Our Jewish GPS

"Who knows Five?"

"I know Five! Five are the Books of the

We sing this song at the Pesach seder table. The synonym we use for the Torah, "Chumash", comes from the root "chamesh" that means "five".

Yet strangely, this is a point of discussion among the Sages of the Talmud (Shabbat 116a) where Rebbi Yonatan is of the opinion that there are SEVEN books of the Torah! It is amazing how, in spite of unbearable persecution our Torah remained intact.

This was, in part, thanks to the Herculean efforts of the Messorah. Is it not possible that two entire books were lost?

The Talmud explains that the book we are currently reading, Bemidbar (Numbers), is in fact a trilogy, with the three-way division occurring in this week's parsha. In Numbers 10, a mere two verses (verses 35 - 36) constitute a second book and separate the third book from the first book: "And it came to pass, when the ark set forward, that Moses said, Rise up, L-rd, and let your enemies be scattered; and let them

who hate you flee before you. And when it rested, he said, Return, O L-rd, to the many thousands of Israel."

We recite these verses every time we read from the Torah in public. What exactly does Rabbi Yonatan mean and why do we highlight his "Second Book of Bemidbar"?

A brief look at the structure of the Book of Bemidbar may enlighten us. The Book of Shemot details the Exodus and receiving the Torah at Sinai. The Book of Vayikra provides details of the Torah laws.

Bemidbar next describes the journey to the Promised Land. "Bemidbar Book 1" is all about mobilisation of the camp in preparation for the journey. At the heart of the camp of Israel lies the Mishkan (Tabernacle) that housed the Holy Ark containing the Tablets of the Decalogue. This unites us

and calls our nation to order in the barren wastes of the wilderness of Sinai.

The two verses that constitute "Bemidbar Book 2" describe the ideal journey to Israel. The Holy Ark travels ahead of us, our enemies flee and we immediately experience the Messianic Era in Israel. No White Papers on emigration, no wars and no United Nations condemnations. If only we lived in an ideal world!

Alas two verses later "Bemidbar Book 3" awakens us from dream to reality. The actual journey confronts us with setbacks and challenges and eventually leads to the precursor of exile and hardship.

Such is life. We live in an imperfect world. It is not so easy to overcome the obstacles that confront us.

Every time we take out our Holy Torah and read it in public, we recall Rabbi Yonatan's "Bemidbar Book 2". It reminds us that though reality confronts us with numerous challenges, we must still aspire to the ideal journey, for as Jews there is only one source that provides us with direction: the Holy Ark and the Tablets of the Decalogue it contains. This is our Jewish GPS!

New York's annual Israel parade paints Fifth Ave blue and white

NEW YORK - Senator Charles Schumer, New York Governor Andrew Cuomo and New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg, were among the dignitaries who marched in last Sunday's annual Celebrate Israel Parade in the Big Apple.

They joined tens of thousands of marchers who paraded up Fifth Avenue under blue, sunny skies amid a sea of blue-andwhite Israeli flags. The parade, now in its 48th year, is America's biggest annual show of support for Israel by the numbers.

Marchers included Jewish day school contingents, the Chai Riders motorcycle club, non-Jewish marching bands, and a contingent from Israel Guide Dogs for the Blind, among some 200 organisations. Israeli consuls and some government officials also marched.

The theme of this year's parade was "Israel Branches Out". The parade was preceded by a four-mile Celebrate Israel run through Central Park. (JTA)

BGU expert to help Botswana found a new university

Passing through SA en route to Botswana where he will advise the government about setting up a new university, Prof Amos Drory, vice president for external affairs at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev (pictured), last week spoke to the JR. Alongside president of SA Associates of the BGU, Bertie Lubner and Herby Rosenberg, SA Associate of BGU, he emphasised the university's high academic standards and its continuous research, of benefit not only to Israel, but to the world.

Israeli-born Drory, a son of Lithuanians, read for his bachelor's degree in industrial psychology at Hebrew University and his PhD in organisational psychology in the US, before joining BGU 26 years ago; his professional status has embraced fields from industrial engineering to business management, at leadership levels. "BGU is a place with a future," he says.

"Gaborone's University of Botswana is Botswana's only university; Botswana wants more. In Israel, we have zoomed in on situations unique to us; our expertise will benefit Botswana. Their land is arid, as is Israel's - 60 per cent of Israel's land mass is desert.

"Botswana's minister of education visited Israel recently. She was blown away by BGU's work. Israel has no natural resources, like gold. Our only resource is brain power; by virtue of Israel's start-up nation success, we have know-how we share with the world

"In this visit, I will advise the Botswanans on training graduates, planning the university's landscape, and examining how they can benefit from our experience with building a campus in the de-

"BGU aims to excel and reach out," he spoke of Aids research in Africa conducted by BGU's medical faculty.

"Our university focuses PHOTOGRAPH SUPPLIED BY BENon advanced and applied science aiming to direct scien-

tific knowledge to practical solutions. Aridity is part of our focus; we also research solar energy and water research, including purification, desalination, management, waste and recycling.

"Four years ago, we brought out two BGU professors: a water purifying specialist researching the integration of nanotechnology and an algae specialist working with the biomass of alternative energy. This expertise, among the top in the world, equipped us to set up a joint research programme with the University of Johannes-

The intervention by Hamas supporters who obtained the support of a section of the university's academic body, endeavoured to oppose collaboration with Israel. They put huge pressure on BGU's Senate; the matter was resolved in the interests of the university's right to have freedom of teaching, research and debate, without po-

litical interference."

Said Lubner: "UJ issued a formal statement opposing academic boycotts. It changed the Memoranda of Understanding, which are not legally binding, into contracts, which are. Now the BGU/UJ working relationship is stronger, and includes associations with UCLA and Ghent University.

This research is not the first: BGU has been collaborating internationally for over 30 years with the best in the

world; it has a strong track record with several SA universities. The SA Associates of BGU has three interests at heart: SA, Israel and humanity."

BGU, Israel's university of choice, has own rapidly. In 15 years, its teaching capacity has grown from 6 000 students to 20 000. "The average student in Israel comes to university after having completed army service. They have a focused idea of what they want to do; our education is about entrepreneurship and attitude as much as it is about skills and academic credentials." adds Drory.

"It supports the philosophy that you can't consider yourself successful until you've used your experiences to help someone else," concurs Lubner, explaining BGU's programme to teach Bedouins selfsufficiency.

"Watch this space," all three BGU dignitaries tease. "Exciting energies are afoot."

NON-ORTHODOX RABBI TO RECEIVE GOVT FUNDING

Last week, it was announced that Rabbi Miri Gold of Kibbutz Gezer, will be the first non-Orthodox rabbi in Israel's history to receive government funding. According to a media statement from the SA Union of Progressive Jewry, "The Israeli Attorney-General committed to equal pay for Rabbi Gold for her work at Congregation Birkat Shalom." This decision will pave the way for other non-Orthodox rabbis in Israel.

"This allows the Israeli Movement for Progressive Judaism to build on the success achieved so far and deepen our work for the Israeli public." Israel currently supports some 4 000 Orthodox rabbis.

ERIC GREITENS WINS CHARLES BRONFMAN PRIZE FOR 2012

The recipient of the internationally promoted Charles Bronfman Prize for 2012 is US Navy SEAL Eric Greitens, founder and CEO of The Mission Continues, a project challenging post-9/11 veterans to continue to lead through community service at home.

Each year, this prize is awarded to an individual whose work is fuelled by Jewish values and has global life-changing impact.

"Eric provides a vision for hopefulness in an age of diminished expectations. His model and focus on measurable results serves as a template for the rest of the country and for the world," Tom Brokaw, member of Greitens' prize-nominating team, said.

Two SA commentators to be part of Facing Tomorrow 2012

Facing Tomorrow, the first annual Conference of Israel's Shimon Peres' presidency, took place in Jerusalem in May 2008, marking Israel's milestone 60th anniversary.

South Africa will for the first time be part of the large international media, who attend the Conference. Reeva Forman will be accompanying two of South Africa's foremost opinion-makers as guests of the SAZF - Tom Wheeler and Tim Hughes. A group of SA Jewish lay leaders will be attending as delegates.

Tom Wheeler is columnist on international affairs for The New Age newspaper, Johannesburg. Since 2003 he has served as a research associate at the SA Institute of International Affairs (SAIIA). He served as SA Ambassador to Turkey (1997 - 2001).

Tim Hughes has been SAIIA's Middle East researcher since 2002 and has delivered lectures at Bar Ilan University in Jerusalem. He has been the convener of the Middle East public discussion group at SAIIA. A regular contributor to Radio 702, Hughes also covered the Palestinian elections for South Africa's e.tv and is a regular commentator on Middle Eastern issues for the SABC.

The idea of the Facing Tomorrow Conference could only have started with Peres, the man who has witnessed up close and in person more historic events during Israel's first

six decades of statehood than arguably any other person alive today, going back to 1948 when he was one of founding Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion's closest, and youngest advisers.

Peres decided that it was not enough to review the Jewish state's achievements, challenges and milestones reflectively over 60 years. Rather, the emphasis for Israel must be on looking forward.

Thus was conceived the first annual Israel

Presidential Conference, a three-day assembly of some of the world's "best and brightest", including equally large representations of presidents and prime ministers, current and past, and Nobel laureates, to name but some who gather in Jerusalem during those days.

Thus was the flagship international event born, with Peres hosting his premiere Facing Tomorrow Conference which welcomed many international leaders, including then-President George Bush. The Conference was initiated by Peres to address the three main "tomorrows": the Israel tomorrow, the global tomorrow and the Jewish tomorrow.

Key luminaries in economics, science, technology, medicine and philosophy took part in the major plenary sessions, as well as in 35 panels that sought no lesser a goal than to help shape the face of tomorrow.

The 2012 conference, like the others before it, was and continues to be focused on exploration, of a synergistic gathering of major

world leaders, Jews and non-Jews, thinkers and doers, poets and physicists, rabbis and entrepreneurs, including the next generation of leadership - young men and women of promise and originality.

Each "tomorrow" was and continues to be examined through a set of four critical lenses: The value systems that are meant to guide our conduct, the leadership necessary to navigate the challenges ahead, the creativity required to embrace the new, and the notion of evolving, mutable, and sometimes multiple identities as we attempt to keep pace with a rapidly changing and digitally interconnected world.

The Presidential Conference has been identified by President Peres as the ideal avenue to communicate Israel's many accomplishments to the international community.

The large and extraordinary list of luminaries and speakers attending this, the fourth Conference taking place in Jerusalem between June 19 and 21, includes Shai Agassi, Professor Peter Beinart, Major General Meir Dagan, Ambassador Stuart Eizenstat, Professor Stanley Fischer, Abraham Foxman, Ambassador Dore Gold, Macolm Hoenlein, Dr Henry Kissinger, Dr Emily Landau, Professor Chung Min Lee, Professor Dominique Moisi, Professor Tomaso Poggio, Ambassador Dennis Ross, Dr Raj Reddy, Professor Mona Siddiqui, Professor Hermona Soreq, Mr Ruben Troostwijk, Dr Yossi Vardi, Sir James Wolfensohn AO and Ambassador Lamberto Zannier.

The sold-out signs for this year's annual Jewish Achiever Awards, went up an impressive six weeks before the glittering event takes place at the Sandton Sun Hotel in some two weeks' time.

Says Howard Sackstein, chairman of the Jewish Achiever Awards: "Each year the Jewish Achiever Awards continue to amaze us. Not only have the awards become the most prestigious event in the Jewish social calendar, but the nominations and awards themselves have become increasingly competitive and more and more sought after."

This year's awards received the highest number of nominations in its 14 year history. The awards celebrate the remarkable achievements of members of the South African Jewish community in all spheres of life in South Africa, as well as raising money to help fund this newspaper, which is distributed free of charge.

"Competition has been fierce with nearly 200 public nominations, 30 finalists and seven winners. We are awestruck by the depth of talent and skill in our community. Two years ago we took

Rebbetzen Eva Sandler to talk at Sinai Indaba

On March 19, young Chabad Rebbetzen Eva Sandler (pictured, with her surviving daughter, toddler Liora) was suddenly and devastatingly made a widow, when her husband Rabbi Jonathan Sandler and their two young sons, Aryeh (6) and Gavriel (3) were killed at point blank range in the shocking anti-Semitic attack in Toulouse, France. This month, she will be talking at Sinai Indaba.

Said Chief Rabbi Warren Goldstein: "It is an honour for Sinai Indaba, on behalf of the South African Jewish community, to host Rebbetzen Eva Sandler, who carries her pain and loss with great courage, dignity and faith. In so doing, we are also reaching out in solidarity to the French Jewish community and embracing our position as part



of the Jewish world."

Shortly after the attack, Sandler put out a message on the Chabad website. "My heart is broken," she wrote. "I am unable to speak. She added: "Parents, please kiss your children. Tell them how much you love them, and how dear it is to your heart that they be living examples of our Torah, imbued with the fear of Heaven and with love of their fellow man."

The strangers in our midst

Isn't it odd how history has a way of sneaking up behind you and challenging the very things you value about

There's no point rehashing the "Spear" saga - it has been done to death. But a few words are relevant to illustrate another point. South Africans have huffed and puffed about Brett Murray's painting portraying President Jacob Zuma's private parts. Some reactions have been funny; others, troubling.

Particularly threats were made against the gallery and City Press who first reported on the issue and showed The Spear on its website. Loud proclamations have defended the principle of freedom of expression; equally forceful voices have demanded respect for dignity and privacy.

We have vivid memories of the anti-apartheid struggle (in which Murray was an ANC stalwart), where freedom of speech was a cherished goal. Now, paradoxically, South Africans who fought for it are challenging it and saying the painting's showing must be restricted.

In another ironic incident a few years back, we saw the beautiful ideals of ubuntu and tolerance for which we prided ourselves after defeating apartheid go up in smoke (literally in some instances). In the xenophobic riots in 2008, black South Africans turned on foreigners in their midst - Nigerians, Somalis, Ethiopians, Congolese, Pakistanis and others - looting their shops and attacking them as unwanted "strangers" - looking different and speaking languages South Africans could not understand - taking "food from the locals' mouths". We were shocked. How could South Africans, after everything we fought for, act this way?

For Jews, the issue touches a raw nerve. The "stranger" theme runs through their history. Over centuries they were often treated appallingly as outsiders in host societies, often being discriminated against or even expelled. The Holocaust was a ghastly culmination of this history. Eventually Jews created the State of Israel, where they could control their lives and vowed that such things would not happen to Jews again.

But things are never that simple: they are still seen as "strangers" by some. Author Amos Oz says in his book A Tale of Love and Darkness: "Out there, in the world, all the walls were covered with graffiti: 'Yids, go back to Palestine', so we came back to Palestine and now the world at large shouts at us: 'Yids, get out of Palestine'.'

Israel has prospered fantastically and its people are indeed in control of their lives. Now, irony of ironies, they are confronted by this same question of how "strangers" among them are treated. Currently in the news are the roughly 60 000 illegal foreign migrants from Sudan, Eritrea and other war-ravaged north African countries, many of whom are unemployed, poor and live in south Tel Aviv, and whose growing numbers are worrying Israelis across the political spectrum. Israel is a small sliver of land, roughly the size of the Kruger National Park.

Violent attacks occurred recently in Tel Aviv against migrants. Stores were vandalised and car windows smashed, and in Jerusalem an apartment was torched. Politicians - including Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu - made earnest calls to stop the violence and warned that racism is against Israel's values; Israeli humanitarian organisations have tried to help migrants. Former Kadima Chairman Tzipi Livni said: "The State's duty is to handle the problem that emerged, especially in certain neighbourhoods and cities in Israel, to block its border to labour migrants but not to be dragged to violence and racism.'

Other politicians made dangerous, inflammatory statements, prompting Israel's Internal Security Minister to slam the "public figures who can't shut their mouths and ride the wave of hatred and popularity to cover up their feeble performance over the years".

Most citizens believe Israel, like any normal country, should close its borders to illegal migrants. How do you implement it with the porous Sinai border? But the immediate issue is how to relate to those already there. South Africans know better than most just how complex and volatile are the emotions and perceptions of people living close together in a multi-ethnic society, trying to earn a living and solve their problems.

Can blacks be racist? Of course they can; they are human, with all the sensitivities and fears of other humans. Can Jews be racist? Of course they can. They are

But Jewish history has ingrained in us the knowledge of what racism can do if it is not checked. Ultimately, Israelis must grapple with this challenge and solve it.

Denying Jews their ME Jewish heritage

Holocaust denial is generally considered to be the worst form of a type of anti-Semitism that seeks to write the Jewish people out of history, or at least those parts of it that might show them in a sympathetic light.

It began as a white right-wing phenomenon, often as much motivated by a desire to rehabilitate Nazism as an attack on Jews (one of the most notorious deniers, David Irving, was at least in the beginning primarily driven by his boyhood admiration for the whole Nazi cult). Later, and inevitably, it was adopted with enthusiasm in much of the Arab and Islamic world.

Far less attention is paid to a second and arguably far more dangerous form of Jewish history denial that has taken root in the Middle East and is now threatening to spread. This seeks to deny the Jewish people of today any connection with their Biblical and immediate post-Biblical heritage in the Middle East.

To understand the almost surreal lengths to which this is being taken, one only has to consult the reports on Palestinian Media Watch (a site, by the way, that left-wing Jews who feel the need to bring their guilty Jewish consciences to the attention of the wider society should be compelled to read on a daily, if not hourly basis).

Palestinian denial goes right to the top.

Palestinian denial of the Jewish legacy in Israel goes right to the top, starting with the supposedly more moderate Palestinian Authority (PA) Chairman Mahmoud Abbas. Earlier this year, Abbas declared that Israel was stealing the "cultural, human, and Islamic-Christian religious history" by its "Judaisation" policies in Jerusalem.

Shortly before that his adviser for Jerusalem said that Israel was trying "to create an artificial heritage with a Jewish spirit at the expense of its true and authentic (identity) as an Arab, Islamic and Christian city".

In August 2010, PA Minister of Religion Mahmoud Al-Habbash, stated that throughout history, Jerusalem had been "the capital of the Palestinian state and the capital of the Palestinian people".

According to the PA Mufti Muhammad Hussein (January 2012), on Jerusalem's Temple Mount, there "never was a Temple in any period, nor was there, at any time, any place of worship for the Jews or others at the Al-Aqsa Mosque site".

Just four examples of what has been a flood of Jewish history denialism.

These are just four examples of what has been a veritable flood of wholesale Jewish history denialism on the part of Palestinian political and religious leaders, intellectuals, educators and journalists. Nor are they the most egregious such cases.

Other instances of Palestinian and Muslim appropriation of the Jewish past for themselves, are so brazen as to take one's breath away. In terms of this, King David was a Muslim, Jesus was a Palestinian nationalist leader and all the archaeological data prior to the 7th century Arab Islamic conquest relates to a Palestinian, not a Jewish

Alarmingly, the Palestinians would seem to be gaining some international support for their revisionist stance. In 2010, Unesco urged Israel "to take Rachel's Tomb off its Heritage Site lists as it was an integral part of the Palestinian territories" and resolved that it was to be regarded as being as much a Muslim as a Jewish holy site. By contrast, in 1830 the (Islamic) Ottoman authorities legally ruled that it was a Jewish holy site.

This in turn points to how not only Jewish, Christian and sundry pagan sources uphold the Jewish connection to Israel, but even, up until very recently, Arab and Islamic ones. In rewriting the history of the region to exclude the Jews and place themselves in the starring role, the Palestinians are thus going against a substantial body of Arab historiography. How on earth, in the end, do they expect to get away with it?

Even Israeli left-wingers are dismayed by what the Palestinians are doing.

Even Israeli left-wingers are dismayed by what the Palestinians are doing. Knesset member Einat Wolf, for example, deplored how they were "stupidly trying again and again to somehow create an alternate reality in which the Jewish people are strangers in this land" (November 2010).

Those involved in the Camp David talks in 2000 well remember Yasser Arafat's cool denial of there ever being a Jewish Temple in Jerusalem, a stance that had much to do with the disastrous failure of those talks.

As we know too well, when it comes to the Jewish people, there is no such thing as a lie that is so great as to preclude its ever gaining traction. Over the centuries, the most demented theories about Jews have been conceived, believed and propagated by apparently intelligent people.

The time has surely come to devote far greater resources to educating ourselves and our children about the pre-Zionist history of the State of Israel For too long, in part no doubt because of trendy scepticism over the Biblical heritage, it has been treated as if it was some kind of national myth rather than an objective, well-documented re-

It may assume an even greater importance before long than demonstrating the truth of the Holocaust.



Ethiopian-Israeli Jews, feel racism pain

When violent riots against African migrant workers erupted in south Tel Aviv recently, a mob attacked Hanania Wanda, a Jew of Ethiopian origin, mistaking him for a Sudanese migrant worker.

"Wanda is my friend," says Elias Inbram, 38 (pictured), a social activist in the Ethiopian community and a former member of the Israeli diplomatic corps who served as spokesman for the embassy in South Africa. "I knew I had to react somehow.'

Inbram, who holds a master's degree in law and is interning before applying for the bar, spoke to JTA. He said he realised "that since to white people, all blacks look the same - I, an Israeli Jew who is black, or anyone in my family, or anyone in my community, could be attacked, too."

That moved him to stencil "CAUTION: I am not an infiltrator from Africa" onto a bright yellow T-shirt.

Last week, he posted a picture of himself wearing the shirt - the only one he has printed on Facebook. It already has gained thousands of "likes". (JTA)





Abducted as child soldiers and slaves, indoctrinated to torture and mutilate, instructed to murder their own families, 66 000 Ugandan children live this nightmare everyday.

This seemed to be the fate for 13-year-old Jacob Acaye and his brother. But Jacob's brother refused to endure this any longer. He was adamant to change his destiny. He planned his escape. This suffering would finally end!

His tactics were - and remain - brutal. He often forced children to kill their parents or siblings with machetes or blunt tools. He abducted girls to be slaves for his officers. He brainwashed and indoctrinated the children with his lies and manipulated them with his claim of spiritual powers.

His army spreads widely. It began in northern



Uganda but soon after spread to the DRC and South Sudan. No one has been able to locate his whereabouts since 1986. His actions have made him the most wanted terrorist on the International Criminal Court's list.

Ugandan children live with the constant fear of abduction. At the height of the conflict in Uganda, children "night commuted." This means that every evening they would walk miles from their homes to the city centres. There, hundreds of them would sleep in school houses, churches, or bus stations to avoid abduction by the LRA.

I had no knowledge of Joseph Kony or his schemes, until the organisation, "Invisible Children" uploaded the video "Kony 2012" on YouTube. This 29-minute film went viral and in a matter of days was watched more than 58 million times. As of March 19, the video has had more than 83 063 374 hits on YouTube alone.

Kony 2012 is a campaign film produced by "Invisible Children", aiming to make the world aware of Kony. They want to raise support for his arrest and set a precedent for international justice.

One of the main people featured in the film is Jacob. After hearing Jacob's heart-wrenching story, director and founder of Invisible Children, Jason Russell, "promises Jacob that he will help stop Kony".

"Nothing is more powerful than an idea, whose time has come. Whose time is now!" These are the powerful; opening lines of the video "Kony 2012".

As I watched this documentary, a visual description of the LRA's proceedings, I was overwhelmed with emotion. I felt disgusted and yet at the same time ashamed. Disgusted at the immorality, inhumanity and atrocities that one man and his soldiers can accomplish. But ashamed of the public world and media for being so sheltered from this violence.

I was inspired to do something, yet living in my little bubble in Johannesburg, there is not much that I can do. I can not go out and hang up posters and I cannot join the Invisible Children movements. However, I publicise Kony's name. I encourage everyone to watch Kony 2012 and to educate yourselves. Every person needs to believe that he can help stop Kony

"What would you personally do? You would buy anything and everything you wanted, right? Not only for yourself, but also for all the people you love, right? Even for people you don't know, because you couldn't possibly spend it all on yourself, right? You would try to spend every penny, and use it all.

"Actually, this game is reality! Each of us is in possession of such a magical bank. We just can't seem to see it. The magical bank is time! This is the mitzvah in the Torah of Kidush Hachodesh, to show Klal Yisroel that we are supposed to control our own time (or we are meant to).

"Each morning we awaken to receive 86 400 seconds as a gift of life, and when we go to sleep at night, any remaining time is not credited to us. What we haven't lived up that day is forever lost. Yesterday is forever gone.

"Each morning the account is refilled, but the bank can dissolve your account at any time without warning. What will you do with your 86 400 seconds? Aren't they worth so much more than the same amount in dollars?

"Always think of this: Enjoy every second of your life, because time races by so much quicker than you think, so use your time wisely."

FELDER'S WHIRLWIND LITHUANIAN TOUR WAS A PR EXERCISE

A second opinion on Steve Felder's enthusiastic article "Lithuania - a past not forgotten" (SAJR May 11): As an SA-born Litvak now living in Washington, DC, I share that mystique and the yearning to love Lithuania, the land to which I can trace my ancestors into the early 18th century.

I have visited Lithuania four times between 1992 and 2003. Would I visit Lithuania again? Definitely not!

Felder's 48-hour hyped-up whirlwind tour was a PR event staged by the Lithuanian government which is energetically courting SA Jews. Clearly the government is looking for SA Litvak investments to help revive their badly suffering economy.

Recently, to the horror of the tiny surviving Lithuanian Jewish community, an elaborate four-day chain of events in Vilnius (Vilna) and Kaunas (Kovno) was orchestrated and financed by the Lithuanian government.

The ceremonies and conferences honoured the memory of the 1941 Nazi-puppet Prime Minister Juozas Abrazevicius (Brazaitis) who had fled to Germany and later to the US after the war. (He had changed his surname to "Brazaitis" to elude arrest for his Nazi-collaboration activities.)

The signature of Abrazevicius appears at the top of documents ordering the formation of the Kovno Ghetto, the withdrawal of all human rights for Jews, and other measures designed to persecute and annihilate Lithuanian Jewry.

Brazaitis died in 1974 in the US. Almost 40 years later the Lithuanian government has had his remains exhumed, flown to Vilnius, and reburied with full honours. While the pomp and ceremony was going on for this "hero" who was responsible for thousands of Jewish deaths, Vilnius' only functioning synagogue was desecrated with green paint.

A few of the issues that are currently

plaguing Lithuanian-Jewish relations:

·Significant increases in anti-Semitism and anti-Semitic incidents. No arrests have been made

- · Annual massive neo-Nazi marches since 2008 in Vilnius and Kaunas on Lithuania's independence days, fully sanctioned by the government.
- · Not one Lithuanian war criminal has been punished. It is documented that a minimum of 15 000 Lithuanians participated actively in murdering Jews.
- Government prosecutors have harassed ageing Jewish survivors in Vilnius and Israel with charges of "war crimes" because they had fought against the Nazis.
- The concept of a double-genocide in Lithuania is marketed ad nauseam. This is one step up the ladder from Holocaust denial. The only genocide in Lithuania was the Holocaust.

The Lithuanian government is engaged in dual-track politics and policies. While it is trying to create the appearance that it is striving for reconciliation with its small Litvak community and the larger world Jewry, it is simultaneously still intent on appeasing its ultra-nationalist faction.

Contrary to what Felder claims, the country has failed to confront its brutal Holocaust past.

Is it any wonder that they would prefer to tune out their past? Yet other nations have managed to overcome their shameful pasts. But that requires sincerity and hon-

Most certainly Steve Felder did not see the real Lithuania during his visit complete with welcomes from the Prime Minister and other elites. He and others who are similarly taken in must go beyond the PR duplicity and look through a wider lens.

PAYMENT OF TAXES CAN'T DETERMINE WHERE A CAPITAL SHOULD BE

I refer to Allan Minitzer's letter, "Jerusalem may claim high ground, but Tel Aviv pays the rates", (SAJR June 1).

The capital of a country is not determined by popular will, or by its affluence or by the dictates of foreign powers. Governments determine where their capitals are. Jerusalem was made the capital of Israel by the government of Israel.

It is the seat of its legislature (the Knesset), its administration (the government) and its judiciary (the Supreme Court) as is the case with any other capital in the world.

Added to this is the historic perspective: Jerusalem was the capital of biblical Israel, 3 000 years ago - and that is not all, either. For the religious, Jerusalem contains the very place where G-d's spirit resides.

While the ultra-Orthodox may contribute nothing financially, the payment of taxes can never act as a proxy for deter-

mining where a country's capital should be located. Johannesburg is the financial and industrial heart of South Africa, but it has never been suggested that it be made the capital(s) of the country (which is Pretoria and Cape Town).

The same may be said of both New York and Los Angeles in the United States (whose capital is Washington DC) or Sydney in Australia (capital - Canberra).

Ehud Olmert wrote the following about our capital: "Jerusalem represents the purest expression that all Jews have prayed for, dreamed of, cried for and died for in the 2 000 years since the destruction of the Second Temple."

I am not ultra-Orthodox, but believe that no other city, under any circumstances can ever replace Jerusalem as Israel's capital, a position it has held for 3 000 years.

Sum of parts does not equal its whole



Late last year, Sibikwa under the direction of Phyllis Klotz and Smal Ndaba, re-staged Kwela Bafana: A Night in a 50s Shebeen. This ensemble piece originally debuted in 1992, locally and at the Edinburgh Festival. Now in a third restaging, with some structural nips and tucks and a couple of cast changes, it is essentially a new production. As such, it boasts moments of complete beauty, but the sum of its parts sadly does not equal its whole. This is a casualty of poorly balanced sound, above all, which contributes to a corrosion of cohesiveness in the work.

Comprising some of South Africa's most beautiful standards in popular shebeen music, like Macky Davashe's (1954) Lakushon'Ilanga (When the sun goes down... I will find you), Todd Matshikiza's 1959 King Kong theme song and his Back of the Moon and Strike Vilakazi's ironic yet timeless Meadowslands (1956), the show is loosely pinned onto a narrative that embraces the daily traffic facing a shebeen in the townships during the 1950s, featuring Velephi Khumalo as the shebeen queen Sis' Peggy and introducing Sihle Ndaba as her daughter Ntombi, interacting with a cast of four men juxtaposed against the five-piece jazz band, led by Bra B Ngwenya.

There's a moment or two in this rough shod work in which you can taste a crumb, see a sparkle of the magic that must have comprised the 1959 jazz opera, King Kong, created by Matshikiza in collaboration with Harry Bloom and Clive Menell and produced by Leon Gluckman, which sent the careers of Miriam



Makeba and the Manhattan Brothers to international stardom.

Bra B, an original member of the King Kong cast, exudes character like no other cast member, but sadly in this theatre, often seems to be drowned in the space, or has his voice drowned by instruments around him. This is a sore pity: his personality lends the band an endearing and somewhat nostalgic 1950s jazz gravitas, replete as it is with braces, spats and sleeveless cardigans.

Similarly the sweet and subtle a capello harmonies created by this ensemble of Joel Zuma, Dumisani Mhlanga, Siphiwe Nkabinde and Andries Mbali, is distorted and splintered by the amplification,

and their miraculous gentle beauty becomes forced and harsh.

While Khumalo's Sis' Peggy is as gloriously stylish and fabulous as she was last year, her daughter in the work is not sufficiently capitalised on. Ndaba has an extraordinarily beautiful voice; we get to hear it in one or two riffs: it's just not enough: this young woman has a voice which needs celebration. It needs to be able to breathe and not get stultified by the musical instruments supporting it.

The nostalgic kick you get in hearing this 1950s music that you might have enjoyed in its time, plays a role in popularising this show, but flawless it isn't.

Getz, an artist unique in her sense of authority



The exhibition thematically pinned to the talk Chonat Getz gave a few weeks ago about the relationship between art and science, is redolent of both; its sense of earnestness overrides its sense of fun at times, but as you look, so are you drawn in.

An interesting character in the art world, Getz is a selfstyled artist, grappling with a variety of fairly stubborn mediums quite late in life, after an illustrious academic career as a mathematician and geneticist.

Tip-toeing and sometimes running and skipping on the line that balances art historical savvy with using the studio as a playroom, alongside co-exhibitor Collin Cole, Getz yields a respectable body of 16 etchings or monotypes and 13 sculptures in glass.

She has developed a visual language and a discourse of her own. In some ways, it is reminiscent of the early work of Giulio



Chonat Getz's The Broad Guage marches on 3 (monotype).

Tambellini in the processions he created in the 1990s. It other ways, it speaks of the sinister humour you find in different artists' work relating to Ubu Roi, a fictional dictator controversially coined by surrealist Alfred Jarry in the 1890s.

Getz's Red Man series reflects a gauche red figure amidst a landscape, who sways the emotion of a given scene: Now he is triumphant, now he topples.

Getz's handling of some of the more notoriously difficult etching techniques like chine collé, in which an additional piece of paper is stuck to the image during the printing process, is clean and competent, but there's a curious discrepancy in her use of line between the mediums.

While her monoprints and drypoint demonstrate a strong gutsy linearity embracing the form, she handles descriptive line work in the etchings more gingerly.

She remains, however, an artist unique in her sense of authority where the maths is concerned. Mathematical or classical references are delicately knitted into the fabric of her work, emerging with quirkiness and wisdom that will hold you, particularly in her Antikythera and the Angel

Cole has not many works on this show: predominantly he is working here with monoprints and collage, in retro and semi-political images, redolent of the work of war collagist John Heartfield.

Overall, this is a quiet exhibition, shying from bombastic or sensational expression, but one certainly worth looking at.

A column of the SA Jewish Board of Deputies -

The relatively low level of anti-Semitism in SA compared with elsewhere in the world, is something we are grateful for. That being said, hostile acts aimed at Jews solely on the basis of their being Jewish, still occur.

Sometimes, these take place in the context of a dispute, in which the non-Jewish party makes gratuitous and offensive references to the other's Jewishness. At others, it manifests as unprovoked acts aimed at denigrating the Jewish community, such as hate mail and graffiti.

Some actions, while not explicitly anti-Semitic, are nevertheless offensive to Jews, and would include any public demonstration expressing support for Nazism.

It is part of the core mandate of the board to counter act all acts of this nature. To this end, we have adopted a zero-tolerance policy in which every action we become aware of that we deem to have even an element of anti-Jewish prejudice, is taken up and pursued to whatever extent is necessary to achieve a satisfactory resolution.

In recent weeks, we have taken up a number of cases of anti-Semitic or generally offensive behaviour, and I am pleased to report that all have had a satisfactory outcome.

Several other cases of a more complex and far-reaching nature are still in the process of being dealt with, and will be reported on in due course. It is not necessary to remain passive in the face of anti-Semitism.

Such prejudice is not acceptable in our society. I therefore urge anyone who has a grievance in this regard to contact our offices (011) 645-2521/david@beyachad.co.za).



Thumbs-up for Jansen as patron of the **SAHGF**

Newly-appointed patron of the South African Holocaust and Genocide Foundation (SAHGF) Professor Jonathan Jansen, has described the enterprise as an "important national project." The SAHGF is the umbrella body of the Holocaust centres in Cape Town, Durban and Johannes-

Jansen, the rector and vice-chancellor of the University of the Free State (UFS), is a renowned educator and social commentator who has engaged South African society in an examination of the issues around education and race.

Commenting in a statement on his appointment, Jansen said he had for some time been drawn to the SAHGF through "an interest in studying how national and indeed international traumas show up in the memories of the second or after-generation, and with what ef-

He said he believed strongly as a teacher and leader that "we bear a responsibility to our youth to teach the lessons of the past in order to develop empathy, understanding and solidarity beyond notions of 'unique pain'". One should, in addition, apply the lessons from historical events to prevent them from happening again.

Speaking from a personal perspective, Jansen said: "The more I learn about the struggles and memories of others, the more I find my own transformation being challenged and deepened on this road that I travel in post-apartheid South Africa."

SAHGF Director Richard Freedman, told Jewish Report that Jansen's appointment would certainly enhance the entity's reputation.

"To be associated with a man of his stature who is public intellectual, who is at the forefront of thinking around issues across the racial divide, is incredibly important for us because, not only does it serve to support our own mission which is very aligned with the way in which he thinks and speaks, but it also gives us credibility in a much broader public."

Freedman noted that Jansen had "a tremendous regard for the work that we do" and was keen to bring the SAHGF's programmes to the UFS and to bring senior leadership among both his staff and student body into contact with them.

"He has established an institute on campus that looks at issues around transformation and has put us in contact with its director. He has also indicated that there is a possibility that we'll be working with his education faculty in the training of students."

The SAHGF had already worked "quite extensively" with the Free State Department of Education and this was a natural development of that process.

"There are all sorts of opportunities for direct involvement," he added.

Freedman said there had been "an avalanche" of congratulatory messages in response to the appointment, both from within and "way beyond" the Jewish community.



Diverse Jewish interest to find Last Man Standing

Israeli boxer Ran Nakash will arrive in South Africa on Monday to participate in the Golden Gloves promoted Super 8 Last Man Standing cruiserweight competition which takes place at Emperors Palace on Saturday night, June 16.

Based on his record of 27 fights with 26 wins - 18 via the "short route" - and one loss, a unanimous points decision to German Marco Huck in Halle, Germany, last year, the Israeli is likely to be the favourite to win this event.

The 33-year-old Nakash is due to take on a host of South African boxers and he has called on the local Jewish community to come out and support him. Nakash is more than your average boxer. In 2007 he was appointed to head the Israeli Defence Force's Krav Maga school.

Nakash was also featured on the Discovery Channel's Fight Quest where he demonstrated the techniques of the Israeli martial art of Krav Maga. In an effort to make Krav Maga available to anyone who is willing to learn regardless of where they are in the world - Nakash launched KravMagaBoot-Camp.com in 2007.

The online training website was the first to offer self-defence training via online video instruction and has since then instructed thousands of students the world over.

There is little doubt that he will get the support of the Johannesburg Jewish community, but those who do arrive at Emperors Palace could well find themselves in a bit of a quandary.

If Nakash reaches the final, he could be facing the other top seeded fighter, Zack Mwekassa. In Zack's corner will be Colin Nathan, who manages the Hot Box Gym in Glenhazel. With a fine kosher restaurant below his establishment, it could well be Colin who secures the partiality of the local community.

Sit with Colin for just five minutes and one can appreciate his passion for the sport oozing out of every pore.

Cape Town-born Colin was taken by his father to a boxing gym at the age of seven and "I just fell in love with the sport and it's been part of me ever since. I'm obsessed with boxing."

He adds: "There is something pure about boxing. There are two people squaring off in a ring. It doesn't matter whether one has a fancy car and the other one doesn't. The playing fields are level.

"I find it a big thrill and what amazes me is how one punch can alter a career."

It is no accident that Colin came to be involved so passionately with boxing. After all, he is the third generation involved in the sport.

"My grandfather started it all. He owned a gym in central Johannesburg. When we lived in Cape Town I used to see my father coming back from boxing tournaments at the Good Hope Centre. He was also corner man."

Although he was a national judo champion, Colin has never fought competitively in a boxing ring, although it was something he would have loved to have done. In 1998 he came up to Johannesburg where he got a job as a continuity announcer on SABC TV 1. He also became a boxing commentator and opened up his gym.

So, Colin, who at age 34 is just one year older than Nakash, could well be in the oth-

er corner, carefully eyeing the Israeli.

There are some decent incentives up for grabs for the eight boxers, with everybody getting a share of the pot. In the first round each contestant will receive R75 000, in the second round the contestants will receive R125 000 each. The semifinalist will split R300 000 and the finalist will split R500 000.

The first and second round bouts will be over eight rounds, the semifinals over 10 rounds and the final will be a 12 rounder.

"It is an interesting tournament when you put everything into perspective," says Colin. "You have three Jews involved and each of them has a different goal.

"One (Nakash) wants to win it, one (Rodney Berman) wants to promote a successful event, and the third (Colin) wants his fighter to win it."

NEW ISRAELI LAW ALLOWS ILLEGAL MIGRANTS TO BE DETAINED FOR UP TO THREE YEARS

JERUSALEM - A new Israeli law that allows illegal migrants to be detained for up to three years, has come into effect.

Israel's Population and Immigration Authority said on Sunday that it would begin enforcing the law, under which anyone who crosses Israel's southern border illegally can be detained for up to three years and will be prevented from entering urban areas.

Israel is currently building a long-term detention centre to house such illegal entrants. Until it is ready, the migrants will be held in a detention centre run by

the Israel Prisons Service.

Until now, migrants could be held only for up to 10 days. They then were released and generally headed to Tel Aviv or Eilat.

The new legislation, which amends a 1954 law, also stipulates that anyone helping migrants or providing them with shelter could face prison sentences of between five and 15 years.

About 60 000 migrants are currently living in Israel, with more than 2 000 entering the country every

JERUSALEM, TEL AVIV ON NEW GOOGLE PROJECT

JERUSALEM - Jerusalem's Old City and parts of historic Tel Aviv are featured in Google's new "World Wonders Project", although Jerusalem is not included under the Israel category.

The project allows visitors to take a virtual tour of the 132 historic and heritage sites from 18 countries and is presented in six languages including English and Hebrew.

The Asia category includes Israel, Japan and Je-

rusalem. "White City of Tel Aviv" is under the Israel category. Jerusalem, in its own category separate from Israel, is made up of views of the Old City, including the Western Wall.

The project was launched on May 31 and uses Street View, 3D modelling and other Google technologies. Partners in the project include Unesco and the World Monuments Fund. (JTA)
