remarkable ability of Chris Womersley to weave sky, earth and the unseen together has a lot to do with this novel's ultimate impact.

In the prelude to the book, 16-year-old Quinn Walker and his adored 12-year-old sister, Sarah - his inseparable companion - are out rambling one afternoon in 1908. However, when the children fail to return home, their father goes searching for them - and comes upon the ravaged corpse of Sarah, with his son standing over it, holding a knife.

Terrified, the boy flees, and is thereafter assumed by both his family and the rest of the town to have been his sister's murderer.

Ten years later, a severely traumatised Quinn - who has not been heard of since the tragedy - returns from four years in the bloodiest European trenches of the Great War and makes his painful, hesitant way home to Flint.


Stealing into the house, he finds his mother on her deathbed, a victim of the influenza epidemic sweeping Australia. Although unsure of how to tell her who really killed Sarah, Quinn gradually reconnects with her, but remains too afraid to confront his father.

Forced to hide out in the scrub around the town, Quinn meets a 12-year-old orphan, Sadie Fox. Like him, she is a fugitive and unbearably lonely; and - eerily like Sarah - she has access to phantoms, fiends and spectral companions with whom she communes continually.

"I know about lots of things," she tells him. "I know about the wind and stars, about what happens in rivers." The two forge a close bond.

The need to overcome loss - of loved ones, of innocence, of faith and hope - underpins the book.

"Sometimes the dead are trapped in an awful halfway world until they can say something to those left behind. Indeed, the living are sometimes themselves trapped, until they hear what the dead might have to tell them. There are some things that cannot be left unsaid," Quinn is told by a clairvoyant.



Another theme is

that of willing people and events into existence through sheer determination. Quinn's mother asks: "Would you think it possible to imagine someone into being? With nothing but love?" Later, Sadie tells him: "I prayed you here."

The novel's plot is weak and predictable, for the author – having conjured up a cast of compelling characters – seems unsure of where to take them. The book's villains are also far less credible than its heroes. However, the power and scale of Womersley's vision in coalescing war and peace, guilt and punishment, grief and repletion, brutality and beneficence – atones for much.

His imagery is beautiful, his conviction overwhelming and his atavistic imagination haunting.



# Bass shortlisted for Caine Prize for African writing

"A really big shock" is how Jenna Bass describes her reaction at being one of five shortlisted for the annual Caine Prize for African Writing for her story Hunter Emmanuel. The 25-year-old filmmaker has been writing for as long as she can remember.

After matriculating at Herzlia, Bass studied film at AFDA. About a year ago, she cofounded and now edits a bi-monthly pulp-fiction magazine - Jungle Jim - that showcases African writers in the detective, Western, sci-fi and horror genres. Hunter Emmanuel was

published in one of its editions.

"It's the kind of writing that's often not considered serious in literary circles and not really deemed fit for literary journals," she explains of the publication, "and a lot of writers don't really feel that it's worth their time. We wanted to have a magazine where we could publish this kind of writing because we feel it's very important to learn how to tell stories - it's a great starting point.

"The rest of the world, in many ways, doesn't understand Africa," she continues.

"If you want to show them a different side, a great way is by means of things they understand - by way of genre elements - and then using that as a springboard.

"I feel that there's so much to be learnt from that way of writing's 'egolessness', where it isn't about you as this artist, but about telling the story and the characters. I found that very exciting and liberating."

She hopes her nomination for the prize will establish a connection between the literary world and pulp." She feels one of the spinoffs of her nomination is that it has brought the issue of using Western ways of telling stories in the African situation to the public arena.



# Afrika Tikkun: run by people driven by passion


Bertram 'Bertie' Lubner Co-founder and chairman of Afrika Tikkun

Some people just have that aura about them that says: "I genuinely care". "If I could touch the lives of ordinary people in need, even a few, I would have made a bold move that takes this world a step closer to being a better place for them, their families and communities." This statement epitomises who Bertie Lubner is.

Lubner, recipient of the Order of Meritorius Service and past chairman and joint CEO of the PG Group, started Afrika Tikkun together with the late Chief Rabbi Cyril Harris. Known then as "Tikkun", the organisation was essentially a Jewish communityled initiative that implemented projects to uplift children and people from previously disadvantaged communities post-1994.

Roughly translated, the Hebrew word "tikkun" means to uplift. This name was later changed to MaAfrika Tikkun and is now Afrika Tikkun. Lubner's philosophy is: "We are running this organisation as a business with governance, credibility and sustainable outcomes." Its credibility won it the personal support of then President Nelson Mandela as its Patron-in-Chief

Lubner is adamant that Afrika



Tikkun should be run by people who are driven by passion. He says: "When you deal with people's lives, you have a responsibility towards them, particularly when you're dealing with other people's money. You also have a responsibility to ensure a beneficial outcome, as our own personal reputations are at stake."

In true humanitarian spirit, Lubner concludes that the bottom line is to meet the needs of communities: "We've increasingly realised that we cannot do this alone and require partnerships with all stakeholders to be able to achieve our common goal of ensuring a better and more sustainable future for our children."

# Charismatic Rosenberg, an incredible ambassador

### Herby Rosenberg Executive Deputy Chairman Afrika Tikkun

Known for his chirpy nature and "friend-raising" knack, it's no wonder that Afrika Tikkun's executive deputy chairman, Herby Rosenberg has often been referred to as a father or iQhawe lamaQhawe, meaning "hero of heroes" in Zulu by the community in Alexandra, northeast of Johannesburg.

Rosenberg's charismatic nature, along with his passion for empowering people, is what makes him an incredible ambassador and fundraiser, keeping the Afrika Tikkun vision of "a sustainable future for children in South African townships" alive.

"Being an empowerment organisation has placed an enormous responsibility on us: We dare not fail. Thousands of vulnerable children and families, who are beneficiaries of our programmes, rely on us for their development and empowerment," says a passionate Rosenberg.

He points out that assumptions that the organisation is excessively wealthy, are false, because without funding from donors and partners, it runs the risk of its empowerment resources running dry.

"Any business that succeeds, understands that it needs capital to operate and grow. And the worst thing that could happen to a business is that it grows and then it's undercapitalised," says Rosenberg.

The need for donor funding is



much more crucial at this stage of the organisation's development, given that it has moved from supporting hundreds of people in its early days to thousands of beneficiaries today.

"In 2012, the organisation aims to empower and develop over 18 000 direct beneficiaries, and it needs partners to achieve this. Afrika Tikkun hopes that organisations and individuals begin to realise their impact and partner with it to ensure that we meet the needs of children and communities. Your collaborative support and funding do not only offer structure and stability but contribute to the growth of our nation."

# From a charity-based to a community-empowerment powerhouse

**Marc Lubner CEO of Afrika Tikkun** 

In 2004, Marc Lubner took over the reins at Afrika Tikkun. His background in empowerment investment led to his belief that if members of a community were given the necessary assistance to empower themselves, then these individuals would take active steps towards contributing to the upliftment and development of their communities.

Thus began Afrika Tikkun's journey and transformation from a charity-based organisation to a community-empowerment powerhouse equipped with programmes and partnerships aimed at empowering communities to develop a new generation of productive cit-

Lubner's MBA (Kellogg Graduate School) education and successful business career, led to the organisation's holistic developmental approach, which entailed the delivery of five core interrelated programmes that would nurture, educate and support children, youth and families, who face many social challenges depriving them of a decent livelihood.

The approach also focuses on leadership and empowerment from within the community by training members from the community and creating opportunities to deploy their

five core programmes being implemented as a result of the model are:

Family Support Services, Early Childhood Development, Child and Youth Development, Primary Healthcare and Nutrition & Food

To successfully implement the model, Afrika Tikkun engaged and employed local community members to drive their own upliftment through the "Centres of Excellence" located in the townships.

These programmes are supported by financial controls and systems created and implemented by the organisation's financial director, Arnold Forman. This meant investing in teaching managerial and operational skills to people in townships.

"There might be many employers that employ people from the townships, but they are taking them out of the townships instead of investing in townships," says Lubner. He believes that it's this model that has earned Afrika Tikkun credibility within the communities it serves.

Afrika Tikkun's position is to adopt a longterm sustainable approach of meeting the various developmental needs of a child. This is achieved by starting with vulnerable infants in their homes and end with the employment or tertiary education of young adults.

'We're beginning to see the impact that this 'Holistic Developmental Model' is having on the communities. We now see young people, who we've taken through the programme, able to secure and maintain jobs," says Lubner.



The organisation's "Early Childhood Development" programmes provide a foundation that develops preschoolers to ensure they are school-ready and the "Family Support Services" strengthen families.

In all Afrika Tikkun's programmes, the organisation partners with other NGOs and complementary service providers, which are core to the model. But with so many other organisations doing good work out there, why decide to support Afrika Tikkun?

Lubner explains: "Afrika Tikkun is a very unique organisation, not just because of its holistic approach, but particularly because of its recognition that without multi-stakeholder partnerships, it would be very difficult to maximise impact.

"Our responsibility is to provide the best and most cost-effective programme offerings. We recognise that we can't do this on our own, we therefore actively take steps to surround ourselves with partners who share the same vision of empowerment as we do and who are able to provide complementary services that will enable us to have a much greater impact in our communities."

# Japan, an almost anachronistically Jew-friendly country

The word "Japan", may make you think of the haunting soundtrack of the film "Merry Christmas Mr Lawrence" (1983), based on war recollections by Laurent van der Post, which, composed by Ryuichi Sakamoto spawned many cover versions. You might think of cherry blossoms in woodcuts from the 1800s. Or haiku, origami and green tea. Either way, Japan is a fascinating, almost anachronistically Jew-friendly country.

Today some 2 000 Jews live in Japan, less than one per cent of the population. Jews first landed in Japan in the 16th century, with European explorers seeking out a new world. Jews only established themselves communally from the 19th century.

Russian Jews arrived in Japan via the Manchurian city of Harbin. Middle Eastern, "Baghdadi" Jews came to Kobe from present-day Iraq among other areas. Arguably the most prominent family among them was the Sassoons, known as the "Rothschilds of the East". Other Jews came to Japan from Germany.

Generally, Jews lived peacefully in Japan. In 1938, a decision was taken by Japan's political and military leadership to prohibit the expulsion of Jews from that country.

Despite Japan's status as a German ally and pressure from the Nazis to destroy its Jewry, Japan remained a safe Holocaust refuge. Some luminaries from the Mir Yeshiva in Vilna, who survived the Holocaust, fled through Eastern Europe to Japan. After the war, most moved on to America, Canada and Israel.

Today, Japan has two major synagogues, Beth David Synagogue in Tokyo and Ohel Shlomo Synagogue in Kobe. Chabad has two centres in Tokyo. Most rabbis originate from egalitarian circles; most services are conducted according to Sephardic practice.

Tokyo has a higher Jewish profile than Kobe; the presence of the Israeli embassy in the capital may also give members additional opportunities for cultural activities. Tokyo's central representative body is affiliated with the World Jewish Congress.

Recently, a Holocaust museum opened in Tokyo, supported by Jerusalem's Yad Vashem, and an exhibition about Anne Frank, opened in Hiroshima.

Said Rabbi Abraham Cooper of the Simon Wiesenthal Centre in Los Angeles, proactive in bringing Holocaust studies to Japan: "It is appropriate for the world to pause and remember the innocent."


In general, Japanese attitude towards Jews and Israel is complex. Most lack awareness of Jews. Yet there is a Japanese fascination with kibbutz ideology: it resonates with Japanese values which give primacy to the group over the individual. In 1963, Tezuka Nobuyoshi set up the Japan Kibbutz Association.

Makuya, a pro-Israel Christian group, also sends Japanese volunteers to kibbutzim. It was founded by Teshima Ikuro, who believed the Japanese to be of the lost tribes, a belief also held by Kampo Harada, one of Japan's most famous calligraphers.

When Beth David, the Tokyo synagogue was dedicated in 1968, the motives for maintaining Jewish life in Japan were articulated: "Here, in a strange land on the edge of the Diaspora, our generation is in constant danger of being lost. This is why we insist on a centre of Jewish life in Tokyo, to raise our children as Jews."

### TIPS FOR WHEN YOU VISIT JAPAN

- If you're holidaying in Japan and hold an SA passport, you need a Japanese tourist visa, which will cost you about 3 000 yen (about R315). The Embassy of Japan in SA has offices in Pretoria (012) 452-1500 and Cape Town (021)
- If you are planning to travel to rural farming areas in Japan, you should be inoculated against Japanese encephalitis.
- While the Japanese climate is generally mild, there are different highlights to the different seasons of the year, spring (March May) sees many flower-related events, particularly before the rainy season which begins in May. Summer (July August) is hot, humid and rainy, but autumn (September November) is characterised by landscapular beauty and festivals honouring the harvest. Winter, at the end of the year, is most preferred by tourists, however.
- There is no official language in Japan though Japanese is the national tongue spoken, and English is the most widely used foreign language.
- The Japanese yen is the currency of Japan. At the time of going to press R1 will buy you JPY 9,54.
- Traffic in Japan is on the left hand side.
- Electricity in Japan is at 100v, but the frequency differs between regions. Eastern Japan uses 50 Hz; Western Japan prefers 60Hz. There are two standard plugs in Japan: one with two identical flat pins alongside one another, and another with two identical flat pins and a third, round, grounding pin
- You can drink tap water in Japan with no threat of immediate health risks.
- Japan is seven hours ahead of Johannesburg.



# His road to his Jewish roots

"How lovely to think that no one need wait a moment – we can start now, start slowly changing the world! Everyone, great and small, can make their contribution straightaway... And you can always, always give something - even it if is only kindness!"

These words of 13-year-old Anne Frank, written while in hiding, were repeated by Union of Jewish Women Chairman Lynne Raphaely, at the UJW's 80th AGM in Johannesburg last Tuesday.

covery of the Jewish roots of the faith in which he was born: the Dutch Reformed Church.

While still accepting Jesus as his messiah, he pointed out how Jesus' Jewish faith was distorted by Paul, around 70 AD, who never knew him, and by the Roman Emperor Constantine in 312 AD, who as a canny politician, saw in the imposition of a common, pagan-laid Christianity, the means to rule his empire.

Paul fallaciously attributed to Jesus the declaration that he was the son of G-d; and introduced the concept of the trinity of G-d, the Son and the Holy Spirit. This marked the break with Judaism. Such a concept would have been anathema to Jesus, as it is to Judaism, whose core belief is in

"Jesus was born a Jew, lived the life of a Torah-observant rabbi, and died a Jew. He rebelled not against his fellow Jews, but against Roman oppression and taxation. Jesus' 'Give to Caesar what is Caesar's due" was adulterated as a betrayal of his fellow Jews.

It was the Romans who crucified him (among many other Jews), not the Jews. It was Constantine who falsely claimed Christ's birth on Christmas Day; who introduced during Pesach, the pagan, fertility Easter festival, represented by the giving of eggs and bunnies.

"The Emperor moved Shabbat from Saturday to Sunday, in honour of the Sun god, as were the rest of the days of the week named after Roman gods."

# Mouth-watering milchik treats for Shavuot

Sharon Lurie's passion for food lies solely in the fact that "time out" is time spent in the kitchen! As a kosher butcher's wife with easy access to a "limited supply" of meat, she has enjoyed many years of experimenting with every cut on the foreguarter.

Kosher entertaining changes in style and flair depending on the city, country and continent. For a glimpse into the kosher world in South Africa, pick up the two cookbooks of Sharon Lurie, aka The Butcher's Wife: her original, Cooking with the Kosher Butcher's Wife, and her just released Celebrating with the Kosher Butcher's Wife.

Although Lurie is best known for her mouth-watering meat recipes, she is as adept in putting forth a milchik recipe for Shavuot, as her lokshen pudding recipe and her sisterin-law's cheesecake recipe, shows.

### **EASY PAREV\* LOKSHEN PUDDING**

Serves 8 - 10

500 g dry tagliatelle pasta 1/2 cup sugar

- 6 Tbsp non-dairy margarine
- 4 whole eggs plus 2 extra yolks
- 1 cup non-dairy creamer
- 1 cup soya milk
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup raisins

Method:

4 Tbsp brown sugar mixed with 1 Tbsp cinna-

### mon to sprinkle on top

- 1. Cook the pasta according to the packet instructions.
- 2. Drain and place into a large greased ovenproof dish. I prefer to use a deeper dish than a larger flatter one so as to keep the pudding moist. If the dish is too large and wide, the moisture evaporates too quickly.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 180 °C.
- 4. Melt the sugar and margarine in a saucepan until the sugar dissolves, then remove from the heat and allow to cool.
- 5. Meanwhile, whisk the eggs, extra yolks, non-dairy creamer, soya milk and water, until well combined. Add to the cooled sugar and margarine and mix well.
- 6. Sprinkle the raisins over the cooked pasta, followed by the egg and sugar mixture.
- 7. Finally, sprinkle the brown sugar and cinnamon on top.
- 8. Bake for 40 45 minutes. Remember that



when you take it out of the oven, the pasta will still absorb some of the liquid, so don't overcook it as it can dry out.

· Traditionally we eat milchiks on Shavuot but as I only make Parev and Fleischik dishes at home, this recipe is Parev and as Shavuot is a Yomtov we still need to eat meat! Should you wish to make a delicious, creamy milchik pudding then substitute butter for margarine, smooth cream cheese for the non-dairy creamer, cream for soya milk and full cream milk for

### STEPH'S SENSATIONAL AMERICAN **CHEESECAKE**

I often wonder who else sits in shul on Shavuot with a "rumbling tummy" just because they were in a hurry to get to shul and forgot to have a slice of cheesecake before they left home.

There's nothing to beat Steph's Sensational American Cheesecake. As I don't do milchiks in our home, maybe a toasted cheese, I rely on my sister-in-law, Steph, to keep my cheesecake cravings to a minimum.

2 packets Bakers Tennis Biscuits 3/4 cup melted butter 4 Extra large eggs 1 cup sugar 3 x 250g cream cheese 125 ml cream (1/2 cup) 1/4 cup flour 2 tsp vanilla essence 2 Tbl fresh lemon juice

- 1. Crush tennis biscuits with a rolling pin or in a food processor, add melted butter, mix until well combined.
- 2. Line a springform tin (sides and bottom) with crushed biscuits and refrigerate until cheesecake filling is made. Paint sides with a little extra melted butter - it helps to keep the crumbs sticking to the sides.
- 3. Beat eggs and sugar till light and creamy.
- 4. Combine cream cheese, cream, flour, vanilla essence and lemon juice and beat until smooth.
- 5. Add egg and sugar mixture to cream cheese mixture.
- 6. Pour over biscuit base and bake for 1 hour on 120 deg C, then turn oven off and leave in oven for a further hour. (The low temperature is one of the secrets to its success).
- 7. Remove from oven, allow to cool and cover with either of the following toppings.

### **Topping A**

125 ml thick fresh cream 125 ml sour cream

### Method

Mix all of the above together and pour over cheesecake. Refrigerate - remove from fridge about an hour before serving.

### **Topping B**

250 ml cream 1/2 - 3/4 cup milk



1 packet Instant Lemon pudding (If you are unable to get kosher Iemon pudding then add two tablespoons of fresh lemon juice to an instant vanilla pudding).

### Method

Combine all of the above together and beat till smooth. Pour over cheesecake. Refrigerate - remove from fridge about an hour before serving.

# Running Elaine shows age is just a number

Armchair viewers often wonder why people actually want to torture themselves and run the Comrades Marathon. I suppose everybody has their own reason for doing it, whether it is because they actually enjoy it, or just "because it's there", or maybe just to be seen on television.

Elaine Greenblatt has her reason. In 1990, after getting tired of worrying about husband Mike at the Comrades remember there were no cellphones in those days - she decided that the next year, she would "do the journey".

To date she has completed the race six times, winning her age group last year and finishing third in 2007 in the 50 to 59 age group.

Mike will not be in this year's line-up on June 3, as a fractured hip brought his running season to a premature end. He will have to wait until next year to earn his 20th medal.

For Elaine, though, her win at age 62 in the 60 to 69 age group last year, was one of many milestones she has achieved. Just five weeks earlier she won her age group at the

Two Oceans 56 km event in Cape Town - a rare double.

A week later she represented Central Gauteng at the SA Masters Championships in Durban where she clinched silver in the 21,1 km halfmarathon and a gold medal in the 8 km cross-country.

Between January 2011 and the Comrades, Elaine won the Wits Kudus 15km, Dischem 21,1 PDAG 25km, Springs Striders 32km, Pick n Pay 42,2km, Deloitte 42,2km, Valla Marathon 42,2km, Om Die Dam 50km, Jackie Gibson 21,1km, Bruce Fordyce 50km, Wally Haywood 42,2km, Randburg Harriers 21,1km - and they were just some of her successes in 2011. Since then there have been numerous other successes at various distances.

Elaine was born in Liverpool to an English mother and South African father, who had joined the British Army and fought in the Second World War. When Elaine was five years old the family moved to South Africa, settling in Durban where most of her father's family lived.

Elaine attended Carmel School where she was in the year that was to be the first matric

class. She then moved to Johannesburg to study physiotherapy.

She started running in 1978, thanks to the influence of husband Mike, and joined Rockies in 1980 when she was doing the walk/run thing with Martin Menachemson. She first represented South Africa at Master Athletics in Finland in 2009 where she finished second in the 8km cross-country event (60 - 69) and third in the 5 000m on the track. That year she broke her South African agegroup record in the Cape Town Marathon in a time of 3hrs 28 min.

Elaine has also been awarded SA Masters National colours at 5 000m and 10 000m on the track.

Other international experiences include

third place at the London Marathon in a time of 3hrs 24 min. This, at the age of 60, placed her seventh fastest in the world in her age group. She finished fifth at the Berlin Marathon in 2011 (which she ran to experience the city) and at the Jerusalem Half Marathon in March this year, where she won her age group by 24 minutes.

Since 2006 she has represented Central Gauteng over various distances - 10km, 21km, 42,2km and cross-country. This year she came second in the SA Marathon Championships in George (in her age group).

Petite Elaine - around 1,49m (4ft 11in in the old parlance) is a lady with a big heart, motivated to live life as only she knows how. Her aim in athletics is to improve on her times, especially her marathon, but most importantly, to have fun - wherever or whenever she goes running.
