Joyous celebration as arrival of new Torah is welcomed



The induction of a new Torah is always a joyous occasion, with jubilation and lots of singing, dancing and clapping. Last Sunday was no exception when more than 500 people, including Chief Rabbi Warren Goldstein, came out for a day of dedication and celebration as the Unity Torah was inducted by the Shul in Sandton Central community. The final letters were filled in during a formal ceremony at the Waverley home of Meni and Robyn Shani, as the Torah was dedicated to the loving memory of their daughter, Elliet Hodaya, who passed away last year. Traditionally a new Torah is welcomed into a community just as one would welcome a new bride and groom. A party bus, transporting dozens of children and a truck bedecked with a beautifully decorated chuppah, made of hand-woven materials that Elliet had previously selected, formed part of the celebratory procession. An authentic Torah scroll is a mind-boggling masterpiece of labour, love and skill. Containing exactly 304 805 letters, the beautiful 54-portion parchment scroll took months to complete. Rabbi Cyril Harris: 10 year yahrzeit commemorated

This year marks the 10th anniversary since the passing of Emeritus Chief Rabbi Cyril Harris z"tl (pictured).

Rabbi Harris passed away on the 9th of Elul 5765, which corresponds this year to August 24. Rabbi Harris, who had given devoted service

to two large London synagogues and the British rabbinate and who came with a very positive recommendation from the late British Chief Rabbi Lord Jakobovits, was chosen to succeed the late Chief Rabbi Bernard Casper

Rabbi Harris' chief rabbinate proved to be very different from what went before. While other chief rabbis certainly had the ear of the government of the day and had ready access to various government departments, Rabbi Harris projected a much larger

than life image on the larger South African scene. He sat on various committees and participated

in government affairs and in inter-faith relationships to a far greater extent than previous incumbents.

Rabbi Harris arrived in South Africa at a very opportune moment in our history. Apartheid was in the process of being dismantled and all the means were being set in motion for transforming the country into a democratic society with a new constitution and a bill of rights exorcising racism from its agenda.

Rabbi Harris positioned himself in a prominent role in this process and was also able to forge a close friendship and relationship with Nelson Mandela, the first president of the new South Africa. Rabbi Harris was an important guest at Mandela's inauguration and participate in the proceedings.

Together with his wife Ann, the chief rabbi

continued to play a major role ir helping the needy and less fortunate members of the community through their involvement in Afrika Tikkun, an outreach organisation which serves the needs of the wider community.


He was a great supporter and promoter of the new South Africa and was constantly urging the community not to emigrate but to remain here and contribute to the consolidation of the new South Africa.

A chief rabbi, as the very title indicates, is immersed also in

the specific needs of the Jewish community. Rabbi and Ann Harris travelled the length and breadth of the country, visiting every Jewish community in South Africa and even further afield. His broad Scottish brogue and picturesque speaking style, as well as his sense of humour, was known far and wide and greeted with warmth and acclaim.

After 17 years of loyal, devoted and passionate service, Rabbi Harris decided to go into retirement and passed away a few months later after a lengthy illness.

Justice is an absolute cosmic value



Parshat Shoftim

Rev Joseph Matzner **Our Parents Home**

Parshat Shoftim is a good and fitting preparation for Elul and the Days of Judgement, the Yemei Hadin.

The opening sentences of our parsha enjoin us to appoint judges in all our cities, towns and villages "and they shall judge the people with righteousness".

The Torah gives the clear impression that justice has to be easily accessible at all times and that justice is an absolute value, a universal cosmic value.

From the Torah it becomes clear that justice is Divine and belongs to the world of Kedushah, holiness. Justice has its seat in the Holy Temple and must be seen as a service to G-d.

The Jewish people know in every fibre of their being the unconditional necessity of justice as one of the pillars upon which the world stands, that they are the people who submits themselves willingly every year to Divine judgement, as they have done for the past 3 500 years.

We ourselves decide and proclaim the Day of Judgement, we even fix the actual date of our judgement. The Beth Din Shel Maala endorses the date and broadcasts this great and awesome event to the highest of heavens.

And even as we invite our national yearly trial, so do we have fixed times for our own daily trial.

These are the three daily prayers. These are the moments when our little siddur invites us to a whole series of trials and introspections and reassessments. Our friend the siddur invites us to a daily mini-trial and leaves us with the wonderful feeling that it is good to be tried by the ultimate standards of truth!

The parsha describes the four sources of uthority in Israel namely the Shofet - judge; the King - Melech; the Kohen - priest; and the $\,$ Navi - prophet. Each has his own specific duties and none can normally assume the duties of the

The judge is trained in Torah law and judges accordingly. Only the great Sanhedrin can sometimes judge according to the universal law (Bnei Noach laws) which continues to exist beneath the Sinai law.

The King is in charge of national security in times of peace and in times of war. "The King assembles the whole nation." He can at times invoke the more severe Noachide laws in times of emergency.

The Navi is the national sensor. He is able to discern what the people are doing; he is sensitive to any national deviation. He chastises rank and file.

The Kohen has the best defined role. He is bound by the rules of Temple service and all matters of purity and impurity and is in constant touch with the people.

The Great Sanhedrin is the repository of the ral law. It too is permitted to put a halacha in parenthesis for a limited time for tikkun olam - for the benefit of the nation as a whole. The

Sanhedrin never acts arbitrarily. It makes takkanoth for the good of the people for all future generations.

According to Rambam, the laws of the Talmud have the force of Sanhedrin because the great majority of the people accepted those laws and embraced the sages who gave them over.

A final word: The first letters of Melekh, Shofet, Kohen, Navi, form the word Mishcan. May we all be inscribed in the Book of Life.

Gloves come off in Frankel child abuse allegation

After the explosive allegations that first surfaced in the investigative magazine Noseweek in October 2014 that Johannesburg businessman, philanthropist and socialite Sidney Frankel had molested several young children in the 1970s and 1980s, the case shot to prominence again last week. New developments are sure to shake the close-knit South African Jewish community, including questions about what Frankel's wife Callie knew.

The lobby organisation Women and Men Against Child Abuse (WMACA) hosted a packed media conference in Johannesburg last week Thursday, with Ian Levitt, the lawyer representing the seven claimants and forensic psychologist Leonard Carr.

Four harrowing, graphic statements from the alleged victims were read out. "The gloves are off, there is nothing subtle about abuse," said WMACA co-founder Miranda Friedmann. Apparently, a dozen others have come forward but are not ready to join the case.

In South Africa, a criminal case may not be laid more than 20 years after an incidence of child abuse. WMACA is campaigning to change the law, in line with the UK, Canada, Ireland and half the US states. The plaintiffs are therefore pursuing a civil case, each seeking R5 million in damages. In an affidavit, Frankel denied all allegations, claiming this was a conspiracy to extort money.

In what Levitt characterised as an intimidation tactic by Frankel's defence team, led by Billy Gundelfinger, the three claimants based overseas have each been required to put up security of R144 000 against the defendant's costs.

The plaintiffs hit back publicly. To bolster their case, Levitt lodged court papers, including two recorded phone calls from August 2013 - between claimant Nicole Diamond and Sidney Frankel, and between Diamond and Callie Frankel (see the Eyewitness News website).

When Diamond asks Sidney Frankel to meet and talk about the alleged abuse, he says he will only do so with his lawyer. Callie Frankel refuses to meet Diamond, saying: "This is not my issue" and: "What I have done about it is my business."

Levitt asked what Callie knew, when she knew, and what she did about it.

He said that criminal charges would be laid in August. The court would reject them due to the 20-year proscription. They would then take the decision under review, all the way to the Constitutional Court if necessary. "They want this man in jail," he said.

Leonard Carr explained why abuse victims can take so long to tell their stories. "Once you are violated, this can affect you for life," he said. The profound shame and mortifica-

tion of abuse shifts one's sense of self.

"Children can't stand up to godlike, omnipotent authority figures," and are reluctant to disclose abuse, fearing adults' reactions. People question and blame the victim, and disclosure promotes secondary trauma.

Toxic secrets therefore brew for many years. Paedophiles manipulate the child to drop his or her defences and trust the abuser. Later in life this leads to mistrust, or

abusive relationships, because the person can suspect any warm, loving actions as a prelude to exploitation.

Carr said if the abuse was difficult to disclose, this should add to the veracity of the claims.

Many adults tend not to believe children when they do come forward, as happened with one alleged victim from the Arcadia Children's Home when he claimed Frankel abused him.

Speakers noted that things had changed radically since the 1980s, with allegations taken much more seriously today. WMACA's Luke Lamprechts said that actions against abuse in the Jewish community had been very encouraging in the last few years, with hard-hitting programmes in Jewish organisations, schools and shuls.

"There is recognition that this is an issue, and must be addressed." He cited Kidsafe and

Koleinu as prominent initiatives.

Carr asked why cases like this cause some to question the Jewish community as a whole, when race and religion are seldom discussed in other instances.

Friedmann said: "Abuse transcends every

race and religion. It just happens that many of the people involved in this instance are Jewish." She said this was an isolated case.

In a subsequent media statement, Gundelfinger castigated Levitt for trying this case in the media.

Can a hunger strike be a terrorist weapon?

When does a doctor's attempt to save a patient's life become a political rather than a medical act? This question has provoked a fierce debate in Israel, as a Palestinian detainee teetered at the edge of death on Monday after a 62-day hunger strike.

Mohammad Allaan, a lawyer, started his hunger strike to protest being held in administrative detention without charges since last November, because of membership in terrorist group Islamic Jihad. He lost consciousness last Friday, but doctors at Barzilai Medical Centre in Ashkelon, where he was hospitalised and in a coma, stabilised his condition.

But should they force him to accept food or medical treatment?

In recent weeks he has become a focus of protest, particularly because he could be the first person to be force-fed since a new law was passed in the Knesset, permitting it. Palestinians clashed with Jewish protestors in Ashkelon on Sunday evening because of Allaan's hospitalisation and the prospect of force-feeding him.

Allaan's action prompted the Knesset to pass legislation in June, allowing a judge to sanction force-feeding or medical treatment if there is a threat to the inmate's life, even if he refuses.

Palestinians in Israeli jails have held hunger strikes over recent years, many being hospitalised and causing political protests. The law was promoted by Public Security Minister Gilad Erdan, who said that "security prisoners are interested in turning a hunger strike into a new type of suicide terrorist attack through which they will threaten the State of Israel. We will not allow anyone to threaten us and we will not allow prisoners to die in our prisons."

But critics say force-feeding is unethical and the law is political, meant to prevent violence sparked by a hunger-striker's death rather than protect a prisoner's dignity and well-being. The Israeli Medical Association plans to challenge the new law in the Supreme Court and urged doctors not to comply with it.

Force-feeding constitutes torture, says the IMA, and treating a patient against his will violates medical ethics.

However, this view is challenged by leading Israeli medical ethics expert, Prof Gil Siegal, a member of the National Bioethics Council, head of the Centre for Health Law and Bioethics at Ono Academic College, and law professor at the University of Virginia.

He says doctors should save the lives of hunger-striking prisoners even against their will: "I'm embarrassed by a doctor who'd be willing to see a person die in the name of a political protest."

Doctors should already have intervened in Allaan's hunger strike with life-saving treatment, he said, despite the prisoner's opposition when he was conscious. In an article on the DoctorsOnly website, Siegal said the IMA's position was an import from other countries, different to Israel's character and needs. He wrote: "Force-feeding' is the wrong term. The proper term is 'saving livre'."

He told Haaretz: "Israeli ethics has the right to autonomy. We aren't a colony of the United States or a European colony. [Israeli ethics] is a cultural, societal, legal and ethical creation whose voice is unique and clear."

Medical ethics worldwide includes four main principles: the patient's autonomy, refraining from harming the patient, trying to help the patient, and equality between patients. "This is the Anglo-American ethic," says Siegal, "but it lacks two additional principles. The first is the sanctity of life, and the second is mutual responsibility and solidarity.

"The hunger-striker waves the banner of autonomy, but realising this right conflicts with realising the sanctity of life. Israeli law states explicitly that the sanctity of life take precedence in extreme cases. Anyone who rejects this is abolishing a binding Israeli creation and essentially bowing his head to foreign scholars of medical ethics instead of Israeli ones."

Administrative detention of people suspected of terrorist activities has been mostly applied to Palestinians. But it has been suggested by Israel's security services that suspected Jewish terrorists - such as those who recently firebombed the Dawabsheh family home in the West Bank, killing their 18-month old baby and critically injuring the others - will be handled the same way. Will there be similar hunger strikes by the Jewish terrorists?

German author Thomas Mann is famous for saying: "Everything is politics." Medical ethics may try to position itself above politics, but for the Israeli doctors treating Allaan, it is a lot more complex. **World News in Brief**

IDF officer: Iran behind all recent attacks in Golan Heights

JERUSALEM - All attacks in the Golan Heights region since December 2013 "have been carried out with Iranian direction", a senior Israel Defence Forces (IDF) Northern Command officer told reporters last Sunday.

According to the officer, who remained anonymous, several hundred Hezbollah terrorist operatives were currently active on the Syrian side of the Israeli border in the Golan Heights. The officer also said Iran had been responsible for the planting of an explosive device on the Israel-Syria border in April.

Terrorist operatives in the border area had received "clear guidance" from Iran to carry out attacks, the officer said. One terrorist cell operating in the area was led by Samir Kuntar, the Lebanese Druze terrorist who was released from Israeli prison in 2008. (JNS.org)

Switzerland first to lift Iran sanctions after nuclear deal

BERNE - The government of Switzerland has become the first country to officially lift its sanctions against Iran in the wake of last month's nuclear deal.

The decision, which took effect on August 13, removes a ban on precious metal transitions with Iranian state bodies, as well as requirements to report the trade and transport of Iranian petrochemical products, crude oil, and petroleum.

Switzerland is home to large oil trading companies such as Vitol Group, Glencore, and Trafigura Beheer BV. Ever since the US and Iran broke off diplomatic relations following the 1979 Iranian Revolution, Switzerland has been functioning as a mediator between the two nations.

The lifting of sanctions underscores Switzerland's "support for the ongoing process to implement the nuclear agreement, and its confidence in the constructive intentions of the negotiating parties," the Swiss government said. (JNS.org)



There was also their strong objections to a trip to Israel taken recently by youth leaders with strong ties to the ANC and their public complaints after being accused of intimidating the youth leaders upon their return.

This week, however, Jewish Report could not help but comment on the fact that BDS-SA national co-ordinator, Muhammed Desai, was thrown out of Virgin Active's Old Edwardian branch in Johannesburg last Wednesday night for wearing a BDS T-shirt.

The story goes something like this: Desai says he received a call from the gym on Wednesday asking that he not wear T-shirts with pro-Palestinian messaging, or that call for a boycott of Israel. They had received several complaints from members. Desai said he was told he would not be allowed to enter the gym if he wore a BDS T-shirt again.

Later that evening he arrived at the gym in a BDS T-shirt with an image of the late Chris Hani and various slogans for BDS and the Young Communist League on the front and text reading: "From the coast of Cape Town to the coast of Gaza, in solidarity with Palestinians against Israeli apartheid" on the back.

He was asked to leave and he refused, demanding that the gym show him the specific rules he had breached by wearing the T-shirt.

The gym apparently called the police who would not arrest Desai. After being told he was not allowed to enter any Virgin Active gym wearing a BDS, or any other social justice, T-shirt, Desai threatened to lay a complaint with the South African Human Rights Commission as well as to take the matter to the Equality Court.

This sparked further uproar and Virgin soon sent its managing director to Johannesburg to deal with the matter directly. Ultimately Virgin caved in saying that their decision to inform Desai that he could not wear the T-shirt was "wrong".

The incident raises a host of considerations. The South African Constitution protects freedom of speech and expression. Thus if Muhammed Desai chooses to wear a free Palestine T-shirt to the gym, that is his right in this country despite any offence it may cause. A pro-Israel supporter would have a similar right to wear a T-shirt supporting the Israeli army or the Zionist cause.

However, because Virgin Active is a private members club, it is entitled to set its own policies and while "no legal item of clothing is banned from Virgin Active clubs" at present, perhaps it will change its policies going forward to include banning certain provocative items.

In reflecting on Desai's decision to wear this T-shirt, we can probably assume it was pure provocation on his part, and specifically his decision to wear the T-shirt to the gym that night when he was asked not to - was a well-crafted, staged, media opportunity.

Apparently e.tv journalist Yusuf Omar just happened to be there at the time and the incident was carried on various media channels. Social media was also alight. Comments appearing on Desai's Facebook page called for a boycott and protests outside the gyms. Statements like: "Let's make sure that Woolies and Virgin be removed in our country", among others, were rife.

For many of our pro-Israel, SA Jewish community, BDS represents an offensive set of beliefs. Some of its members do not even support the right of Israel to exist. BDS is also seen as a gathering post for anti-Semites - we remember when their ranks called out to "shoot the Jew" at an Israel apartheid rally at Wits University in 2013.

Further, Desai has worn T-shirts supporting the ANC Youth League and Amnesty International, but what about T-shirts calling to "Help the millions of Syrian refugees" or "Stop ISIS". Our community rightly feels that BDS places undue focus on criticising Israel in South Africa and not on other much more tyrannical regimes in the Middle East.

The sad reality is that Desai benefited from the media circus he was looking for through this incident and admittedly, he does have the right to wear this T-shirt. We as Jews also have a right to be sensitive and vigilant.

Perhaps, however, all of us South Africans - with contentious issues such as the Israel Palestine question - should be more respectful and less antagonistic. Even though Virgin backed down on its initial response, there was a worthwhile message in its statement: "We would hope that members would understand the need for both tolerance and respect in this space. We do not believe our clubs should be forums for contentious political activity."

This would be more in the spirit of the peaceful co-existence with a focus on common ground - that our democratic forefathers fought so hard for. After all - South African Jews, our staunch pro-Israel supporters, Muhammed Desai and his supporters at BDS - are all watching events evolve in the Middle East from the sidelines anyway.

Why Hamas and Israel may be secretly negotiating

After more than a decade of failed diplomacy, Israel could be close to signing a major agreement with the Palestinians. They're just not the Palestinians you thought.

After years of vowing not to negotiate with Hamas, which rules the Gaza Strip, Israel may be finalising a deal with the terrorist group that reportedly would lift Israel's blockade of Gaza in exchange for a cessation of Hamas rocket attacks and tunnelling into Israel for at least eight years.

Israeli officials have flatly denied the reports. On Monday, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office released a statement saying that its policy of nonnegotiation with Hamas had not changed.

"Israel would like to officially clarify that it is not holding any meetings with Hamas, neither directly, nor via other countries, nor via intermediaries," the statement said.

But there may be some truth to the reports, which have appeared in the Arabic-language press and have received considerable attention in the Israeli media. A senior official in Turkey, an ally of Hamas, told the Hamas daily al-Resalah that an agreement was near, the Times of Israel reported.

The official, Yasin Aktay, is an adviser to Turkish Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu and said Hamas political chief Khaled Meshaal had come to Turkey to brief the Turkish leadership about the agreement.

After three wars in the past six years, Israel and Hamas may have a mutual interest in securing a longer-term truce that will stave off another round of fighting. Hamas would be able to rebuild Gaza - and perhaps restock its arsenal - while the Israelis would get a reprieve from Hamas rockets that is longer than two years.

"It seems to me that Hamas absorbed some [Israeli military] operations, and they're interested in getting to an arrangement that will allow them to live in Gaza in quiet," said Ephraim Inbar, the director of Bar-Ilan University's Begin-Sadat Centre for Strategic Studies. "Israel is also interested in a long-term ceasefire."

Arabic news sources reported that the agreement could include the construction of a port in the Gaza Strip. Ships en route to Gaza would pass through a port in Cyprus, where they would be examined by either Turkish or Nato authorities.

The agreement also would include permits for thousands of Gazan day labourers to work in Israel, and in exchange Hamas would commit to ceasing all rocket attacks and tunnelling into Israel, according to the Times of Israel.

The deal reportedly has been approved by the Shura Council, Hamas' legislative body. Former British Prime Minister Tony Blair is said to be mediating between the sides.

Gershon Baskin, who helped negotiate the 2011 Israel-Hamas prisoner exchange that freed Israeli soldier Gilad Shalit, said he was inclined to believe Netanyahu's denials and doubted that an agreement was close. Israel had no incentive to sign an agreement that would strengthen Hamas while weakening Palestinian moderates in the West Bank who opposed Hamas, Baskin said.

"It's insane for Israel to even think about entering into that kind of agreement," Baskin said. "It's a victory for Hamas, and the question is: You're giving Hamas a victory as Hamas continues to build its soldiers and its army. For what? It's not a plan to demilitarise Gaza"

If negotiations are taking place, it would be a major reversal for a government that previously considered Israel-Hamas talks anathema - at least officially. Last year, Israel called off peace talks with the Fatah-controlled Palestinian Authority when the Fatah faction and Hamas signed a unity pact.

Israel, however, has negotiated with Hamas indirectly in the past. Mediated talks in 2012 and 2014 ended Israeli military operations in Gaza. At the end of August 2014, an Egyptian-mediated pact ended a Gaza conflict that saw more than 2 000 Palestinians and 70 Israelis killed. The ceasefire also called for restarting indirect talks on easing the blockade of Gaza and disarming the territory.

An Israel-Hamas agreement may be especially opportune now as Israel aims to strengthen ties with neighbouring countries that share its fears about the Iran nuclear agreement. Saudi Arabia reportedly wants to create a broad, Sunni-based alliance that includes Hamas to counter Iran's regional ambitions. Hamas, however, has received funding and weaponry from Iran

For Israel, another positive side effect of an accord could be improved relations with Turkey, which supports Hamas. Relations between Turkey and Israel deteriorated in 2010 after nine Turks were killed when Israeli soldiers stormed a Turkish boat, the Mavi Marmara, trying to break Israel's naval blockade of Gaza.

Since then, Turkey and Israel have negotiated over Israeli compensation for the victims. An Israeli pact with Hamas could make Turkey more amenable to an agreement of its own with Israel. (JTA)



Q. What is your connection to the Jewish community and Israel?

A. My connection with this community and Israel is through an organisation called DEISI Int. I am the project manager. We are an organisation that defends, embraces, supports and invests in Israel. JERUSALEM POST: "A cult of death, a racist hatred of Jews, Hindus, Christians and "unbelievers" and the desire to restore a long-vanished, despotic empire ruled by a mediaeval Muslim jurisprudence are the common features of the groups that carry out these attacks. The West has no option other than to stand and fight for its values, wherever these attacks occur, but in our region, a unified front against extremism, comprised of Israel and the moderate Arab states, is the only way to keep this side of the world safe and minimise the chances of another war in Gaza or another terrorist atrocity abroad."

HAARETZ: "The working assumption of Israel's government over the past eight years has been that only a military solution can calm the Gaza Strip. It is ironic, therefore that it is the IDF and not the politicians, that has initiated a new, rational and practical strategy, which assumes that a military solution alone is no guarantee of quiet along the borders. Senior IDF officers have recently formulated a number of recommendations, including the opening of border crossings between Israel and the Gaza Strip, granting permits to thousands of Palestinians to work in Israel, allowing Palestinians to the Allenby Bridge and increasing the volume of goods entering and leaving the Strip. The practical effect of the proposals would be the almost complete lifting of the blockade on the Strip. It is a welcome approach, which should be adopted and implemented immediately."



YISRAEL HAYOM: "The United States, the strongest power in world history, is lowering its flag and surrendering without a fight to a brutal and vicious Iranian regime. The decline of the West is turning into a fait accompli. Western civilisation has chosen to eat, drink and reach dubious deals, no matter what the consequences. It is a given that those who avoid the fight against terrorism will eventually surrender to it. When will the world realise that Islamic terrorism is not just Israel's problem and that a nuclear Iran would not just endanger the Jews?"

- ★ For the first time ever, Hareidi religious boys are learning cyber defence in a four-year Beit Midrash programme, whilst preparing for IDF service. After the first year at Beit Midrash Derech Chaim, 80% of the boys passed the cyber test in which 35% is considered a high achievement.
- ★ Israeli nonprofit Red Button has produced the world's first app that lets anyone, especially kids, easily report negative web behaviour. Click the red button to send web and IP address, site ownership and more to volunteers at the Interdisciplinary Centre Herzliya (IDC), who collate the information and file complaints with the appropriate sites and/ or authorities.
- ★ A brand new recycling plant has begun collecting the garbage of some 1 million residents of the Jerusalem region. The NIS 100 million plant uses state-of-the-art technology to transform waste into energy without human intervention.
- ★ Some 150 Muslim, Christian and Jewish students, most with cerebral palsy, attend the ONN School for Special Education in Tel Aviv. The school provides academic, social and life skills for the

students, who range from 6 to 21 years of age.

- ★ DrYuvalTabach of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem has developed an Internet tool that will allow any investigator, physician or patient to analyse a gene according to its evolutionary profile. It will help identify genes associated with genetic diseases and cancer.
- ★ Israel is one of the top 5 happiest countries, according to a new Better Life Index report by the OECD. Israel came after Denmark, Iceland, Switzerland and Finland on 22 variables including income, education, housing, health, life expectancy, life satisfaction and community.
- ★ Deafness did not prevent US Jews from visiting the Jewish State this summer on Taglit and Birthright trips. One group specifically catered for those with hearing impediments. And the highlight was a whole day's sessions at the Institute for the Advancement of Deaf People in Israel.
- ★ Israel's PlayBuzz has raised \$16 million to expand its quiz games, lists and poll website internationally. Founded by Shaul Omert (son of

ex-Israeli PM Ehud Olmert), Playbuzz has grown to more than 80 million unique users, with more than half of its traffic coming from Facebook

- ★ Israeli start-up DeepOptics has developed electronic multifocal lenses. Using sensors, they detect what the eye is focusing on as well as the viewing distance - adjusting the power of your spectacles to ensure that whatever is being looked at comes into focus, whether near or far.
- ★ Great praise from US Congressman Chaka Fattah – the man in charge of appropriating federal money for science and medical research and development programmes. Fattah, was a keynote speaker at BrainTech 2015 event in Tel Aviv. Per capita, Israel leads the world in neuroscience; and has the brains to solve almost any brain problem.
- ★ Israeli biotech Evogene is using its PointHit platform to analyse molecules in weeds and identify key plant macro-molecules responsible for essential biological processes in weeds. By targeting those processes, herbicides can be developed that will be more effective in killing weeds.

HEADLINE

- Saudi multi-millionaire media tycoon, Prince Talal Bin Waleed, has urged all Arab nations to give up their acrimonious stance toward the Jewish nation. He intends to visit Israel and open a direct dialogue on behalf of Saudi Arabia's King Salman.
- The Saudi-Arabian think tank Centre for World University Rankings ranked three Israeli universities within the top 100. Hebrew University took the lead for Israel in the rankings, ranked 23rd, the Weizmann Institute was ranked 39th and Tel Aviv University 86th. The Centre for World University Rankings is based in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.



- Canada will keep its sanctions in place – at least for now – despite the nuclear agreement Iran has reached with major world powers. Foreign Affairs Minister Rob Nicholson issued a statement saying that Canada "will continue to judge Iran by its actions not its words," and that the government in Ottawa will examine the agreement carefully before making any policy changes.
- More than 2 000 Jewish athletes participated in the 14th European Maccabi Games that opened in July. The competition was the first Jewish-organised sporting event to take place in Germany, at the Olympiastadion, the same Olympic

- stadium built and used for the Summer Olympics, 1936 during the Nazi era, when Jews were discouraged from participating. Participants this year came from 36 countries and competed in 19 disciplines.
- Three state senators from New Hampshire recently visited Israel to learn about the country's approach to public healthcare, border security, economic development, environmental policy and a host of other issues.
- Israeli exports to India totalled \$370 million in Q1/15, double the exports in Q1/14, according to figures from the Israel Export and International Co-operation Institute. Israeli exports to India had risen in all sectors, including telecommunications equipment, measuring and control equipment, industrial equipment and more.



Israel is the fifth-priciest country in the world when it comes to how much consumers pay for unleaded petrol. Israelis are paying \$1.53 per litre (\$5.79 per gallon), despite the fact that world oil prices have dropped to \$66 per barrel since April 2012. The price of unleaded petrol is highest in Norway, followed by Turkey, Hong Kong, and the Netherlands. Italy is tied with Israel for fifth place.

- With increasing areas of the Middle East falling prey to the Islamic State (IS), Israel remains a safe haven for all religions, faiths and ethnicities in the region. However, recently residents in an East Jerusalem suburb were shocked to receive pamphlets allegedly printed by an IS branch in Jerusalem. Written in menacing Arabic and bearing the black IS flag, the pamphlets threatened Christian Arabs with death unless they fled the Jewish capital by the end of Ramadan. No news yet as to whether they kept to their threat.
- Yotam Goren of Israel has been appointed as deputy chairman of the Administrative and Budgetary Committee to the United Nations General Assembly. The committee functions as the UN's "Finance Ministry," responsible for a budget of more than \$11 billion.



Russia's military this year alone will receive over 40 new intercontinental ballistic missiles capable of piercing any missile defences, President Vladimir Putin said in a blunt reminder of the nation's nuclear might amid tensions with the West over Ukraine. Putin vowed to continue a big arms modernisation programme despite the nation's economic downturn. He specifically mentioned Armata tanks and other new armoured vehicles, which were

- first shown to the public during a recent Red Square military parade.
- A rare inscription from the time of King David was discovered at Khirbet Qeiyafain. A ceramic jar c. 3 000 years old that was broken into numerous shards was discovered in 2012 in excavations. Intensive restoration work, during which hundreds of pottery shards were glued together to form a whole jar, solved the riddle – the jar bears the inscription: Eshba'al Ben Bada'. "This is the first time the name Eshba'al has appeared on an ancient inscription in the country. Eshba'al Ben Shaul, who ruled over Israel at the same time as David, is known from the Bible."



The UN Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (Unesco) has designated the ancient Jewish town of Beit She'arim in the Western Galilee as a World Heritage Site. The well-preserved town, which includes ancient tombs and sarcophagi as well as "a treasury of artworks and inscriptions in Greek, Aramaic and Hebrew", is the ninth Israeli site to be so designated. "Beit She'arim bears unique testimony to ancient Judaism under the leadership of Rabbi Judah the Patriarch, who is credited with Jewish renewal after 135 CE," said the Unesco committee.

Monds from ...

"Could you trust the Iranians if you get a deal with them, because their history isn't, let us say, spotless in that regard...? A good deal has a few things it must have within it. One of them, it has to be verifiable. That is, we have to be able to know that the Iranians are taking the steps that the agreement calls for to not get a nuclear weapon. We can't do that based on trust... Just like back in the old days of the Cold War when we had arms control with the Soviet Union, we didn't trust the Soviet Union either. And we wanted to make sure that all the agreements are verifiable. So that's a critical thing. And if it's not verifiable, we're not going to agree to it."

"Israel is India's most trusted ally in West Asia and one dare say among the three or four closest friends India has anywhere in the world." Indian columnist Ashok Malik, in light of a recent announcement that Prime Minister Narendra Modi would become the first Indian premier to visit the Jewish state. Malik suggested that the Israel trip be considered a "standalone," saying it would be "clumsy and discourteous to link a Modi visit to Israel to one to Muslim/Arab countries as well...The India-Israel relationship is important enough, even sacred enough, to merit that respect."

"A deal that allows Iran to keep a uranium enrichment programme will not prevent Iran from acquiring nuclear weapons. Instead, it will make an Iranian bomb more likely. It also increases the risk of a nuclear arms race in the region. Then there is the matter of setting a dangerous precedent: It will be impossible for Washington to argue that it trusts Iran with sensitive nuclear facilities but not its friends and allies. To make matters even worse, in the wake of a deal, all of this will happen with the international

community's stamp of approval. Seventy years of successful US-led nonproliferation policy will have been trashed. Unless the negotiators return to insisting on zero enrichment, their efforts deserve zero support."



As Johns Hopkins University's Michael Mandelbaum put it in an unflattering comparison between Soviet-American arms-control talks and the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, "Surely the main reason [Obama has conceded so much] is that, while there is a vast disparity in power between the two parties, the United States is not willing to use the ultimate form of power, and the Iranian leaders know this." The city of Tshwane in South Africa is using RADWIN's FiberinMotion wireless mobility solution to provide free Wi-Fi on board city buses – up to 100 Mbps throughput per bus. Since the project was launched in December 2014, over 200 000 unique users have used the Tshwane Free WiFi service on board buses, with total data usage of 30 terabytes. Project Isizwe – a nonprofit organisation which brings Internet to low income communities across South Africa – spearheaded the project. In the first phase of project deployment, RADWIN's FiberinMotion base stations were deployed along the A Re Yeng line from Pretoria Central to Hatfield and over 30 buses were equipped with FiberinMotion Vehicular Mobile Units (VMUs).



Israel blesses the world

Israel and the World Bank Group's Water Global Practice teamed up this week on a new initiative to provide water-technology knowledge and expertise for use in the developing world. Under the plan Israeli experts in desalination, water filtration and sanitation, drip irrigation and more will travel to various countries around the world to present their knowledge and experience to local officials while experts will also visit Israel to observe first-hand how the Jewish State has built a world-class agricultural sector despite its arid climate.

Israel establishes Technology and

Innovation Authority

The Israeli government has approved the establishment of a National Authority for Technology and Innovation (NATI). The authority will function as the executive arm of the Office of the Chief Scientist at the Israeli Ministry of Economy. Minister of the Economy Deri, who was one of the proposers of the authority along with Minister of Finance Kahlon, said. The government's innovation policy aims at achieving broad national goals in the coming decade, including: encouraging growth of industrial companies, injecting technological innovation into traditional fields which are not traditionally R&D dependent, strengthening research infrastructure as well as capital and labour, harnessing innovation for the improvement of the public sector and increasing the participation of sectors currently underrepresented in the hi-tech work force.



Telfed Tidings

Since 1948, Telfed, the South African Zionist Federation (Israel), has been dedicated to improving the quality of life and opportunities available to approximately 25 000 former Southern Africans living in Israel. The organisation's core mission is to ensure smooth 'Aliyah' (immigration) and successful 'Klita' (absorption), while providing valuable support for the SA community in Israel.

With Frankl's words resounding in the back of her mind ("the heart remains restless until it has found and realised meaning") Teria and her family moved to Israel, and are "fully happy at last!"

In addition to tending to the welfare and wellbeing of SA community members, (particularly the elderly, unemployed, families at risk or with special needs, those afflicted by physical or mental illnesses, lone soldiers and single parents), Telfed also provides study bursaries, subsidised rental housing apartments for new/established 'olim' (immigrants), counselling, employment guidance, information services and volunteering opportunities, geared to promoting integration and strengthening the State of Israel.

Israeli health breakthrough awarded Gates Foundation grant

Haifa's Technion, the Israel Institute of Technology, has been awarded a grant as part of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Grand Challenges Exploration programme. The Technion grant will go to Professor Hossam Haick of the Chemical Engineering Department and Russell Berrie Nanotechnology Institute, who is developing cutting edge biomedical technology, including a self-administered electronic patch for the detection of tuberculosis via skin. More than 2 billion people around the world are estimated to have tuberculosis, and 10% of them will experience active symptoms in their lifetimes. Some 95% of tuberculosis sufferers live in developing countries where inhabitants subsist on incomes of \$1 per day. The goal of Haick's project is to develop a self-administered diagnostic method based on the adhesive patch. The diagnosis, which uses a skin sample, would take up to five minutes, and it would be less expensive and more accessible than the current diagnostic tools.



Jerusalem becoming more attractive to visitors

A recent poll taken among readers of Travel and Leisure magazine gave Jerusalem 10th place in the category of best cities in the world to visit. "Christians, Jews, and Muslims converge to worship in this 4 000-year-old holy city, and their respective churches, synagogues and mosques surround the historic Old City," the magazine said. In related news, Israel's Transportation Ministry has announced plans to construct a 150-km. network of cycling routes around the Gush Dan region. The project will, it is hoped, "serve thousands of cyclists a day, reduce road congestion and pollution and improve the safety of pedestrians and riders alike."

Easyjet puts its trust in Israel

British low-cost airline easyJet gave another vote of confidence in Israel this week by adding yet another route between Tel Aviv and Amsterdam, taking advantage of the "open skies" agreement between Israel and the EU to solidify its position as the second largest operator out of Ben-Gurion International Airport. "We will increase the number of routes to Israel and constantly look into new destinations," EasyJet CEO Carolyn McCall recently told Israeli media outlets.



Israel takes steps to increase natural gas flow

Israel's security Cabinet reached a decision on Thursday to move ahead with development of the offshore natural gas fields as a matter of national security, irrespective of court rulings about the monopolistic nature of the economic arrangements or the competing demands and concerns of various forces in Israel's civil discourse. Opposition lawmakers immediately condemned the decision and demanded that the question be addressed by the entire Knesset. However, Prime Minister Netanyahu said: "We are promoting a realistic solution that will bring natural gas to the Israeli market and not a populist solution that will keep the gas deep underground. After years of discussions, after years of arguments, I'm sure that this is the wise solution, the right solution and the solution required for all citizens of the country."

Tel Aviv's Norman Hotel is voted world's best boutique hotel

Luxury American tourism magazine Jetsetter has just named the world's best boutique hotel – the stunning Norman Tel Aviv. "The term 'boutique hotel' can be applied to everything from major chains' brand extensions to indie sleeps one step removed from B&B status, but Tel Aviv's smart, stylish Norman is the real deal," Jetsetter explained of its vote, which was based on reviews by 200 international journalists. Overall, the magazine examined 23 hotel categories, such as business hotels and all-inclusive beach resorts.

Israeli facility will turn plastic waste into fuel

The Environmental Services Company, Ltd, a government body established in 1990 to handle hazardous waste in Israel, will soon begin operating a unique facility designed to recycle plastic and turn it into fuel. According to the company's assessments, the facility will be able to derive 600 kilograms (1 320 pounds) of an oil-like substance from every ton of plastic waste they treat. This facility will be the first of its kind in the country.

Every day, Israelis dispose of some 1 500 metric tons of plastic waste. Most of it, 75.7%, is buried in landfills. Most of the plastic waste comes from homes (plastic bags, packaging, bottles, toys, furniture), agriculture (irrigation hoses, packaging, plastic sheeting) and industry. In addition, the Environmental Services Company receives about 3 000 metric tons of plastic waste from packaging

per year. The recycling process involves melting and depolymerising the plastic until a fuel resembling oil is derived. The facility has cost 10 million shekels (\$2.7 million).

Double-decker buses to return to Israel's roads

After a very long absence, double-decker buses are set to make a comeback on Israel's roads this year. The National Public Transport Authority in the Ministry of Transport is to carry out a pilot study in which about five double-decker buses will be bought for a trial on Egged and Dan urban routes.

Over a decade ago, Egged was using double-decker buses from Neoplan on inter-city routes, but because of recurring operational problems they were abandoned. The new trial will be of more advanced buses currently designed for urban use only, and among other things the option is being examined of buses with hybrid power systems. If the trial succeeds, these buses could represent a good solution to the problems of public transport at peak traffic times, with a near-double passenger capacity, the same area on the road, and about half the air pollution, of the single-decker buses currently in use.

Kosher kitchen feeds Muslim refugees in Italy

In the cavernous expanse below Milan's central station, there is great activity going on. The area - containing hidden rail loading stations designed for cargo and mail - was where thousands of Jews were deported to Auschwitz by German and Italian forces, most never to return. Now, retrofitted as a Holocaust memorial and museum, the place has recently become the temporary home of Eritrian, Ethiopian, Sudanese and Syrian refugees - most of them Muslim - fleeing to the safety they hope to find in Northern Europe. Upon arrival, the refugees are given towels and toiletries, and shown to a shower area that was built just for them. But first, they enjoy a nourishing hot meal, prepared and delivered by the volunteers of the Chabad-affiliated Beteavon ("Good Appetite") soup kitchen. Most had not eaten properly for days. Since it was recently Ramadan, the Muslim month of fasting during daylight hours, the freshly prepared meal was the first food many of them had had since the night before. They so appreciated the kosher meals, knowing that it conformed to their religious standards as well. Rabbi Yigal Hazan, who oversees the kitchen, says the Jewish community's involvement with the refugees is based on the biblical commandment to "love the stranger, for you, too, were a stranger in the land of Egypt."



A MUSLIM PROFESSOR WHO SPEAKS WITH A FORKED TONGUE

I refer to Geoff Sifrin's column, Taking Issue, where he comments on Professor Adam Habib's lecture at Limmud.

Habib (Wits' vice-chancellor) wanted to severely criticise Israel; he has been anti-Israel, even during his tenure at the University of Johannesburg when he was among those on their senate to break contact with Ben-Gurion University. The Allies in the Second World War flattened Dresden in Germany, killing thousands of civilians. Should Britain and America have apologised for that? Or the US to Japan, for Hiroshima and Nagasaki?

What was the intent of the tunnels from Gaza into Israel? For the Hamas terrorists to emerge

in Israel to shake the hands of Israelis in friendship?

Habib remarked about wearing two hats at Wits and that the campus is an open space for debate. Really? When anti-Israel groups disrupted Israeli events like classical concerts, it becomes a semi-battlefield!

I think Habib is trying to preserve his office and position by ensuring previous bequests and future donations from the Jewish sector are kept coming.

He remarked about racism in South Africa, implying the Jewish community is not condemnatory here. Somehow one never hears racial criticism coming from our Jewish community.

He mentioned the recent killing of a Palestinian baby by some Israelis. Has he forgotten the murder of a family in Israel a couple of years back when police found their baby's throat slit, and does he recall the Ma'alot killing of kibbutz children by terrorists some years ago?

Michael Freeman, Israel's deputy ambassador, asked Habib whether he believed Israel had the right to exist. Habib replied in the affirmative - but as a democratic multicultural state and said that should apply to all the Middle Eastern states too. His model is the US. But what about Iran, Iraq, Algeria, Libya, etc. who expelled their Jews not so many decades ago? Would they allow Christianity and Judaism again, without restrictions/restraints and other religions? I don't think so. This Muslim professor is speaking with a forked tongue!



Sefer Torah from SA part of a moving ceremony in Israel

Thousands from all over the world gathered at the Western Wall Plaza in Jerusalem in the presence of Israel President Reuven Rivlin, Defence Minister Moshe Yaalon, IDF Chief of Staff Gadi Eizenkot and Israeli Sephardi Chief Rabbi Yitzchak Yosef at a Hachnasat Sifrei Torah on Wednesday last week.

The 75 Torah scrolls were donated from various countries, with Africa's contribution being an inscribed Sefer Torah contributed by the Great Park Synagogue in Johannesburg and the African Jewish Congress, represented by Rabbi Dovid Hazdan and Rabbi Moshe Silberhaft.

Called the Kesher Lanetzach (Bond for Eternity) project, its mission was to dedicate the Sifrei Torah to the 67 soldiers who fell in defence of Israel and eight civilians who were also killed in last year's Operation Protective Edge in Gaza.

"Surrounded by thousands of bereaved families whose loved ones had made the supreme sacrifice, our tears of sadness mixed interchangeably with those of joy. We felt the pain of inconsolable loss even as we felt the powerful, reassuring eternal bonds of Am Yisrael, our Torah and Yerushalayim," Rabbi Hazdan told the SA Jewish Report.

"The Kotel reverberated with the sounds of weeping as images of brave young men going to battle, appeared on the screen while Yizkor was intoned... I feel privileged to have carried a Torah from South Africa on behalf of the Great

Park community and to have participated in this monumental outpouring of soul expressing the faith, commitment, love and unity of our people," he said.

Rabbi Moshe Silberhaft, CEO and spiritual leader of the AJC, said the Torah scroll had been in need of repair and local donors had contributed towards this.

"Besides being a delight and an honour, the atmosphere was very powerful, with tears of both sadness and joy," Rabbi Silberhaft said.

"I have never experienced anything of this magnitude and proof of the unity of the Jewish people and the centrality of Israel to our lives. This wonderful effort to remember Israel's fallen is a tribute of the highest order."

The other participating countries were Brazil, Canada (Montreal and Toronto), Chile, Egypt, France (Paris), Israel, Mexico, Morocco, Romania, Spain, and the US (California and Florida).

Many of the Sifrei Torah came from survivors of the Holocaust in Romania.

The event was sponsored by the Israeli NGO Lema'an Bitachon Israel (Libi) - For the Security of Israel - and the international Young Israel Movement (Israel branch) was invited to be a partner at the ceremony because of its previous success in donating over 215 Sifrei Torah to army, navy and air force units throughout Israel.

The 75 Sifrei Torah will be sent to each of the eight IDF brigades, synagogues, prisons and institutions throughout Israel.

JANNER IN COURT DESPITE DEMENTIA

WESTMINSTER - Lord Janner has appeared in court to be charged with 22 allegations of historical child sex abuse. The 87-year-old, who suffers from severe dementia, was brought into Court One at Westminster Magistrates Court in central London.

Following his departure, the court clerk read the details of the 22 charges he faces. They relate to a series of historical sexual offences, the majority against young boys under the age of 16 in the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s. He is accused of 15 counts of indecent assault and seven counts of a separate sexual offence, against a total of nine complainants

Lord Janner was released on unconditional bail and the case was sent to Southwark Crown Court where it is next due to be heard on September 1.

His lawyer Paul Ozin QC argued that the peer's severe dementia made him "vulnerable" and called for the court to accommodate his needs. - Jewish

\$75 MILLION AUTISM CENTRE FOR JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM - As cases of autism spectrum disorder (ASD) continue to increase around the world, the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and the Hadassah Medical Centre plan to establish the first interdisciplinary university-based autism centre in the Middle East. The \$75 million Autism Centre is envisioned as a collaborative and interdisciplinary effort anchored in the Hebrew University's faculty of medicine. There is no word yet on when it is expected to open.

"Our goal in establishing the Autism Centre is to lead Israel and the Middle East in research, training, clinical services and community engagement for the benefit of individuals with autism spectrum disorder and their families," said the faculty of medicine dean, Prof David Lichtstein. The centre is intended to bring cutting-edge research, clinical services, state-ofthe-art training and education for professionals and parents under one roof. This is a rare comprehensive model; some universities in the Middle East have autism research programmes, while others have associations with clinical services. - Israel 21c

SUMMER RECESS KILLS BILL AGAINST SELLING SHOAH ARTEFACTS

TORONTO - A federal bill that would have criminalised hate-motivated purchase or sale of some Holocaust-era artefacts within Canada, died when the House of Commons adjourned for the summer.

Bill C-678 was introduced by York Centre Conservative MP Mark Adler in May.

It sought to make it illegal to buy or sell "personal property that was owned by, or in the possession of, a victim or survivor of the Holocaust for the purpose of wilfully promoting hatred against any identifiable

The private member's bill aimed to amend section 319 of the Criminal Code, which deals with hate crimes. It envisioned punishment of a maximum two-year prison term and forfeiture of the property.

"This is an issue that is very close to my heart and is certainly important to my constituents," Adler told the House. - The Canadian Jewish News

TRIAL OF MISSOURI WHITE SUPREMACIST TO

KANSAS - The trial was due to begin this week of a Missouri white supremacist charged with murdering three people in a shooting spree outside two Jewish centres in a Kansas City suburb in April last year.

Frazier Glenn Cross, 74, a former senior member of the Ku Klux Klan who has made derogatory remarks about Jews in preliminary court hearings, chose to represent himself at his state trial in Olathe, Kansas. Cross, also known as Glenn Miller, could be sentenced to death if convicted. About 200 people are on the witness list for the trial and its penalty phase. Jury selection was expected to take all week, court officials said.

Cross is charged with killing Reat Underwood, 14, and his grandfather, William Corporon, 69, outside the Jewish Community Centre of Greater Kansas City, as well as Terri LaManno, 53, outside a retirement home in Overland Park, Kansas. He is also charged with attempted murder for allegedly shooting at three other people outside the facilities. He has pleaded not quilty. - Jerusalem Post

Kaplan lays bare the Maccabi Games

I don't know too much about well-known US sportswriter Ron Kaplan other than that he has a blog called "Kaplan's Korner". It deals mainly with baseball, American football and ice hockey but last month Kaplan released a book on the Maccabi Games - "The Jewish Olympics: The History of the Maccabiah

It is in times like these that it is fortunate to have family in the US as they let me know as soon as a book like this is available and, as in this case, have sent me a copy. As it deals with various issues, including politics, I rushed to see how much detail Kaplan had about South Africa and the apartheid years.

He does cover the political issues quite well but there is the odd mistake when it comes to South Africa. For example, when he spoke of the 1981 Maccabiah he points out that "several countries, including the United States, Israel, Canada, South Africa, Argentina and others boycotted the 1980 Olympic Games in

South Africa may very well have boycotted the Moscow Olympics - if we had been invited in the first place!

In the early 1970s, when the subject of South Africa and Rhodesia sporting participation started to become a hot potato, the general feeling of the Maccabi organisers was that this was a Jewish event and that they should not be bound by International Olympic

Kaplan quotes Arthur Goldman, chairman of Maccabi SA at the time, calling for the Maccabiah to be withdrawn from the IOC.

"It is high time the entire present concept of the Maccabiah be altered to minimise the effect and possibility of the present - and let me warn future - from the outside world of sport."

Kaplan points out that the coverage of the Maccabiah by the international press has not been particularly impressive, despite the fact that there is a group of 25 individuals who have won medals at both the Olympic and Maccabi Games

"The Maccabi Games were incredibly... underreported," said Kaplan. "I don't know if they were reported more at the time and that information is just not available anymore, or if they just didn't think this was a big enough deal to record it back in the 1930s and even in the '50s.

"Finding the information was difficult, and the accuracy of the information, depending on the source... you might have somebody's name

spelled three different ways. Finding accurate results was extremely difficult."

While Mark Spitz competed in the 1965 Maccabi Games before winning nine Olympic golds (including seven in 1972 alone), Jason Lezak first took part in the Maccabi Games in 2009, after he had already been to the Olympics three times.

The same path was taken by Lenny Krayzelburg, who tasted Olympic gold a year before he swam in the 2001 Maccabiah.

"It's like walking on the moon. What do you do for an encore?" Kaplan said in an interview, referring to winning an Olympic medal. For Krayzelburg and others, the Maccabi Games provided the answer.

"Krayzelburg decided he knew about these Games, and he wanted to get in touch with his Jewish heritage, so that's why he became an athlete there and a spokesman for the Games - and a very vocal spokesman, a very big supporter," said Kaplan.

The book has a total of 20 chapters, the first an introduction dealing with Jews and the organised sports movement, before devoting a chapter to each of the 19 Maccabi Games that

have been held.

In 2001 I covered the Maccabiah and the SA v Israel Davis Cup tie at Ramat Hasharon. Amos Mansdorf, captain of the Israeli team, made an interesting comment at the time: "The Maccabiah is not a sporting event, it is a political event."

Kaplan agrees in the sense that at some point the Games were hijacked by politicians who were more interested in aliyah than

I had to laugh in one part of the book where the editor of the Jerusalem Post questioned the sustainability of the Games. "The Games have shown up Israel's lamentably low standards in so many sports. The root of the trouble is in the schools where there is an indifferent and even apathetic attitude to games.

"The dearth of adequate sports facilities accounts for this in part and the result is that 20 per cent of our 18-year-olds joining the army, are overweight."

That is one thing that has changed markedly in Israel and a lot of that had to do with the arrival of the Russians in the later decades. They have had a huge impact on a wide variety of sports in general in Israel, such as ice-hockey, in arid little Israel!
