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SA parliamentarians experience Israel – first hand



A group of senior South African parliamentarians, from a diverse range of parties, have just concluded a successful trip to Israel as guests of South African Friends of Israel (SAFI), a not-for-profit organisation which promotes interfaith dialogue between various South African groups. Ben Swartz, national chair of the SA Zionist Federation, who is also closely involved with SAFI, acted as tour leader during the week-long visit. Swartz expressed his satisfaction that the group had gained "a very balanced perspective" during their stay, to enable them to play a constructive role in the Mideast conflict. SAFI is careful not to convert these visits into "propaganda tours", but it aims to allow its guests to meet a wide spectrum of opinion-makers in Israel and the territories and make up their own minds. On Tuesday they met with members of the Palestinian Authority and the following day they had breakfast with Jerusalem Mayor Nir Barkat, before meeting members of the Knesset. But it wasn't all politics. They visited the Volcani Institute of Agricultural Research as well as the Wolfson Medical Centre in Tel Aviv. 

Miracle of the eternal Jew

Mark Twain's astute and eloquent insight into Jewish continuity is as relevant now as it was back then when he expressed it over a century ago.

"The Egyptian, the Babylonian, and the Persian rose, filled the planet with sound and splendour, then faded to dream-stuff and passed away; the Greek and the Roman followed; and made a vast noise, and they are gone... The Jew saw them all, beat them all, and is now what he always was, exhibiting no decadence, no infirmities of age, no weakening of his parts, no slowing of his energies, no dulling of his alert and aggressive mind. All things are mortal but the Jew; all other forces pass, but he remains. What is the secret of his immortality?" ("Concerning The Jews," Harper's Magazine, 1899).

It takes real effort to digest all the catastrophies and challenges that the Jewish people have faced over the last 100 years. Any nation that has faced the perpetual threat of annihilation and constant upheaval like the Jewish people have faced, should have vanished long ago into the annals of history.

Nevertheless we are still here.

Despite the multitude of problems and issues that surround us, we need to appreciate the open miracle that the Jewish people are eternal and will never disappear.

The wonder and phenomenon of Jewish survival throughout the ages is discussed in the first line of this week's parsha.

"You are standing today, all of you, before Hashem your G-d; Your heads, your tribes, your elders and your officers – all the men of Israel" (Devarim Chapter 29 verse 9).

Rashi, the foremost commentator on the Torah, quotes a Midrash which explains that when the Jewish people heard the terrifying litany of 98 curses in the Tochacha (the admonition, which appeared in last week's parsha), they were despondent and demoralised.

The Midrash states that their faces turned different colours at the thought of their bleak and hopeless future. Therefore Moshe immediately consoles them in the first line of this week's parsha. He states that despite all the transgressions and misdeeds that the Jewish People have performed in the past: "You are (still) standing here before Hashem."

Rabbi Nosson Scherman, one of the founders of Artscroll, explains that Rashi is stating that just as Hashem has never abandoned or discarded the Jewish People in the past, so too he will maintain them in the future.

The awful consequences of the Tochacha should prevent the Jewish People from violating the Torah. Nevertheless, if the Jewish People do sin, the punishments that would arise would bring atonement, but never destruction.

Mark Twain was correct in stating that external circumstances and world events do not determine the Jewish People's future. It is imperative to internalise that we are here to stay and we will never disappear.

However, we must take every opportunity to fulfil our historic destiny as a light to the nations and generate as much goodness as we can and spread it as far as possible. With such a mindset and focus and with Hashem's help, we will embrace our fantastic future with confidence and enthusiasm.

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ANC lekgotla aims the big stick at SA Jews and some companies

The South African Jewish community is seething with anger and is also deeply alarmed after Obed Bapela (pictured), head of the ANC's national executive committee's subcommittee on international relations, announced that the ANC was considering banning dual citizenship - aimed primarily at stopping South African citizens serving in the Israeli military. Although the ANC officially outlawed young Jewish South Africans undergoing military training in Israel in 1998, the party now wants an outright ban on the practice as well as implementing a crackdown on private sector ties

"This is exactly what the Nazi regime did in Germany," Zev Krengel, president of the SA Jewish Board of Deputies (SAJBD), told the Jewish Report. "You say Jews are not loyal to their country; secondly you make the outrageous claim that Jews train in Israel and come back here. In Nazi Germany they said that Jews were a danger to Germany; and thirdly you name and shame anyone who does business with

The SAJBD and the SA Zionist Federation (SAZF) have requested a meeting with President Zuma and say they will update the community when they have more clarity.

The Sunday Times broke the story on the weekend and listed

several companies that the ANC would act against including Cape Gate, accused of constructing "the Apartheid wall" in Gaza, retailer Woolworths, and Caterpillar, whose machinery the ANC claim is being used to demolish homes in the West Bank, among others.

In an impassioned public address delivered by video this week, Chief Rabbi Warren Goldstein noted how disturbing it was that the ANC are proposing changing citizenship laws for the whole country because they are obsessed with the State of

He also said that: "To be a Jew is to be deeply connected to Israel and to Jerusalem. That is very much a part of our identity. And we love South Africa and we are loyal and committed South Africans. But we also love Israel and when the ANC targets, with an obsession, the State of Israel more than any other country in the world - that is deeply insulting to a very important part of South African society."

Obed Bapela, who has continued in other media to back up his claims and plans since Sunday's story, has confirmed that the issue had already been discussed at the ANC's July lekgotla and would come up again next month at its national general council.

The measures on citizenship could affect millions of South Africans who have dual citizenship. Legal experts note however that

the ANC would have to change the Constitution.

According to well-known immigration lawyer Craig Smith, quoted in the Sunday Times, "There would be no way that our Constitution will allow government to impose such invasive measures that go to the core of international norms of citizenship law." He called the proposal "retrogressive and ill-conceived".

ANC policy can only be changed at their conference which is in 2017.



But to dismiss the "Bapela proposal" as merely a discussion document is to ignore the possibility that some of the measures could become law at some point, say some political observers. With its huge majority of some 62 per cent in parliament, policy is generally made in Luthuli House and then submitted to the ANC parliamentarians as a fait accompli. Jewish leaders are not yet quaking in their boots about this

"In reality it's a non-starter," says Krengel. "Anything can come up on the agenda at the ANC legotkla and this midterm conference. Actual legislation is many, many years away from even being close to being

Krengel says he is "much more concerned that this type of anti-Semitic conversation is actually happening and that's why we are fighting it so hard. It's got to do with a deputy minister singling out the state of Israel, and his hatred for Israel that he is taking out on the local community."

Mr Justice Dennis Davis is bemused and is wondering just how many South African Jews are actually going to fight in the Israeli army at the moment. "Let's ask a simple question:Can the minister provide specific figures? It is hugely unlikely that this is such a major problem that it requires government intervention."

The recruitment group, Homecoming Revolution, encouraging South African expats to return to the country of their birth, expressed its alarm, saying that should the citizenship ban be enacted, it would have "disastrous consequences" for the economy.

CEO Angel Jones said it would force people with more than one passport to give up their South African citizenship because of a fear the country was regressing.

Many people with dual citizenship living in South Africa rely on pensions from their home countries. Jones points out: "South Africa has more than 800 000 critical skills vacancies across all sectors and a dual citizenship ban would push this higher. We would lose even more critical skills and we would be making it harder for globally experienced South Africans to return home."

How a proposal banning citizens from fighting in foreign armies - should it become law - could be enforced, is an open question, the experts say. If South Africans went to fight in the Israel Defence Force, it would require so much manpower by the South African government to follow up and investigate, that it would be unlikely to happen, says Mr Justice Davis.

In the past, Zionistic South African Jews went to Israel's aid in wars, filling positions such as truck drivers or kibbutz volunteers, to free up the "real soldiers" to do the actual fighting. Most of the South Africans never saw action.

Beyond the Jewish community, South African "mercenaries" are prohibited from plying their trade outside the country's borders. It is well known that former SA special forces personnel act as "advisers" to many African heads of state. There are also quite a number of South African citizens serving in the British armed forces.

Severing Israeli trade ties would cost SA dearly

Calls by Deputy Minister Obed Bapela, head of the ANC's national executive committee on international relations, reported in a weekend newspaper, for South Africa to cut economic ties with Israel, does not reflect reality, according to Michael Freeman, deputy Israeli ambassador to

Freeman told the SA Jewish Report that asking about the economic consequences of trade between South Africa and Israel was the wrong

"The reality is that there are three El Al flights a week with Israeli tourists and business people who are coming here to spend and invest in South Africa," he said.

"There are strong and growing business links between Israel and South Africa. That is the point. That is what we should be looking at."

Freeman said trade between Israel and South Africa had increased year-on-year at over eight per cent for the past five years.

"Just this week, 11 companies from Israel were in South Africa having 200 meetings with South Africans to discuss potential for increased trade and investment.

"We have currently in Israel a South African delegation attending the Digital-Life-Design conference," considered one of the premier international hi-tech gatherings, giving South African entrepreneurs exposure to hundreds of other start-ups, investors and leading multinational companies.

"This is a typical week in Israel-South Africa trade."

Itai Melchior, the trade attaché at the Israeli Embassy, said trade between the two countries was over a billion US dollars a year - and the balance of trade was significantly in South Africa's favour. South African imports from Israel are mainly in the strategic agricultural sector. Advanced irrigation systems and greenhouses as well as yield-enhancing fertilisers and seeds, top

According to economist Michael Kransdorff, enhancing the agricultural sector is a key component of the South Africa National Development Plan. The government has set the ambitious goal of creating a million much needed new jobs in South Africa's rural areas, largely through empowering smaller farmers with improved skills and technology. Continued Israeli imports, investment and sharing knowledge is important to achieve this. However, Israel is far less reliant on South Africa. About 90 per cent of its imports are raw materials that can be readily purchased elsewhere. If trade were to be stopped, it would not have a major effect on Israel or Israeli companies. Israeli exports were mainly split among the US, Europe and the Far East, with around 30 per cent going to each of them.

"No Israeli company is reliant on the South African market. Jobs will be lost in South Africa, not in Israel. Israeli companies employ thousands of South Africans here directly and indirectly. These jobs could be lost."

He was concerned that ceasing trade would have a much bigger impact on South Africa. It would have a negative effect on the atmosphere of doing business, which would be a shame.

"I don't think it will happen," he said. South Africa needed what Israel could offer, especially technology, water, energy and agritechnology, for which Israel is world renowned."

He pointed out that, "the Palestinian Authority's trade with Israel is growing year by year. The PA is not calling for a boycott of Israeli compa-

He added that, "all the cellular operators and fixed-line operators in South Africa have Israeli technology. Most mobile phones have Israeli technology and companies like Google, Apple, Microsoft and Intel have major research and development centres in Israel."

He quoted a recent article by Arthur Goldstuck saying if South Africa did not use Israeli technology, it would have to go back to the stone age.

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New ANCYL president holds out an olive branch to minorities

The newly-elected president of the ANC Youth League (ANCYL), Mokone Collen Maine (pictured), in his closing address of the elective National Congress at Gallagher Estate on Sunday, reached out to young Jews, among other groups. President Jacob Zuma, too, was in a conciliatory mood when he opened the congress last Friday.

ANC Deputy President Cyril Ramaphosa also spoke extensively on the need for a shared future for South Africans of all races, religions and cultures.

Maine spoke at length about the urgent need for what he termed the "Revival of the Friends of the Youth League", which could only be obtained if the Youth League were to seek support "in the broader society, beyond its traditional base."

"We must develop a programme to work with the Muslim, Jewish, Afrikaner, Greek, Hindu, Portuguese, and other minority youth and student formations, among others, for the betterment and secured future of South

He pledged to "continue to give material, human and other support to Palestine, in support of their struggle for independence, as we continue to advocate for the twostate solution".

This conciliatory statement was well-received by young Jewish activists and students that the Jewish Report spoke to.

The new executive of the ANCYL is expected to meet with Jewish youth and student groups as early as this week. It comprises: President - Collen Maine; Deputy President - Desmond Moela; Secretary General - Njabulo Nzuza; Deputy Secretary General - Thandi Moraka; and Treasurer General - Reggie Nkabinde.

The Jewish Report was told by a source inside ANCYL that two high-ranking members of the anti-Israel group BDS-SA had hoped to find themselves on the national



executive committee; it is understood however that both have only become active at provincial level.

The re-established Youth League was clearly carefully chosen with all new office-bearers elected unopposed. Maine used a substantial amount of time in his closing address to apologise to the parent body (ANC) for the ill-discipline in the previous regime headed by Julius Malema, now leader of the Economic Freedom Fighters.

On international relations, Maine said: "We will continue to participate in programmes that seek to maximise the impact of international youth exchange programmes and further strengthen party-to-party relations with our progressive partners on the international platform, particularly within BRICS and South-South partners.

"The ANC Youth League will continue to offer support to youth formations that are operating within oppressive regimes, within the continent and the rest of global society."

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On clamouring for a South African passport

It is unlikely that the proposal of Obed Bapela, a senior ANC official on international relations, to forbid dual citizenship for South African Jews who want to also be citizens of Israel, will succeed. The legal obstacles to changing the law in this direction are formidable and it would also have to apply to South Africans who are citizens of other

The negative effect on them will be huge, as will be the effects on the country's image. Bapela probably knows that, so why is he willing to do so much damage to the morale of South African Jews by making them feel singled out in this way?

But let's play devil's advocate for a moment, and contemplate a scenario where such a law

actually gets passed and South Africans can only hold one citizenship. What would Americans who also hold SA citizenship do? Give up their American citizenship? Very unlikely. Or British, Lithuanians, Canadians, Australians and others?

Would they choose to relinquish those passports and be South Africans only? The vast majority of them would - with great sadness for most - give up their South African citizenship rather

than the others they hold - not because they don't want to be South Africans.

There still remains an idealism in this country and a feeling that we have done extraordinary things in the past and can again in the future. But there are serious questions about the future. People will look at how South Africa seems to be unravelling under the inept and corrupt leadership of President Jacob Zuma and his ANC and wonder what lies ahead.

What does it mean to carry a passport? Twenty years ago at the dawn of South African democracy, the citizens of this country for the first time felt proud producing their SA passports at international airports when they travelled. We were the people from the miracle country of Mandela, this was our brand, as opposed to the days when apartheid was the brand associated with us.

These days, however, many people are

again embarrassed, because we have become famous for our crime, corruption, xenophobia and racial divisions again, and for the ineptitude which characterises our govern-

The debacles at Eskom, SAA, Prasa, and other major pillars of our economy, and the fact that poverty has got worse since apartheid ended, rather than better, should make us hang our heads in shame.

Bapela and the ANC should be concentrating their energies on making South Africa a country which people admire and are clamouring to be citizens of, rather than playing cheap politics in this way. He should be aiming for a day when a South African passport will be valued like a jewel because of the successful country it represents.

In making a noise about South Africans who go to Israel, he is scoring points with sections of the electorate, wanting to look like a gutsy campaigner for human rights. But it is superficial political grandstanding.

> It paints Israel and SA Jews with a crude, broad brush as if they can be neatly summarised in one phrase: the building of more Jewish settlements on stolen Palestinian land, and the oppression of the Palestinians. It takes no account of the widely diverse views they hold on the nature of Israeli society, the nature of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the occupation of the West Bank, their personal roles,

and so on.

None of the above is to say that Israel is blameless in this. It has today one of the most rightwing, rejectionist governments in its history, and a prime minister who provides no vision for a peaceful future - only more and more conflict.

But without a doubt, nor are the Palestinians that he champions blameless. They could have had their independent state, living in peace alongside Israel many years ago - they were offered it repeatedly by more liberal Israeli governments but couldn't bring themselves to make the choice to end the conflict.

All of these nuances seem to escape Bapela. Sadly, the only thing his ranting has achieved is to make South African Jews feel more vulnerable. But he needs to understand: South Africa is their country as much as it is his, and they will stand up for this right.





Living in the age of distraction

Last week Monday, August 31, over a billion people logged onto Facebook in one day - about one seventh of the world's population. The social media site says it has nearly 1,5 billion users who log on at least once a month. While this is amazing news for its founder Mark Zuckerberg, what does it mean for the rest of us who live in a world of constant tweeting, Instagramming, whatsapping, and even sexting?

The sight of couples dining in restaurants in rapt conversation with their mobile devices, or family dinners marked by iPad use or intermittent texting, is commonplace. To pass judgement would be myopic because these are not necessarily unhappy couples or dysfunctional families.

Indeed mobile phones and texting allow us to be more efficient than ever. As parents we can check in with our children and schedule their activities while ordering groceries online, getting the ingredients together for supper or holding a business meeting.

Despite the advantages, what has gadgetry and the ubiquitous worldwide web taken away from our interpersonal spaces? In a recent article in Psychotherapy Networker by Ron Taffel, chairman of the Institute for Contemporary Psychotherapy in New York, he noted that one third of mothers in the US had mobile device by 2012. They utilised them on average 6,1 hours a day and reported that their devices were always within

For psychologists like Taffel, the concern is the interrupted attention that this brings. Even when parents want to give undivided time to their children, our modern, technology-infused, multi-tasking lives, get in the way and our offspring do not get the unbroken intensity and eye contact that they deserve.

Is this a contributing factor to the increasing levels of anxiety and depression evident in teens today who are getting this "agitated, fragmented, distracted attention" from their parents? Taffel, among others, say it is.

"If love is, as has been suggested, focused interest, how can chronic distraction translate into secure attachment?" Taffel asks.

Secure attachment - forming strong attachments to parents but being able to leave them, knowing they will return later - is required during childhood to form the basis for secure relationships and independence as adults.

And as adults, technology has revolutionised our interpersonal space. It has opened up the possibility of friendships or romantic partners in different social circles or even countries. It is now possible to build emotional bonds through constant texting and seeing one another on Skype without actually living in close proximity.

Although there are obvious advantages to this, it has altered the dimensions of our personal engagement. We live for the highs of the beep in response, we can sink when it has not been read or responded to, and in these interactions, we have lost the more traditional rules of engagement which involve touch, smile and eye

Also, it is strange that through sites like Facebook, though we are not in regular touch with distant friends or acquaintances and may never be, we are party to the sometimes intimate moments of their lives.

Technology has also opened up a whole new world of "cyber infidelity", a topic therapists are writing widely on. Woe for the amount of relationships that have ended over text messages surreptitiously discovered by suspicious partners.

And one can imagine the emotional havoc wreaked when Ashley Madison, the site for cheating spouses, was recently hacked and the more than 30 million names were released into the public domain.

The late Steve Jobs, founder of Apple, once said that his customers didn't know what they wanted until it was shown to them. He helped created a desire and now an absolute reliance on tablet computers and smartphones. Yes, this creator of modern computing was most brilliant.

Perhaps, however, the creator of Shabbat was even more so, giving us this amazing weekly opportunity to disengage from all our devices and to stop, take stock and really relate to important people in our lives. It is indeed a wonder more of us don't take advantage of this "freebie".

Board denounces Bapela's 'undemocratic proposals'

The first part of this week was largely taken up with responding to outrageous comments, as reported in the Sunday Times, by Deputy Minister Obed Bapela suggesting that the ANC was considering abolishing dual citizenship in order to prevent South African Jews from serving in the IDF. The Deputy Minister was also quoted as expressing his party's support for boycotting certain businesses because of their dealings with Israel.

The Board has conducted an active campaign in the media to denounce these undemocratic and grossly discriminatory proposals. In numerous interviews, as well as in an on-air

debate with Mr Bapela, our President Zev Krengel pulled no punches, saying that they overtly targeted the Jewish community over and above all other South African citizens and invoked against its members the classic anti-Semitic, "dual loyalty" canard.

In our press statement, we amplified on this, saying that the proposal to change existing citizenship legislation purely to prevent South African Jews from having a relationship with Israel, was an attack on a core value of South Africa's democracy.

Also stressed was the sobering historical lesson that while discriminatory acts might begin with the Jews, they seldom ended with them. In a country which on a daily basis had to battle against racism and xenophobia, Bapela was further inflaming divisions within our society.

As the statement put it: "While mentioning Jews today, it will be other minorities tomorrow."

Significantly, the proposed action against holding dual citizenship generated across the board anxiety. A number of commentators pointed out that in terms of the Constitution, no citizen could be





deprived of citizenship, and that therefore any mechanism to take away the citizenship of someone would be unconstitutional.

In fact, the Bapela proposals constitute just the latest instance of radical anti-Israel sentiment resulting in threats to our democratic culture.

The message we wished to put out was that we were proud South Africans who had as much right as anyone to take a position on Israel or anything else and that we would not be intimidated by threats or defamatory suggestions that our loyalty to the country was suspect.

In addition to our public response, we also took care to brief and reassure

our own community. Our communique in this regard stressed that Bapela's views represented those of a narrow faction within the ANC and not the policy of the party itself. To clarify what the true position was, we were following up with the ANC at the highest levels and would update the community once we had more clarity on this and related questions.

We are now on the threshold of Rosh Hashanah and the extended Jewish festival season. At this time of reflection and new beginnings, I wish everyone a sweet, peaceful, healthy and successful new year.

Whatever challenges 5776 might bring, I have little doubt that we will meet and overcome them as in years gone by, and in that as always, the SAJBD will continue to do everything necessary to ensure that the civil liberties of our community are upheld.


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The Power to Surprise

Mendelsohn has big plans for the Kaplan Centre

Adam Mendelsohn (pictured) has been appointed associate professor in the department of Historical Studies and director of the Kaplan Centre for Jewish Studies and Research at the University of Cape Town, his alma mater.

The former Herzlian has lived in the United States for 12 years, having been associate

professor of Jewish Studies at the College of Charleston, South Caro-

lina and since 2008, has directed a centre focused on Jews in the American South.

Mendelsohn, who majored in history and politics at UCT, "stumbled" into the field of Jewish Studies "by accident", when completing his undergraduate degree in the US. He took a course in the field and as part of the programme, did a comparative project on Jews in apartheid South Africa and in the Civil Rights Movement in the US.

"From there it really gathered momentum and I decided to do a master's project which would be comparative; by that point I was hooked," he recalls. A master's degree at UCT followed, as well as a doctorate in Modern Jewish History from Brandeis University.

"Coming back to South Africa certainly wasn't in my long-range plan," the 36-year-old says, "but this is the position I would always have come back for. It's at UCT, it's in Cape Town and it's very unusual in that it's not just an academic position.

"The Kaplan Centre takes on the responsibility of doing research into the community - both historical and sociological - and there's nothing quite like it in the equivalent American university positions.

"In the United States there are already 1 001 Jewish university or communal organisations

which are doing research of one kind or another. Here, the Kaplan Centre seems to be the address to do that."

Mendelsohn says it was not a hard sell to get his American wife, Andrea, to relocate. "She's very adventurous; she lived in Ethiopia for a year, India for a year and has travelled to all sorts of other places. Ironically, when I was in the US years ago, she was a Semester Study Abroad student at UCT!"

> The new director has many plans for the Kaplan Centre, some of which include continuing the projects of his predecessor, Professor Milton Shain. One of two major initiatives on the drawing board is a national survey of the Jewish community - previously done in 2005 - incorporating social attitudes towards a variety of current issues.

"The last study (reflected) a moment of great optimism in the community. (We'll) see how things

stand now 10 years later."

The other is a national survey to gauge black South Africans' thinking about Jews. "There have been a number of episodes where people have said disturbing things," he explains, giving as an example the (former) leader of Wits SRC's pro-Hitler utterances earlier this year.

"Again, this will be a snapshot of the range and potency of attitudes to Jews, how much impact BDS, reporting on Israel in the media as well as the government's approach to Israel, have had and whether Christian-Zionism has played a role in shaping attitudes."

Mendelsohn also envisages the Kaplan Centre serving as a think tank, initiating discussion in the community through position papers on how broader societal issues such as gay rights, animal rights, feminism, the structure of the community and philanthropy should or can affect

Iranian leader vows to increase military capability to defeat Israel


TEHRAN - Hours after US Senator Barbara Mikulski (Democrat Maryland) announced last week that she would back the Obama administration's nuclear deal with Iran, ensuring enough supporting votes to prevent an override of a presidential veto of any Congressional rejection of the pact, a senior Iranian Revolutionary Guard commander said that the Islamic Republic would continue strengthening its military capabilities until it had defeated Israel.

"[The US and Israel] should know that the Islamic Revolution will continue enhancing its preparedness until it overthrows Israel and liberates Palestine," said Brigadier General Mohsen Kazzemeini, Iran's Fars News Agency

"We will continue defending not just our own country, but also all the oppressed people of the world, especially those countries that are standing on the forefront of confrontation with the Zionists," he said. (JNS.org)







Gross anti-Semitism goes unpunished in Australia

Imagine if an Islamist preacher called for death to the Jews in a public speech in your city in South Africa. This occurred in Sydney, Australia, and the state is powerless to act.

The six-month statute of limitations in which a prosecution could be mounted by the state,

expired on September 3, with an appeal by the New South Wales Jewish Board of Deputies for legal action against the preacher and his organisation dismissed, even though the Director of Public Prosecutions agreed that a "likely breach" of the law had occurred.

Describing Jews as "the most evil creature of Allah", Ismail al-Wahwah, spiritual leader of Hizb ut-Tahrir - which has been banned in a number of countries but is legal in Australia - told a rally in Sydney (translated): "Moral corruption is linked to the Jews... If the Jews were given the whole world, they would want the heavens. That is the nature of the Jews. It is a delusion to think that there can be peace and coexistence... with the Jews...

"There is only one solution for this cancerous tumour: It must be uprooted and thrown back to where it came from. They have corrupted the world with their corrupt media. The Israelites have corrupted the world with so-called art, cinema and corrupt films, and with sex trade, drug trade and moral depravity. They have corrupted the world in every respect...

"Whatever the outcome is of today's battle, it is not the final battle. There is a sea of blood between the Jews and us. They will pay with blood for blood, with tears for tears, and with destruction for destruction.

"The ember of jihad against the Jews will continue to burn. Judgement Day will not come until the Muslims fight the Jews... tomorrow you Jews will see what will become of you - an eye for an eye, blood for blood, destruction for destruction."

The NSW Jewish Board of Deputies, which represents the Jewish community of New South Wales - Australia's most populous state - lodged an appeal with the NSW Anti-Discrimination Board in March this year, urging that the Director of Public Prosecutions take action against Hizb ut-Tahrir and al-Wahwah.

The Board agreed that within a month there was a case to answer and referred the matter to the Director of Public Prosecutions and the police.

However, in the 26 years since the anti-discrimination legislation was enacted in 1989, the NSW Anti-Discrimination Board has referred 30 cases to the Director of Public Prosecutions; not one has been prosecuted.

Hizb ut-Tahrir calls for the overthrow of Western democracies and the creation of a worldwide caliphate, but insists that it does not advocate violence. Australian Prime Minister Tony Abbott said earlier this year that his government was considering banning it.

The incendiary nature of al-Wahwah's speech was so outrageous that the NSW Jewish Board of Deputies regarded the case as a test of whether the law is able to deal with someone who publicly calls for the death of a group of Australians based on ethnicity.

A multi-party inquiry into the legislation was held in 2013, but none of its 15 recommendations has been implemented.



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








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COMMUNITY NOTICE 2015: JHB JEWISH CEMETERIES

War hero Richard Kemp to visit South Africa



"In relation to the 2008-09 Gaza conflict, no army in the history of warfare had taken greater steps than the IDF to minimise harm to civilians in a combat zone. My observations during the 2014 conflict confirmed this. No other army that I have served in or alongside or that I have studied and researched, has yet taken such extensive precautions." (Colonel Richard Kemp CBE)

Colonel Richard Kemp (pictured) has spent most of his life combating terrorism and insurgency. In his 30-year military career he commanded British troops on the frontline in some of the world's toughest hotspots.

The South African Zionist Federation says in a media release it will be presenting Kemp to the community on Thursday evening October 15 and his focus will be on the Arab-Israeli conflict as well as the horrors of ISIS.

"Seats will be limited and booking is essential," the SAZF says.

In 2003, Col Kemp was commander of British forces in Afghanistan. From 2002 - 2006 he worked in the British Prime Minister's Office, heading the international terrorism team at the Joint Intelligence Committee.

Concurrently he served as chairman of the strategic intelligence group at COBRA, the UK national crisis management committee, akin to the White House Situation Room. In 2006 he received a CBE.

In 2009, at an emergency session of the UN in Geneva, he vigorously refuted Mr Justice Richard Goldstone's allegations of war crimes against the Israel Defence Forces during Operation Cast Lead.

Kemp was present during the Gaza operations' Pillar of Defence in 2012 and Protective Edge in 2014 and when Operation Protective Edge ended, he gave a detailed briefing to the Foreign Affairs and Defence Committee of the Knesset, providing his assessment of the way the conflict was conducted and the future in Gaza.

In February this year he gave evidence to the UN Commission of Inquiry investigating the Gaza conflict; and four months later he addressed the UN Human Rights Council in Geneva, rejecting the Commission's report.

In May this year, Bar-Ilan University in Israel bestowed an honorary doctorate on Kemp "in recognition of his stalwart battle against terrorism and terrorist organisations. Courageously defending Israel's security policies and the morality of the IDF before the UN Human Rights Council, he has helped strengthen the standing of Israel throughout the world," the university said.

Kemp is a regular columnist for The Times of London, frequently writes for other national and international newspapers and is a prolific contributor to television and radio news and current affairs programmes.

He has undertaken successful speaking tours in the US, Canada, Australia and Europe and shared platforms with former US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, former British Prime Minister Tony Blair and former Australian Prime Minister John Howard.

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
Waverley Shul launches exciting 'ReJEWvination' project

ANC'S LATEST ACTIONS REGARDING ISRAEL, A CAUSE FOR CONCERN

I am a third generation South African, tracing my roots back some 125 years. My parents instilled in me a love for South Africa and for her people.

And creeping insidiously into the discourse of the ANC is an anti-Israel sentiment that is nothing short of anti-Semitism.

The Middle East is imploding. Millions of Syrians have been forced to flee their country of birth; over 250 000 have so far been killed. Women and children are being beheaded by ISIS and traitors to its cause are drowned in cages or burned alive.

ISIS proudly flaunts its barbarity on videos for all to see. But Obed Bapela (head of the ANC's national subcommittee on international relations) and his comrades remain

It would also seem that they are undeterred by the fact that according to an Eyewitness News report at least 23 South

Africans had already been recruited by ISIS. Does ISIS truly pale into insignificance for them next to the Arab-Israel conflict?

Nearly a million Tutsis died in Rwandan genocide



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

A long battle to get permission to put up headstones for Jewish stillborn babies in West Park Cemetery in Johannesburg has been won and has brought about change to a long-held custom of burying babies who did not live past 30 days, in the stillborn section without parents present and with no gravestones.

This is because babies who do not live longer than 30 days are classified by the Orthodox in particular, as being stillborn.

On Sunday, August 23, a group of Beth David congregants, including the temple's rabbis, Adrian Schell and Julia Margolis, met at the cemetery to clean up the stillborn section.

Thirty-eight years after our baby was buried, we were finally given permission to erect a gravestone and now, six years later, dozens of parents have taken that step to honour their children.

We went to the cemetery armed with gardening tools and refuse bags and got down to the serious business of restoring dignity to a neglected area hidden behind a hedge. Two hours and more than a dozen bags later, we had cleared a good portion of the area, replaced grave markers and washed down gravestones. We also said Kaddish with a minyan which truly affirmed his life, short as it was.

People visiting the cemetery stopped to find out who we were and what we were doing and all expressed their gratitude for what we had

Our baby, like many others in the stillborn section, was not actually stillborn. He died on the day of his birth in 1971. The procedure was that the Chev did not allow parents to be present at the burial and in fact we were only notified after the fact that our son had been buried.

Because these babies were not considered viable, they could not be named and death certificates were issued with the name "baby" on it, so, in our case we have a birth certificate with a name and a death certificate without one. We were also told that no stones could be erected for these babies.

But in 2009 a very sympathetic lady at the Chev gave us the go-ahead to erect a headstone. I can only imagine that other parents visiting the

resting place of their babies saw what we had done and followed suit. The cleaning exercise has helped us so much. Finally we feel that others understand what it means to lose a baby."

Be proudly Jewish, AJ tells sportsmen

The debate on whether Jewish athletes should put religion before sport, especially if they make a living out of sport, will never reach an agreed solution, but AJ Edelman is a sportsman with a different spin on the whole debate.

Edelman is hoping to qualify for the 2018 Winter Olympics in Pyeongchang, South Korea. He was born in Boston in the US, grew up on the East Coast and attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. But a gap year which he spent studying at Yeshivat Lev Hatorah in Ramat Beit Shemesh, inspired him after graduating in 2013, to join the Israel Bobsleigh and Skeleton Federation.

Skeleton is a fast winter sliding sport in which a person rides a small sled down a frozen track while lying face down during which the rider experiences forces up to 5Gs and reaches speeds of more than 130km per hour. The bony appearance of the sled gave the sport its name. It was added to the Olympic programme for the 2002 Winter Olympics.

Last year Edelman had four successful races that landed him 91st in world rankings and qualified him for a spot in the World Championships in Austria. Now he has plans to enter 12 to 14 more races in order to represent Israel in 2018.

Edelman calls himself "a self-identifying Orthodox Jew". He is shomrei Shabbat and is happy to put on tefillin prior to a competition, as he fully embraces his Judaism. But, in a recent interview with Breaking Israel News, Edelman says his primary goal isn't to compete, but rather to inspire other Jewish would-be athletes and to be a role model

they can look up to

He wants to "inspire other Jews to take up sport, fulfil their passions, give their all, and to represent their homeland by doing so".

He is dedicating the next seven years to this sport in order to encourage others.

Edelman believes there is a stigma that works against Jews who participate in sport. "Jews are highly represented in almost every field of excellence in the public eye - doctors, lawyers, businessmen, actors, scientists, engineers..." he explained. "The only place Jews are not highly represented by excellence as role models, is in sport. It's almost as if it is the butt of a joke for Jews to succeed in sport."

Edelman is setting out not just to succeed at his sport, but to change the message and send out a new one: that Jews can also achieve excellence in sport.

"Athletes like Aly Raisman, who is proudly Jewish and won a gold medal with the US gymnastic team, are sadly the exception to the rule," said Edelman. And this, according to him, is because there is no prime role model for Jewish children who are proudly Jewish, successful and visible.

"I realised I can inspire them and can be that individual," said Edelman. "Growing up, I was keenly aware of the way I acted and that my teammates viewed me as a reflection of my community and of Israel, as well as of myself. That was quite a burden. I want to make it easier for the next generation of Jewish athletes.

"I want to be seen by as many Jews as possible. I want them to see the Star of David on my uniform and feel that they can do what I'm doing."

He believes that if there were more Jews

who were active in sport and also living a Jewish life, this would encourage other Jews to also get involved.

He still has many hurdles to clear before he can attain his goal of competing in the Olympics. His secondary objective is to get the Israeli government to recognise that it should be a priority to have Jews represent the country by competing in various sports around the world.

Athletes are known for spreading good PR so it would be good for the image of the country, he believes.

The recent work of Omri Caspi, who brought other NBA stars to Israel to fight the BDS movement's propaganda, is a perfect example of an athlete who, by competing on the international stage, has succeeded in rehabilitating Israel's image.

Edelman does not receive support from the state and funds himself, footing the bill for training, competitions, gear, and travel, as well as finding coaches and there are also living expenses. He co-trains with teams from other small nations.

He needs R550 000 a season. He also has to travel 100km to a coach who would train with him.


Despite all the negatives, he says competing for the benefit of Israel gives the sport more meaning. "I felt that I could make a much bigger difference to inspire Jews if I represent the country that I love, my homeland, Israel.

"Every time I hear them announce instructions to clear the track for the Israeli athletes, every time I put on the white and blue, it gives me a tremendous amount of encouragement and a push to succeed and keep going."
